EL PROGRESSO CLUB REVIEWS COMMUNITY PROJECTS AS GIVEN BY GUEST SPEAKERS

With the aim to review community projects, El Progreso Study Club heard five minute talks on "Our Plans for Community Betterment" given by several leaders of community organizations who appeared as guest speakers at regular meeting of the club held last Thursday in the home of Mrs. Forrest Campbell.

In the absence of program leader, Mrs. A. B. Simpson who was ill, Mrs. H. H. Schweitzer, Year Book Chairman, led the program, opening with a brief review of coming programs for the year.

An introductory talk on "Build a Better Community" was given by Mrs. Frank Pohl, representing El Progreso Club, of which she is president.

Mrs. Schweitzer then introduced in turn, County Agent J. R. Emmons, representing extension work in the county; Mrs. J. E. Edwards, who spoke for the American Legion Auxiliary; J. E. Edwards, speaking for Matador Lions Club; Forrest Campbell, local Scoutmaster; Mrs. R. E. Donovan, Girls Scout leader; and Mrs. Freeman Thacker, president of the recently organized Matador Garden Club.

Each representative gave a splendid outline of plans for community betterment, and especially for youth conservation by these organizations.

Mr. Emmons stressed two important phases of his work: To control the natural resources of the county, and to conserve the youth by influencing his thinking. 4-H club activities were reviewed, and he cited a statement once made by former resident Glenn Dobkins, now of Guatemala City, C. A. as being the highest praise he had ever received for his work. Mr. Dobkins had declared, "You are doing more to improve the feeling between the communities of Motley county, than anything else that is being done." Mr. Emmons closed his impressive talk by calling attention to the Scripture, "Come and let us reason together" as timely advice for engaging in community projects.

Mrs. Edwards centered her remarks about the Legion Auxiliary's watchword: "Initiate, cooperate, but do not duplicate", and declared that that organization is striving to stress positive youth advancement through improvements in the home, well-trained teachers in the schools and recommendation of movies that tend to inspire youth.

"Lionism is Spirit of Service", declared Mr. Edwards in his

opening remarks, which he followed with a review of the club's activities from a financial standpoint. Dues from the membership amount approximately to \$2,100. annually, which is exhausted and special assessments made at intervals, to pay for the various projects which the club sponsors. Chief project is the local Boy Scouts, with emphasis being laid on all youth activities of the community.

Boy Scout is a democratic organization which serves to develop leadership. Mr. Campbell pointed out in his address to the club, "Since the scout movement follows long range plans in preparing youth for the future, we could set no immediate plans for the present. Scouting is a man's job, cut down to boy's size, and the purpose is to instruct and teach the boys how to take their places in the community when they become men."

Mrs. Donovan declared that the greatest need and the goal of Matador's four Girl Scout troops is a "home"—a hut or house of their own in which to meet for their activities. "The Girl Scout was organized in Matador in 1946", she said. "Since that time, it has grown until now we have four divisions with a membership of 47 girls, being two Brownie troops for girls between the ages of 7 and 10; an Intermediate Girl Scout troop for those between 10 and 14, and a Senior troop for those of high school age, with another Brownie troop for first grade pupils, in the process of organization." Mrs. Donovan reported that the girls had cleared \$78.00 from the sale of 600 boxes of cookies during the summer and that they are now engaged in selling Girl Scout calendars, which will net them \$27.00, since Mrs. J. S. Stanley had contributed the calendars. They now have \$342.52 in the bank toward their building fund she said.

A number of projects are on the agenda of the recently organized Garden Club, according to Mrs. Thacker's report. These will be principally landscaping projects and will include the new courthouse lawn, church yards and lawns of new homes in the community, she said. "One of our future aims is to beautify the city park", she declared. "A projects committee has been appointed, and we hope we shall be able to help all other organizations in their plans for community betterment."

In a business session following the program, with Mrs. Pohl presiding, the club voted to

serve as sponsoring organization for the new Brownie Troop, and Mrs. U. L. Willie made the announcement that she had donated a building site for a new scout hut for the girls.

Mrs. Robert Darsey was welcomed into the club as a new member. Eighteen other members were present, including two honorary members. One visitor, Mrs. James Holladay of Vernon, Texas, in addition to the guest speakers, was also present.

Time To Take Stock

Each year, during the third week in October, National Bible Week is observed. The 1949 observance will run from the 17th to the 23rd.

The week is designed to again focus attention on those basic principles of Christianity which are so widely and tragically violated. Here in the United States, to say nothing of other nations, we have little to pride ourselves upon as Christians. We have the highest rate of crime and delinquency in our history—three times as many people are incarcerated in penal institutions as are attending universities and colleges. Eleven out of 12 young people are not active church members. Over 8,000,000 people are under treatment for mental disorders. Religions and morals are often openly ridiculed, and totalitarian principles, which are directly opposed to Christianity and all the other great religions as well, are advocated and taught. There has never been a time when so much cheap and tawdry entertainment—in books and magazines, and on the radio, stage and screen—was offered for sale, and it has a huge audience. Racial and class hatreds are rampant.

Looking at the international scene, it is clear that the failure to live up to the basic ideals of Christianity has led to misery and despair for millions, to the enslavement of once-free peoples, to a cold war which is absorbing more and more of our energies, our thoughts, our resources. The world is moving swiftly toward a cynical materialism which may destroy it unless the trend is checked.

At a time like this, National Bible Week has a vast significance.—Duluth (Minn.) Publicity.

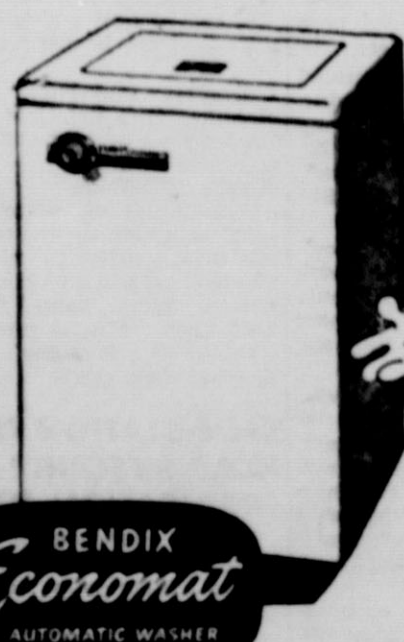

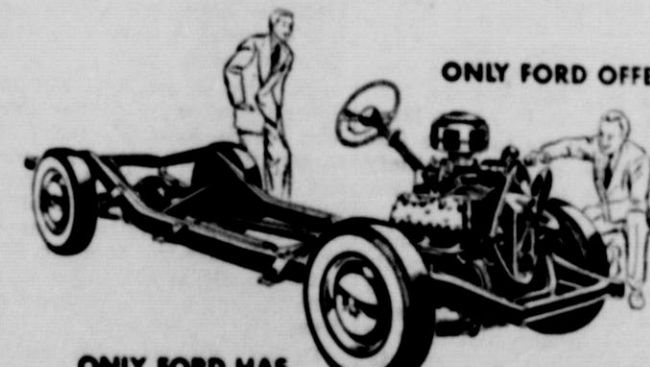

FORMER RESIDENT GETS MATERIAL FOR A BEAR RUG

"After killing a 12 point mule deer the first day of the season I went out to help my son, Gordon Wayne, secure his deer. We were going up a steep mountain trail when we saw two bears coming toward us. It was a mother bear and her cub. "Gordon beat me to the draw, shooting and killing the cub the first shot. The cub started cry-

After spending 20 years in Motley county and making many friends there, I would like for them to hear the story and come out here and go hunting with me. We live in excellent hunting country."

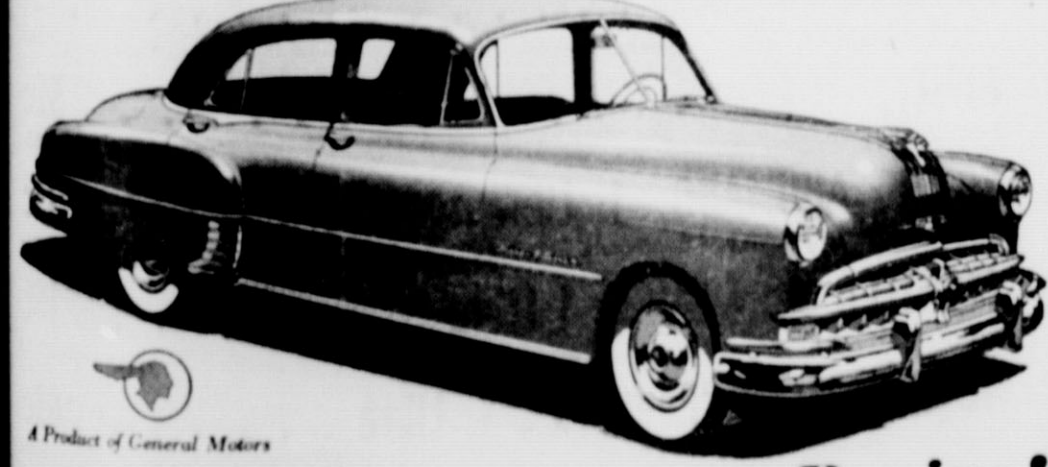

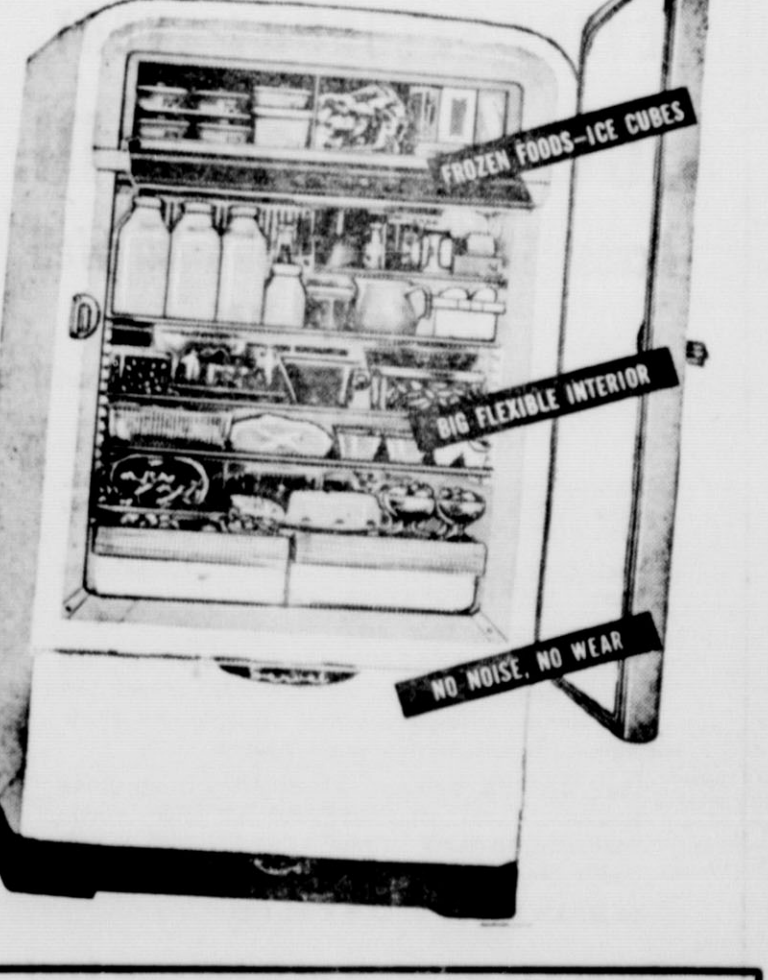
