Mr. and Mrs. Moore reared their family of six children here and had children in the Matador schools for 32 continuous years. One son, Ray Peyton, is deceased. 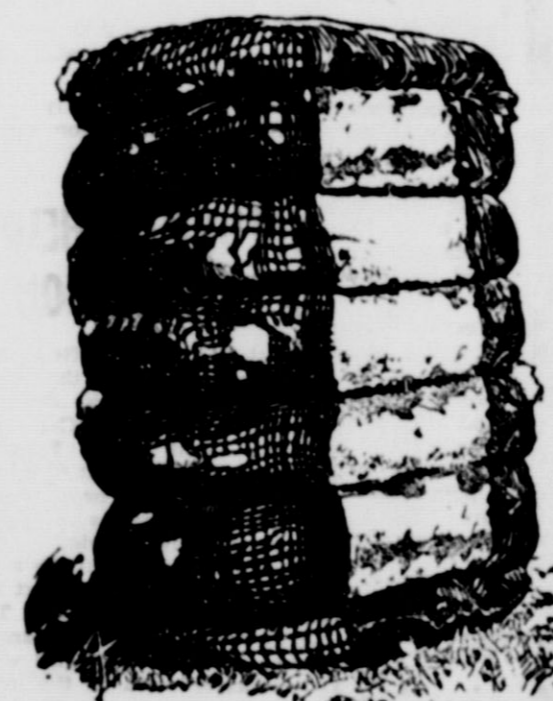

WTSC BUFFALOES TO OPEN SEASON WITH FLAGSTAFF

CANYON, Sept. 9—Coach Frank Kimbrough will herd his Texas State College Buffaloes into the Border Conference football season Saturday night, Sept. 11. The Flagstaff, Arizona, State College Lumberjacks will be the opponents. The game will start promptly at 8 p. m. under the new lights in Buffalo Stadium.

Coach Kimbrough and Odell Crowell, his line coach, predict the Buffaloes will be ready for the Lumberjacks, but will not be near the point of perfection the coaches would prefer.

"We are going to be a better club this year than last," said Kimbrough at the opening of the pre-season training period Sept. 1. He explained that last year's 19 freshmen ought to

be greatly improved because of the year's experience.

"But," Kimbrough continued, "all of our opponents should be better, too." He said his squad of 41 candidates has a great team spirit. "One of the best I've ever seen," he declared, "and, although we lack speed weight, we are going to try to make up for this handicap by being in top physical condition and having a high morale."

With only nine days of practice behind them, the Buffs will not have a wide variety of plays for the opening game. Too, they naturally are going to save something for the Texas Tech game in Lubbock on Sept. 18.

However, Panhandle fans will see the famed Double C combination of Sophomores Bill Cross and Eddie Conner, halfbacks, in plays with no punches pulled. Cross is the Canadian lad who was a sensation in 1947 as a freshman. Conner The Kid from Floydada, also starred last year as a freshman. Kimbrough is building a tricky set of plays around these two carriers, Cloyce Box, big, long-passing quarterback, and Lloyd Johnson Wheeler, at fullback.

In the line, Kimbrough will start Marvin Bowman, Lefors, Charles Kitchens, Childers, at ends; Wayne Hill, Vernon and Leon Chapman, Borger, at tackles; Pete Bromley, Clarendon and Harold Dalton, Brownfield, at guards and Buck Garrett, Borger at center.

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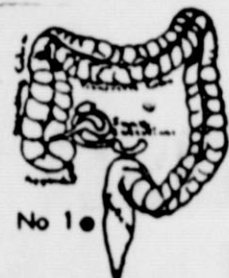

Army Is Seeking 4,312 Officers For Active Duty

AUSTIN, Sept. 4—The Army is seeking active duty applications from 4,312 Reserve officers—2,555 lieutenants, 1,590 captains, 119 majors and 48 lieutenant colonels. Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, Senior Instructor for the Organized Reserves in Texas, announced here today.

Aside from medical personnel, the Army will need no other Reserve officers as much as Infantrymen to meet immediate requirements of the expanded training program.

Analysis of Army vacancies for Reserve Officers, excluding Medical Department assignments, showed this week that 139 lieutenant colonels are being sought for active duty billets.

Since the implementation of the program to obtain Reserve officers on extended active duty on July 27, more than 346 Texas Reservists have made application for duty. Of this figure, 124

have already been accepted and have left for their initial assignment. This is far below the number of officers needed for the current expansion of the Army, but it is expected that the number will increase due to the developments in the international situation.

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Drive Started To Reduce Children Accident Toll

A state-wide effort to reduce Texas' child accident toll of about 900 lives yearly through participation in the national child safety campaign in September was set forth by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, as an immediate public health objective calling for concerted cooperation by all public health and medical authorities and interested civic organizations within the state.

"The needless loss of a single life, or the crippling of even one child, is an exorbitant price to pay for any neglect of this problem," said Dr. Cox. The importance of such a campaign is evidenced by the fact that accidents are now the leading cause of death among children more than one year old. Among children 5 to 9 years old the death rate from accidents was 25.7 per 100,000, as compared with a rate of 4.6 for rheumatic fever and organic heart disease, the next cause and among children from 9 to 14, the accident death rate was 20.8 and that for rheumatic fever and organic disease 7.2.

The outstanding improvement in the death rates from all non-accident causes during recent years is the result of the advanced in medical science and concentrated efforts in the field of child health. The premise of the child safety campaign is that efforts now must be intensified to bring about a somewhat comparable reduction in the number of child accidents.

BUMPER CROP IS FORECAST

Washington, Sept. 8—A bumper 13,219,000-bale cotton crop, worth about \$2,785,000,000 at current prices at the farm was forecast today by the Department of Agriculture.

Such a dollar return would be the biggest on record—half a billion dollars more than last year.

The new 1948 cotton crop forecast is 50,000 bales more than the 15,169,000 bales predicted a month ago. It is one of the biggest crops on record. It compares with 11,851,000 bales produced last year and a 10-year average production of 12,014,000. The farmers and the weather did it.

MAN GIVEN 14 YEARS FOR THEFT OF FINNISH PRESIDENT'S CLOTHES

Helsinki, Finland, Sept. 8—Kaarle Heino was sentenced to 14 years imprisonment today for stealing President Juho K. Paasikivi's striped suit and overcoat.

Heino told the court he had been drinking and that he climbed a fence around the presidential palace, mounted to the roof and entered a window. He sold the suit and coat.

COTTON LOAN OKAYED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8—The government's Export-Import Bank today loaned Finland \$5,000,000 to purchase raw cotton from the United States. The loan repayable in 15 months, will carry an interest rate of two and one-half per cent per year.

Named to Head March of Dimes



E. S. Stewart

Mr. E. S. Stewart, prominent Abilene business and civic leader, has been appointed Texas State Chairman of the 1949 March of Dimes, Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, announced today.

The March of Dimes, conducted nationally each January, is the sole support of the National Foundation and its 2,890 local county chapters. Funds contributed to the annual drive pay costs of medical care and treatment for polio victims and finance the scientific research and professional education programs sponsored by the National Foundation. The 1949 appeal will be held January 14-31.

Mr. Stewart, born in Waco, Texas, has been long active in community fund raising and welfare work. A west Texas food broker for 17 years, he is now owner of the Abilene Candy Manufacturing Company. During the first World War he served overseas with the U. S. Army Engineers. Mr. Stewart is past president of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce and the Rotary Club and in 1942 and 1944 was director of the American Red Cross War Fund in Taylor County.

Mr. O'Connor, in announcing Mr. Stewart's acceptance of the March of Dimes chairmanship, revealed that when complete incidence figures for this year are tabulated the toll of infantile paralysis in the United States from 1943 through 1948 may well exceed 100,000 cases.

"While the final answer to the mystery of poliomyelitis—the discovery of a cure and a preventive for the disease—lies in the research laboratory," Mr. O'Connor said, "the generous support of the American people is now more vital than ever before if victims of polio, children and adults alike, are to receive the care they must have to achieve maximum recovery."

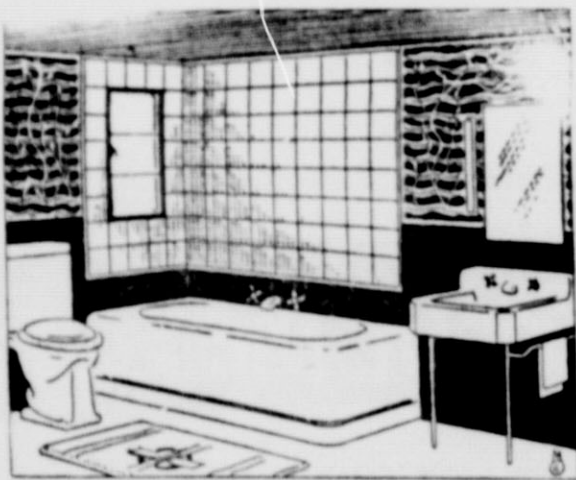
