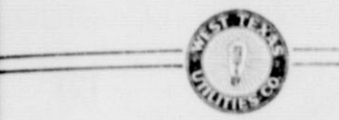

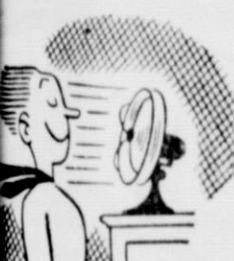


A policy of Lions International embraces large numbers of committees in order that as many members as possible will have a part in the club's activities.

### NOTICE OF COUNTY'S INTENTION TO RECEIVE BIDS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A COURTHOUSE AND JAIL AND TO ISSUE TIME WARRANTS AS PART PAYMENT THEREFOR.

SEALED BIDS will be received until 2:00 o'clock P. M., on August 18, 1948, by the Commissioners' Court of Motley County, Texas, in the Commissioners' Court Room in the Courthouse at Matador, Texas, for the construction of a Courthouse and Jail for the County in accordance with plans and specifications now on file in the office of the County Clerk, Matador, Texas.

ALL BIDS shall be addressed to Wm. Cammack, County Judge Matador, Texas, and must be accompanied by a certified check, cashiers check or bidders bond for five per cent (5%) of the amount of the bid.

SEPARATE BIDS may be submitted for (a) general construction, (b) heating and ventilating, (c) plumbing, (d) electrical, with a combined bid on plumbing, heating and ventilating permitted.

NOT LESS than the prevailing wages established by said County of Motley as provided for by House Bill No. 54, Chapter 45, Acts of the Regular Session of the Forty-third Legislature of Texas, shall be paid for labor in said construction work. A schedule of said prevailing wages is contained in the plans and specifications on file as aforesaid.

INTERESTED PARTIES may receive plans and specifications from the office of Wyatt C. Hedrick, Architect-Engineer, 904 Fort Worth Avenue, Dallas 8, Texas, upon deposit of \$25.00 to be refunded upon return of plans and specifications in good order within ten days after the date above mentioned for receiving bids.

IT IS THE INTENTION OF THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT to pay and discharge the obligations of the County incurred under contracts entered into by the application of cash on hand as the proceeds of the \$175,000 "Motley County, Texas, Courthouse and Jail Bonds", dated December 15, 1945, heretofore duly issued and sold, said cash to be employed first in payment of all obligations incurred under contracts for heating, ventilating, plumbing and electrical or any combination thereof, and second in the payment of all obligations incurred under contracts for general construction, so far as said cash available as aforesaid shall permit, that in the event said cash for general construction shall be insufficient to fully discharge the county's obligations under contract therefor, the time warrants of the County shall be issued and delivered to the general construction contractor bearing interest at the rate of not exceeding FOUR PER CENTUM (4%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually, and not exceeding the principal sum of THIRTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$30,000), payable serially, the maximum maturity date to be not later than September 1, 1968. The County guarantees that the contractor will receive face value for such warrants as and when the same are issued and delivered.

### Draft Will Not Affect Recruiting

Authority for young men without prior military service, 19 to 26 years of age, to enlist in the regular army for a 21 month period has been given by the department of the Army, M. Sgt. Oliver D. Christensen, commander of the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force recruiting station in the Motley county courthouse, announced today. Applicants must furnish written proof of age and be physically and mentally qualified for enlistment.

Upon completion of the 21 month period, each man will incur a reserve obligation to serve in the enlisted reserve corps for 5 years or to serve 36 months in any organized unit of any reserve of any of the Armed Forces if offered enlistment. However, young men may discharge their reserve obligation by extending their enlistment for one year or by enlisting in the regular Army for a period which will make his total active federal service equal to 33 months or more under such terms of enlistment as are authorized by the army.

"This authority is in addition to current regular army enlistment opportunities, all of which remain in effect," Christensen said. "Even though we have a draft law, both the army and air force will continue the voluntary enlistment program, for it is from these volunteers that we get our career men. The Selective Service Act will be used only to make up the difference between authorized strength and

the number of volunteers." Interested young men should contact the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force recruiting station at the County courthouse, Matador, Texas for full details.
