Early Bale Is Expected

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UNITED with the common bond of danger, citizens of Matador opened war at 7 a. m. Tuesday morning on an invisible enemy — the polio virus. Mobilizing every available piece of equipment, including tractors, trucks, pick-ups, plows, powerful grading machines and every able and willing individual, the drive started 30 minutes after the fire alarm was sounded at 6:30 a. m.

In a previous mass meeting held in the courthouse square bandstand Monday at 6:30 p. m. business firms had agreed to remain closed until Tuesday noon. Excepted on the closing agreement were cafes, filling stations, and others serving the traveling public. Almost without exception, every business house in Matador had from one to eight employees at work in the drive. Many firms hired extra "hand" to use forks, hoes, rakes or drive trucks.

Injured In Fall, Roaring Springs Resident Succumbs

A fractured skull, received when he fell at his home at Roaring Springs recently, resulted in the death of W. E. Ragsdale, 58, Tuesday night, August 3, about 9:30.

Funeral services were held last Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock, in the Roaring Springs Baptist Church, by the pastor, Rev. H. N. Estes, and interment made in the cemetery at Dickens, Texas. Mr. Ragsdale had made his home in Dickens county for a number of years before moving to Roaring Springs about ten years ago. He was born June 26, 1860.

Second Fog Spraying

Second fog spraying of Matador with DDT solution was completed yesterday by A. B. Booth of Floydada. Fund of \$75 to pay for the spraying was raised by public subscription.

Loads may have been removed. Others declare the estimate too low because of the large number of pick-ups and trailers racing to the refuse grounds with their loads.

J. L. Woodruff, manager of the Matador Auto Ford agency provided two large tractors which were used to pull plows and grading blades.

State Highway Department cooperated fully in providing a power mowing machine, trucks, a large power grading machine and other equipment. Large Motley county maintainer was brought into action opening alleys and grading streets that had previously been inaccessible.

Farmer D. P. Keith brought his "one-way" plow four miles into town to aid in the drive. In addition to the men and machines working in the broiling sun, almost every home in town was being cleaned of trash, weeds and rubbish.

Smoke of trash fires dotted all sections of the city. Matador city truck operated in the Negro section under the direction of John Hamilton where the colored population halted all cotton-chopping activities to aid in the cleanup. Vast quantities of trash were removed from the section.

Never before in the history of Matador had so many people contributed so much of their labor, money and equipment in a cleanup drive.

Mayor Douglas Meador called a meeting Saturday morning in the District Court room, where plans for the Tuesday drive were outlined. Placards announcing that business places would be closed until Tuesday noon were printed and distributed to business houses. Circulars announcing the mass meeting Monday afternoon to mobilize manpower and equipment and the half-day cleanup Tuesday, were printed and distributed.

Monday afternoon a special inspection committee met at the Household Supply company and with the entire seven members, made a tour of all sections of the city.

With the exception of weeds and trash, the committee cited what is believed to be the greatest disease hazards in surface toilets and open sewers, where flies and mosquitoes were found.

State Health Department representative W. D. Powers of Lubbock, was here late Friday, returning from polio-infected Paducah. He advised the general cleanup and inspection committee. As a matter of precaution and safety, the State Health Department was asked for the services of a food inspector as soon as one is available.

Bank Repair Work Almost Completed

Extensive repair, redecorating (and almost rebuilding) of the First State bank here is near completion, according to vice-president and cashier Elmer Stearns.

If workmen are able to complete minor unfinished details of the building by late tomorrow, the bank will be returned Friday night to its own building from the Fleming Post American Legion building where business has been conducted for the past eight weeks.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION amending Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a provision that the husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves all or any part of their community property, and authorizing any part of their community property to be sold or otherwise disposed of without prejudice to the rights of existing creditors the portion or interest of such spouse shall be and constitute a part of the separate property of such spouse. Further providing that such Constitutional Amendment if adopted shall be self-operative and self-executing, providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this state, prescribing the form of ballot, providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 15. All property, both real and personal, of the wife, owned or claimed by her before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent, shall be the separate property of the wife, and she shall be vested with the right of disposal of the same, in whole or in part, by her will, or otherwise, provided that husband and wife, without prejudice to existing creditors, may from time to time by written instrument as if the wife were a feme sole partition between themselves in severalty or into undivided interests all or any part of their community property, or exchange between themselves the community interest of one spouse in any property for the community interest of the other spouse in other community property, whereupon the portion or interest set aside in such partition shall constitute a part of the separate property of such spouse.

The Amendment is self-operative, but laws may be passed prescribing requirements as to the form and manner of execution of such instruments, and providing for their recording, and for such other reasonable requirements not inconsistent herewith as the Legislature may from time to time consider proper with relation to the subject of this Amendment. Should the Legislature pass an Act dealing with the subject of this Amendment, the form and manner of the execution of such instruments and other reasonable requirements not inconsistent herewith and anticipated by reason of such Act shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character and shall take effect as if passed at the time the Amendment was in effect when the Act was passed.

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State on the second day of November, 1948, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severalty or into undivided interest community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of such spouse without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severalty or into undivided interest community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of such spouse without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes for certain purposes, providing for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations; providing for submission to the qualified electors and for the necessary proclamation by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution be amended so as to be read as follows:

"Section 1-a. From and after January 1, 1951, no State ad valorem tax shall be levied upon any property within this State for general revenue purposes. From and after January 1, 1951, the several counties of the State are authorized to levy ad valorem taxes upon all property within their respective boundaries for county purposes, except the first Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) value of residential homesteads, not to exceed thirty cents (30c) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, in addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized by the Constitution of this State, provided that such taxes shall be used for construction and maintenance of Farm to Market Roads or Flood Control, except as herein otherwise provided.

"Provided that in those counties or political subdivisions or areas of the State from which tax donations have heretofore been deducted, the full amount of the State ad valorem tax for the duration of such donation, or until all legal obligations heretofore authorized by the law granting such donation or donations shall have been fully discharged, whichever first occurs; provided that if such donation is for less than the full amount of State ad valorem taxes on such property, the portion of such taxes remaining over and above such donation shall be retained by said county or subdivision."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment of Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes, provided for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment of Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes, provided for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Section 61, Article XVII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, constables, deputy constables, and precinct law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis in all of the counties in this State beginning January 1, 1949, providing for submission of this Amendment to the vote of the people of Texas, providing for the time, place and manner thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 61, Article XVII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949, and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000) according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, deputy assessors, deputy collectors of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949.

A fee earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a precinct treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Courts may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment of Section 61, Article XVII of the Texas Constitution providing that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables, deputy constables and other law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment of Section 61, Article XVII of the Texas Constitution providing that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables, deputy constables and other law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated as "Section 60" to authorize counties of the State to provide insurance for county employees; providing for the Governor's proclamation, and submission to the elector.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the State Constitution be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another Section following Section 59, to be designated "Section 60" to read as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all county employees as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties of this State and for the payment of the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workmen's Compensation Insurance for county employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workmen's Compensation Insurance for county employees."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

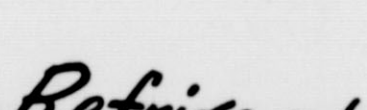

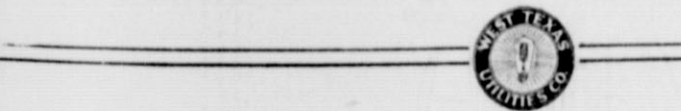

PADUCAH BOY WAS POW VICTIM OF OGIHARA BEATINGS

Charles R. Bolt of Paducah, a nephew of Mrs. Walter Clower of Matador, was one of the victims as an American prisoner of war, whom Kenichi Ogihara was found guilty of mistreating during a recent trial.

Found guilty of administering brutal beatings to American prisoners of war, Ogihara was sentenced to four years' imprisonment at hard labor by a Yokohama Eighth Army Military Commission.

Tried under charge and specifications signed by Alva C. Carpenter, Chief of the Legal Section, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, Ogihara, a former first private, was convicted of beating and abusing eight named, as well as numer-

ous unnamed American prisoners.

The accused was attached to the 58th Infantry Unit at Akita, Honshu, Japan and was detailed between November 1944 and January 1945 to serve as a guard at Sendai Area Prisoner of War Camp Number 6, located at Hanawa. Ogihara was nicknamed "Big Negro" by prisoners interned at the camp.

Numerous affidavits of former prisoners describing mistreatments they had seen or suffered at the hands of the accused were introduced at the trial. Ogihara's favorite weapon for administering beatings was said to have been a rifle butt.

According to the Paducah Post, from which the above information was gleaned, in describing a beating he received from the defendant, affiant Charles R. Bolt stated, "He beat me down with a rifle. When I attempted to get up, he beat me again and kicked me in the chest. When I went down again I made out as if I was unconscious and he walked off. Nearly every man in the prison was beaten and mistreated by Ogihara for no apparent or justifiable reason. He hardly ever beat the same man over twice. He just seemed to want to beat every man in the camp once and then leave him alone."

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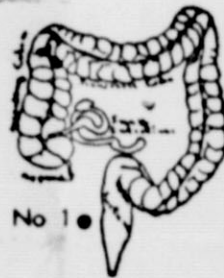

First polio case in Mobeetle was reported last week when Betty Jean Lancaster was taken to the Plainview Clinic. She was visiting in Pampa at the time she was stricken.

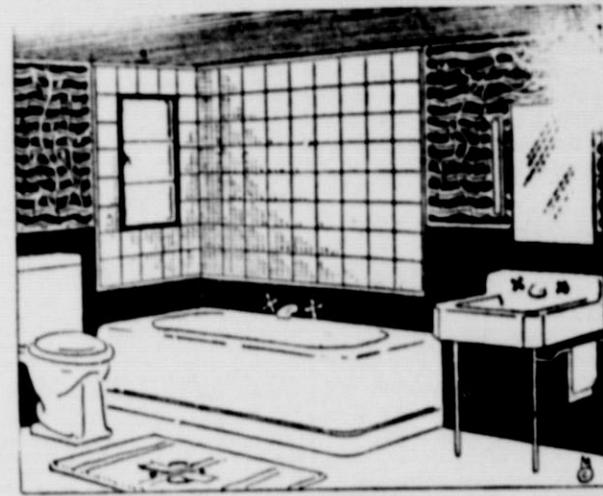

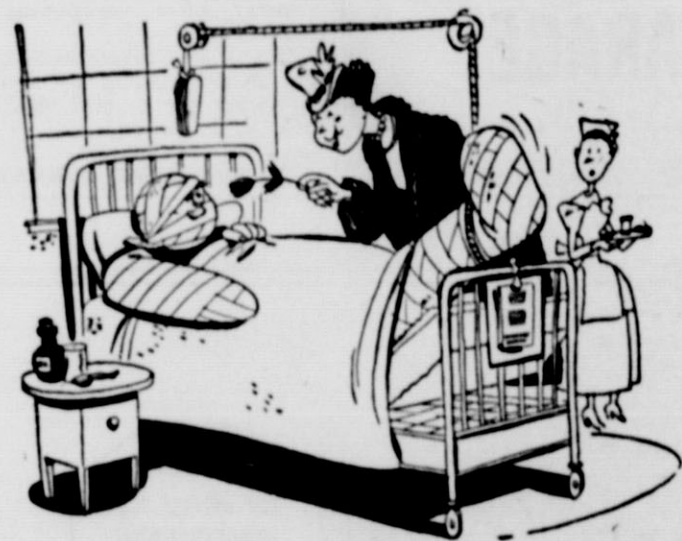
