

tor drive wheel. In order for this drive gear to function smoothly, both rear wheels and motor drive wheel must be carefully centered on their re-spective shafts. The rear wheels are easily centered by using a compass to lay out the balsa re-inforcing discs to the exact inside diameter of the cardboard box tops which form the wheels. For instance for rose, green and white chintz, use either rose or green bias tape. Use cotton thread to match this percale tape. Cut pieces of the bias trim tape the same length as the chintz strip. Fit the tape on each of the two long edges of the chintz. basic each in place. then stitch. Now fold the chintz in half lengthwise, wrong sides together, edges even. Baste these ends together.
