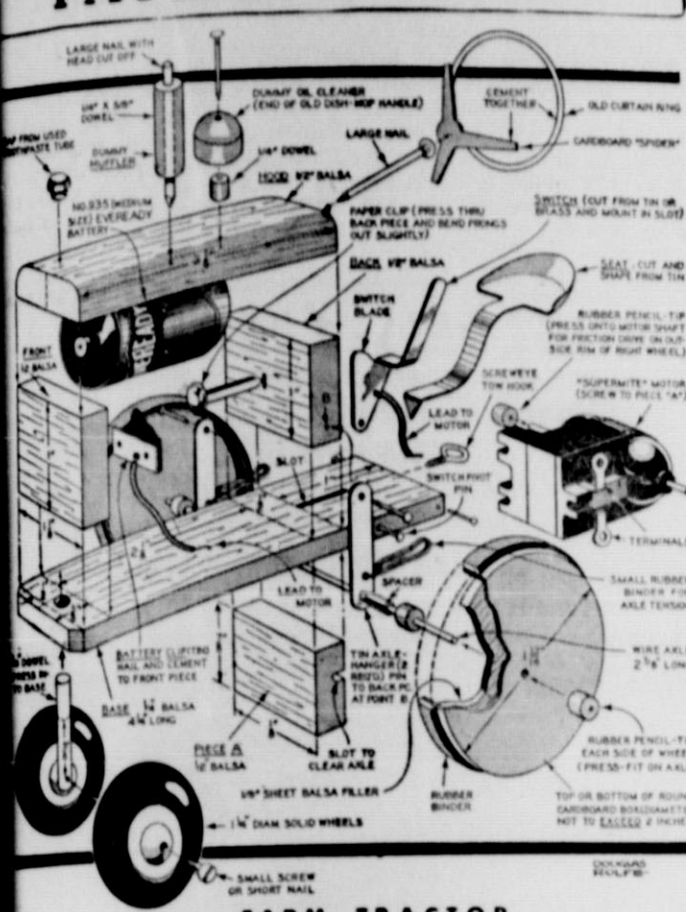




# FATHER and SON



FARM TRACTOR

Budget: Dad, \$3.00 for motor—Son, 35c for materials  
Materials may be obtained at local hobby shop.

Dear Dad:  
This little farm tractor is friction-driven and has plenty of power. The Supreme motor is operated by one No. 935 Eveready flashlight cell which fits snugly under the hood.  
Front wheels may be purchased at any model store. These wheels, of any model store, and a tube of model airplane cement (also obtainable at your local model supply store) are the only items you will have to buy for the construction.  
Start by making the body. This is composed of a base piece and four bits of 1/2" balsa. Cut all pieces to dimensions given and assemble with pins and cement.  
Now make a battery clip of spring tin or light brass. Nail and glue it to the back of the front piece taking care to place it so that it bears on the exact center of the No. 935 Eveready cell. This clip serves as one terminal point. For the other terminal, press a large paper clip through the back piece of the hood, also taking care to center it with the battery clip.  
The paper clip should project about 1/2" beyond the back piece, and the prongs out slightly so that when the switch lever is mounted in its slot the switch blade will engage the split prongs of the switch. Move forward, fasten the motor to piece "A" with 3 small screws and then hook

up motor to the front battery clip and to the switch lever. Hook-up should be made so that the motor revolves in a counter clockwise direction. The direction can be controlled by reversing the leads to the motor.  
Connections completed, slip the battery in place and try out the motor. Now remove the battery and get busy on the rear (drive) wheels assembly. A glance at the drawings will show that the rear wheels are mounted on tin hangers. These hangers are pivoted to the back piece and are pulled back by small rubber binders each side of the frame. Just enough tension is needed and no more than is sufficient to hold the right hand drive wheel gently but firmly against the rubber pencil-tip motor drive wheel.  
In order for this drive gear to function smoothly, both rear wheels and motor drive wheel must be carefully centered on their respective shafts. The rear wheels are easily centered by using a compass to lay out the balsa reinforcing discs to the exact inside diameter of the cardboard box tops which form the wheels. The rubber-tip drive wheel is somewhat harder to center on the motor shaft but it can be done properly, if care is used.

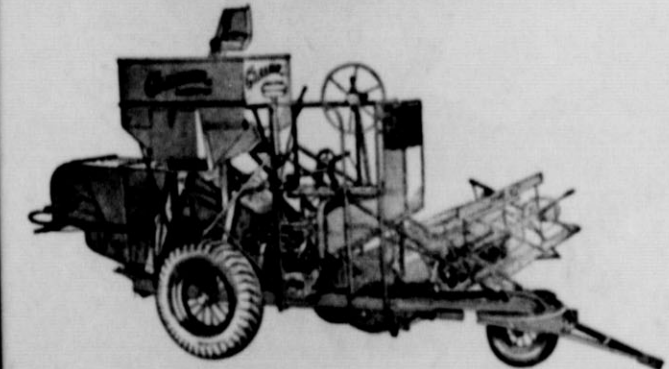

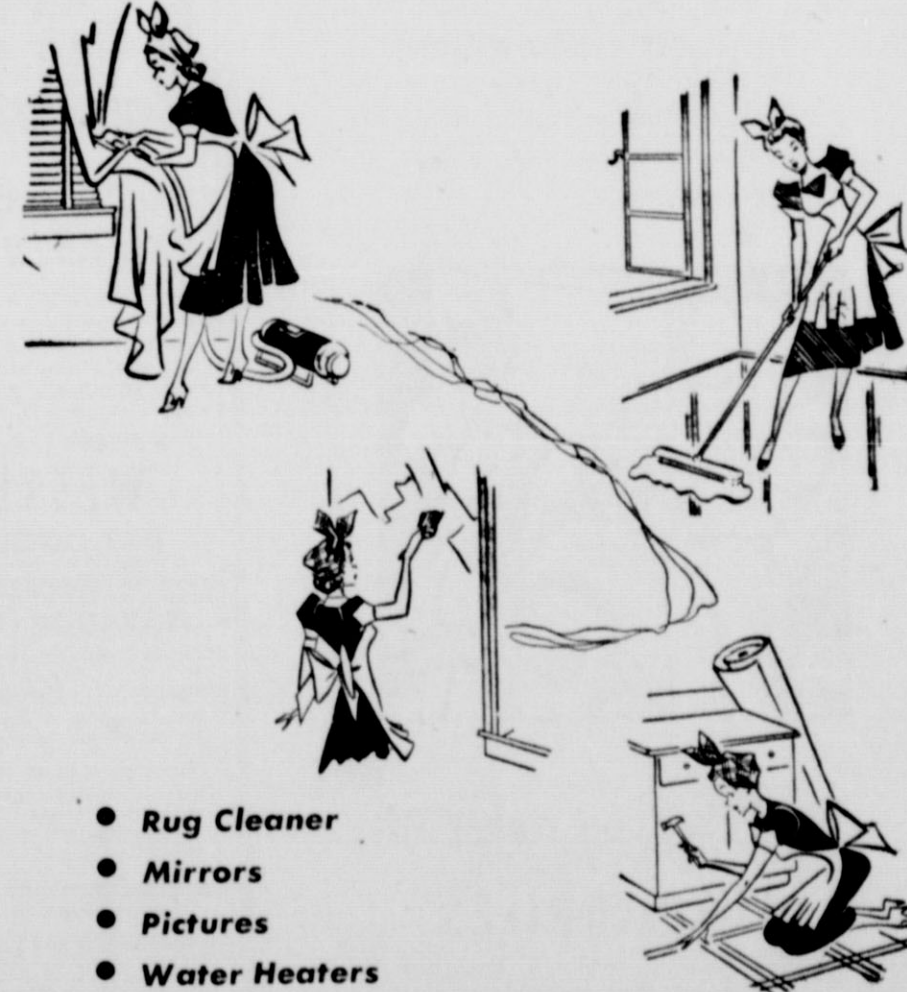

### Banana Cup Cakes



Sliced bananas show off their good looks in these tempting banana cup cakes made with enriched flour for better food value.

Fruit variety is limited at this season so let's find different ways for using the "dependables" on the market. There are more ways than one to eat bananas. For proof, we offer these cup cakes with a real banana flavor, their fluffy frosting decked with two slices of the fruit.

The cup cakes are made by the usual cake method, with the flour mixture added to the creamed mixture alternately with mashed bananas and milk. Measure ingredients carefully, sifting four times before measuring. Preserve the golden yellow of the cut bananas in the topping by dipping them in lemon or other citrus juice.

Besides good eating, the cup cakes boast of good food value supplied by the enriched flour with its protein, iron, and B-vitamins. The recipe makes a sufficient quantity to serve at a casual afternoon tea, or for after-school snack and dinner dessert.

| 2 cups sifted enriched flour | 1 teaspoon ground orange rind  |
| 1/2 teaspoon baking powder   | 1/2 teaspoon ground lemon rind |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt            | 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract   |
| 1/2 cup sugar                | 1 cup mashed banana            |
| 1/2 cup shortening           | 1/2 cup milk                   |
| 1 cup sugar                  | 1/2 cup chopped nuts           |
| 1 cup butter                 |                                |

Sift together flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Cream together shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs, mixing well. Add orange rind, lemon rind and vanilla extract. Add flour mixture to creamed mixture alternately with bananas and milk. Fold in nuts. Fill greased three-inch muffin pans two-thirds full. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 25 minutes. Yield: About 14 three-inch cup cakes.

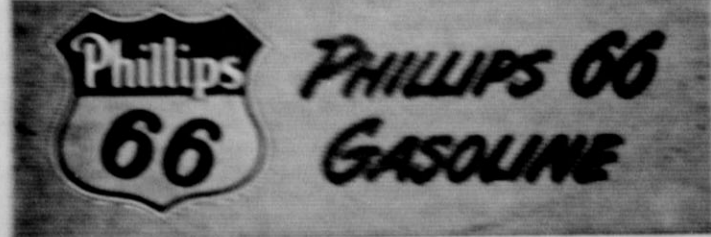

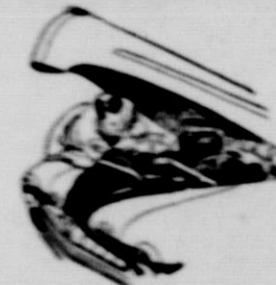

# FARM NEWS

Our County Agricultural Conservation Office

A farmer behind a desk instead of in front of it is not as uncommon now as it used to be. A good example of this change is the County Agricultural Conservation office.

The Matador County office is located at Matador. The men in charge are the farmer-committee members elected by farmers last fall and winter. Elections were held in all the farm communities in the county to name community committees and delegates to the county convention. The three farmers who administer the county agricultural conservation program were elected by the delegates.

These county committee members

run their own farms and usually are at the county office only long enough to do their required administrative work. They are paid only for the time actually spent in this work and do not draw a regular salary. Member of the committee are Delmont Hays, Chairman; Joe L. Speer, vice-chairman, and Don P. Keith, regular member.

Since the committee is not in the office all the time, Richard H. Alexander is in charge of office operations. Altha Lambert is the Principle Clerk in the office. Bill Rushing is in charge of all field operations.

A major portion of the job of the county committee is administering the Agricultural Conservation Program. The committee soon will be sending in recommendations for the 1949 program and farmers now are being invited to give their ideas to community committee members

The barbecue will be given for all exhibitors and their parents, county agents, vocational teachers, judges, superintendents and assistant superintendents by the civic clubs of Lubbock. Vernice Ford, general chairman of the Executive Committee for the show, will preside at the Tuesday night meeting.

send them to the county office. Other programs administered by the county ACP office are crop loans and other price-support measures, and other work as assigned.

Refrigeration is the secret of the new longer-wearing synthetic rubber recently announced by Phillips Petroleum Company. Phillips also supplied data showing how synthetic rubber plants could readily be converted to the manufacture of this new and better rubber. Production of low-temperature rubber is now under way in one plant and conversion at another is nearing completion.

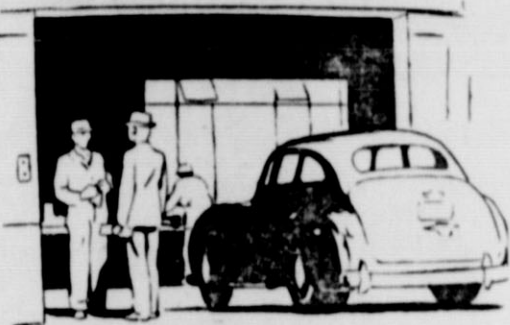

## TRIBUNE PASSES 14th MILESTONE

Fourteen years ago March 14  
(Sunday) the Tribune purchased  
the Motley County News from  
G. C. Mitchell and combined the  
two newspapers under the Matador  
Tribune masthead. The  
Tribune Publishing Company  
was then a partnership compris-  
ed of Howard Hamilton and  
Douglas Meador.

One year later, following the  
fateful drought of 1934, Meador  
purchased Hamilton's interest  
"in the indebtedness". For a pe-  
riod of several years the Tribune  
thrashed in the shallow waters  
of survival.

About 1938 the Tribune pur-  
chased the circulation, advertis-  
ing and good will of the Roaring  
Springs Reporter. Advent of war  
almost forced the Tribune to  
include a new job press, a new  
metal saw and a new steel cut  
cabinet. The public is cordially  
invited to visit the shop and of-

tion for the crucial days ahead,  
the newspaper procured the ser-  
vices of Earl McBride (who be-  
gan his newspaper career 22  
years ago with Mr. Mitchell).  
McBride had worked at inter-  
vals for the Tribune between  
the merger of the two publica-  
tions and the declaration of war.

During the war years  
Tribune started a policy of send-  
ing gratis the home newspaper  
to men (and women) in uniform.  
At one time more than 700  
copies were mailed weekly to  
every part of the world. The  
Tribune now has in its files  
more than 1,500 letters of ap-  
preciation from servicemen. Mc-  
Bride, now Tribune mechanical  
superintendent, set into type,  
most of the grim, tragical and  
heroic stories of Motley county  
servicemen on the battle fronts.

Beginning with next week's  
issue the Tribune will start with  
Volume 54, No. 1 (Volume num-  
bers of past publications have  
not been continued in the Trib-  
une). Records show that a news-  
paper has been continuously  
published in Matador since the  
spring of 1895 (probably longer).  
The Tribune is owner of these  
previous names, "Texas Maver-  
ick", "Motley County News",  
"Matador Gusher", "Roaring  
Springs News" (second Motley  
County News from G. C. Mit-  
chell in 1934) and "Roaring  
Springs Reporter". With the  
new Volume number the Trib-  
une will pick up the past years  
of Matador newspaper publica-  
tion. Despite the more impres-  
sive number "54" following the  
volume, the Tribune is a juve-  
nile among West Texas weekly  
publications. History is replete  
with lists of freight wagon car-  
goes containing plows, cradles,  
barbed wire and printing  
presses. Each had a cooperative  
part in blazing the trail of pro-  
gress into the new, rich, but  
stubborn land.

**New Steel Fixtures**  
In the attitude of pride the  
Tribune announces the installa-  
tion of new (green) steel office  
fixtures and paper-stock shelv-  
ing. Other recent replacement  
equipment since Christmas in-  
clude a new job press, a new  
metal saw and a new steel cut  
cabinet. The public is cordially  
invited to visit the shop and of-

fice of "The Home Paper". The  
Tribune is proud of the distinc-  
tion of being one of the best  
equipped small weeklies in West  
Texas.

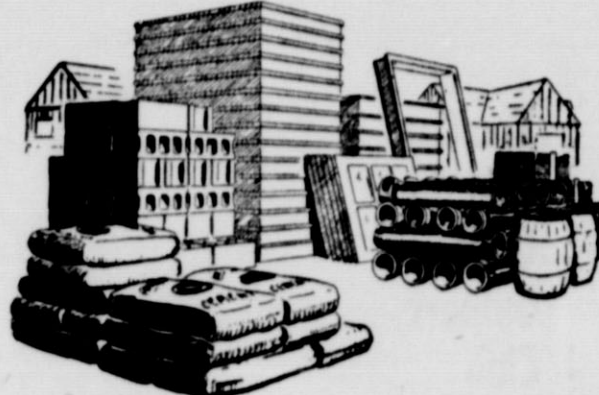
## RABIC ANIMAL DANGER CITED

According to a statement just  
released by Dr. Geo. W. Cox,  
State Health Officer, there were  
1,099 rabid animals discovered  
by laboratory examination in  
Texas last year. There were un-  
doubtedly many more rabid ani-  
mals running loose which were  
never examined. Since most of  
these animals were dogs, child-

ren are especially vulnerable to  
this dreaded disease.  
"All dogs should be vaccin-  
ated annually as a rabies control  
measure", Dr. Cox said. "When  
a child is bitten by an infected  
dog, the dog should be penned  
up for observation for 10 days.  
If he shows no signs of illness in  
that time he is not rabid, but if  
he sickens, he should be killed  
in such a manner as not to in-  
jure the brain. The brain should  
be packed immediately in ice  
and sent to the State Health De-  
partment for examination. If  
rabies is shown to be present  
there is still time to begin anti-  
rabies treatment on the child."

SAVE the beautiful ribbon binding on your fine St. Marys blankets and protect the blanket by basting a pretty chintz cover in place. You will reduce the laundering and the dry-cleaning bills and add lovely color to your bedroom decorating scheme with a blanket protector.

Make the blanket protector of chintz to match the draperies and slipcovers in the bedroom. Or make a chintz or cretonne bounce for the bed, cover the headboard and make the blanket protector of matching fabric.

**Easy To Make**  
Cut one piece of chintz twenty and one-half inches wide and seventy-two inches long. (You need two yards of chintz for this.) Buy double-fold bias trim tape to match one of the colors in the chintz. For instance for rose, green and white chintz, use either rose or green bias tape. Use cotton thread to match this percale tape.

Cut pieces of the bias trim tape the same length as the chintz strip. Fit the tape on each of the two long edges of the chintz, baste each in place, then stitch. Now fold the chintz in half lengthwise, wrong sides together, edges even. Baste these ends together, press. Bind the basted ends and across the creased top with bias trim, turning end of the tape neatly under and fastening with a stitch.

**Easy To Use**  
Slip the top of the blanket into this chintz cover. Baste the cover in place on the blanket.

### Committee Kills Oleo Tax Repeal

WASHINGTON, March 16—Butter won a 16 to 10 decision over oleomargarine today in the House Agriculture committee.

By that vote, the House group decided to pigeonhole 18 bills which had been drawn to repeal federal taxes on margarine and license fees imposed on those who sell it.

"That kills the legislation for this session of Congress," Chairman Hope (R-Kas) told reporters after the closed session. He voted with 14 other Republicans and Rep. Granger, Utah Democrat, to shelve the repealer.

But Rep. Poage (D-Tex.), an opponent of the margarine tax, declared: "The fight will go on. We are not licked yet."

He and nine other Democrats were lined up on the losing side. Poage called the decision to pigeonhole the repeal bill "political cowardice," and said the next move is up to the Senate.

Poage said there probably will be no concerted drive at present to obtain the required 218 signatures for a discharge petition. If successful, this would bring the repeal bills to the House for a vote.

The present federal taxes on margarine, in addition to the 10 cents a pound on colored, include 1 cent a pound on all margarine, \$6,000 a year on manufacturers, \$480 a year on wholesalers of the colored product and \$200 a year on wholesalers of uncolored, \$48 a year on each retailer of the colored product and \$6 a year on retailers of uncolored margarine.

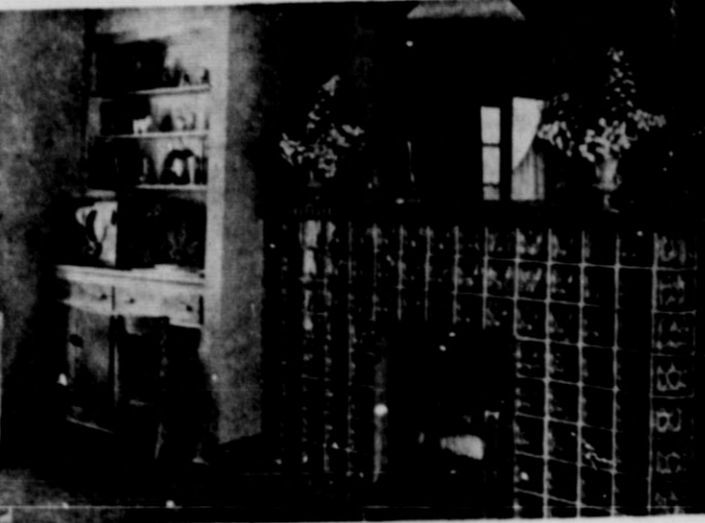

10 other oil companies had sought a permanent injunction against enforcement of a Railroad Commission order shutting down the Seeligson field in Jim Wells and Kleberg counties until flaring of gas ceased. The order was the first of its kind in the history of oil and gas regulation in Texas.

**Gas Was Used**  
Judge Roy C. Archer of 126th district court dissolved a temporary injunction and dismissed the case on agreement of both the commission and the oil companies. His action was based on the fact that Shell oil and others have erected a plan in the past year to make use of casinghead gas.

The State Supreme court previously had upheld the authority of the Railroad commission to issue a close-down order, but had also upheld the right of the district court to issue a temporary injunction against the enforcement of the order pending a hearing of the case on its merits.

Refusal of the district court to grant the permanent injunction paved the way for similar shut-

down orders by the commission in other fields where flaring continues.

An estimated one billion cubic feet of gas is flared daily at present in fields throughout the state.

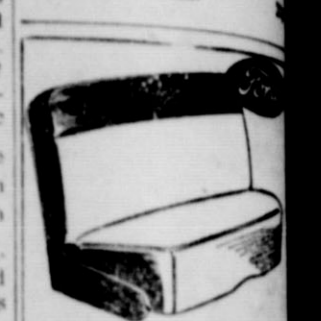
