At noon Tuesday Matador had inned 98 bales, Flomot 112 and Roaring Springs 89. Emmons said 500 pullers are needed now o gather the cotton open in Motley county fields.

Emmons said rate for pulling varies from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per 100 pounds in the field and \$1.75 to \$2 delivered at the gin. He said the State Employment ommission daily farm labor bulletins report 17 counties out of 21 paying \$1.75 in the field and \$2 delivered at the gin.

High production is reported in all sections of the county with 1-4 to 1-3 bale per acre being gathered on the first pulling.






