HOWARD TRAWEEK ACCEPTS 4-COUNTY USO CHAIRMANSHIP

County Attorney Howard Traweck Friday accepted a four-county district chairmanship for the USO fund drive to start next month. Counties in the district include Cottle, King, Dickens and Motley. Quota for Motley county is \$316. Total 1950 USO budget calls for \$12,100,000. Re-activating of USO was necessary when the present peacetime force of 1,600,000 men and women in various branches of the Army, Navy and Air Force.

Terror has often been with me like a scar which my clothing could not conceal. Frequently I have been able to hide it in the presence of my associates as an ailing man hides pain through his silence. Each year has brought its full quota of incidents but none so lasting as the night when I was five or six and stood with my father and watched the Dallam county prairie burn.

DEFOLIANT WILL BE TRIED HERE

Cotton leaf defoliant (to remove leaves to make picking easier) will be tried by the county's three Veterans' Agriculture classes, according to county agent J. R. Emmons. The three instructors, John Hunter of Roaring Springs, Varner McWilliams of Matador and Sonny Russell of Flomot have received 100 pounds of the defoliant (Aero Cyanamide) and will apply the dust on small areas of early and late cotton and cotton on sandy and tight land to give it a fair trial. The dust has proven very successful by the Lubbock experiment station according to Superintendent Don Jones. The dust will be applied at the rate of 35 pounds per acre.

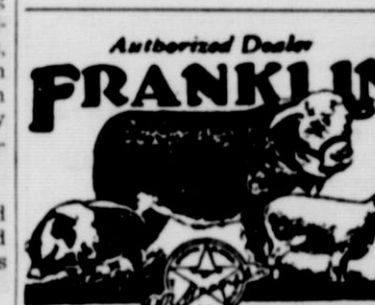

MATADOR SCHOOLS IN GOOD FINANCIAL CONDITION OFFICIAL REPORT REVEALS

Matador Public Schools ended the 1948-1949 school year in good financial condition according to a report released this week by school officials. All bills were paid and all long term obligations were paid on time. School officials also pointed to the fact that the new Butane boiler purchased last September was paid for out of current receipts rather than financing it on a five year basis as is usually the custom. Cost of the boiler was approximately \$4500.

The school received \$41,000 from local sources, \$24,812 from State and County Apportionment, and approximately \$12,000 in State Aid.

These funds were expended in the following manner during the school year: \$1,420 was paid for tax assessing, tax collecting, and in discounts to tax payers who paid their taxes early. Approximately \$46,000 was paid out in salaries to teachers of the white and colored schools and for administrative and educational

supplies. \$800 was paid out for teaching supplies and substitute teachers. Vocational agriculture expenses amounted to \$863. Janitors salaries amounted to \$2,906 while \$828 was expended for janitor supplies.

Fuel, water, lights telephone, sewer, garbage, and freight expenses totaled \$3818.00 while approximately \$3300 was paid out for building maintenance and repair. Most of the last item was made up of expenses incurred in moving and finishing up the barracks buildings which were converted into lunchroom, colored school and agriculture class rooms. \$400 was paid out for Physical Education equipment and four hundred and twenty-five dollars for materials for the libraries.

\$2855 was paid out for bus drivers salaries and the maintenance cost of buses including gas, oil, repairs and insurance amounted to \$2950. \$2014 was paid as payments on school buses and insurance payments amounted to \$153.00. Most of the school insurance is purchased on a long term basis.

Interest on short term loans amounted to \$55.20 and \$462 was paid out on long term vouchers. \$4493 was paid out in interest on serial bonds and \$5,500 was paid in payments on serial or building bonds.

School officials stressed the fact that the figures as given are in round numbers and not correct to the penny but they do present a complete picture of receipts and expenditures.

School officials expressed optimism over the prospects for a good year for the school during 1949-1950. State Aid under the Gilmer-Aiken law will amount to approximately \$27,000 and one-ninth of this has already been received. It was explained also that all of the increased State Aid was absorbed in increased teachers salaries and in making up for several thousand dollars more in local tax money that the State requires under the new law.

The Silverton game totaled \$260.75 while the opening conference game with Abernathy showed a paid admission of \$300.95, according to records of school officials.

Total federal tax for the three games amounted to \$161.29 and fees paid to game Officials amounted to \$174.20. Deducting the \$335.49 paid for tax and officials leaves a net gate of \$632.39 which was divided equally between the Matador team and the visiting teams. The Matador team must pay lights, game ball and incidental expenses out of their share of \$316.19.

Whooping Cough Vaccination Is Advised Early

Now is the time to have your baby protected from whooping cough, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The Texas State Department of Health recommends that vaccination against this disease be administered at three months of age with a booster dose of vaccine when the baby is two years old. There is many a child whose life could have been saved if he had been immunized in infancy, said Dr. Cox.

"Whooping cough", said Dr. Cox, "first masquerades as an ordinary cold, with running nose and eyes, followed by a slight cough. These symptoms develop about 1 to 14 days after exposure.
