LOOPHOLES in the Law

By WILL WILSON

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is one of a series of short case histories all taken from court records, showing how legal loopholes often enable criminals to escape punishment in Texas. Will Wilson is chairman of a special steering committee of the State Bar, which is working for revision of the antiquated Criminal Code and Code of Criminal Procedure in order to eliminate

Burglar Joe admitted that he broke into a store operated by Mrs. Fred Smith in Prairie Hill, Texas. He confessed that on September 27, 1941, he broke in the back door of the store building, entered, and stole several articles of merchandise.

Since there was no doubt of Joe's guilt, he was convicted

and sentenced to five years in the penitentiary. But on appeal the verdict was reversed. At the trial, Mrs. Smith testified that she was the wife of Fred Smith and that she lived with him at Prairie Hill, where they operated a store. The indictment pointed out that the store, at the time of the burglary, was under the control and ownership of Mrs. Smith.

The reversal was solely on a technicality involving ownership of the store. Although Mrs. Smith was operator of the store, it was community property belonging jointly to her and to Mr. Smith. In the eyes of the law the husband was the owner. The indictment charging Joe should have alleged that the husband, instead of the wife, was the owner of the property.

If the State Bar is successful in its effort to bring about revision of Texas' criminal statutes, such loopholes in the law can be closed. Under the present system too many criminals escape justice, even when there is no doubt of their guilt, breeding disrespect for the law and subjecting good citizens to constant threats from lawbreakers.

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FARMERS SPEND AT RAPID RATE, SURVEY REVEALS

PHILADELPHIA, Pa.—Farmers are outspending their city cousins despite a slight downturn from the record-breaking farm-income level of 1948, with the expectation that farm spending this year will surpass the excellent 1947 record, according to data revealed by Rural Marketing, a monthly report of farm news and trends published by

Tribune, Matador, Motley County, Texas, Thursday, Nov. 10, 1949

Country Gentleman. The facts and figures cited in support of this conclusion were gleaned from Business Week, Nation's Business, the New York Times, the Wall Street Journal and department of commerce records.

"Farmers are expected to draw extensively on their savings of more than 20 billion dollars, if necessary, in order to acquire the production and household equipment they so much desire," the report said.

Nation's Business is quoted as reporting, "Sales are slumping more in large cities than in the smaller centers."

Also quoted in this statement from Business Week:

"Most merchandisers agree farmers are spending more freely than their city brothers who have been socking a steadily larger proportion of income into savings during the past year or more."

This is especially true in appliances and farm equipment, according to a survey made by Business Week, which reports that the outlook for appliances is "brighter in rural areas than elsewhere," and that sales of hay balers, corn combines, cotton pickers and other major items now easier to buy, were playing a major role in boosting farm equipment sales and that farmers "are not tightening their purse strings any more than they have to."

The Business Week statements are supported by a news item quoted from the New York Times to the effect that one of the largest appliance distribution organizations in the country has found that rural sales are mainly responsible for increased orders from dealers. Orders in April were 15 per

cent ahead of March, the Times reported, with refrigerators, water heaters and electric ranges reported showing the greatest improvement.

It was pointed out that Business Week estimates that the rural market this year will absorb four times the dollar volume of industrial products that it brought in 1940.

It was also pointed out that construction materials and feed purchases are running ahead of last year in dollar volume.

The Wall Street Journal is quoted as predicting that "farm equipment sales stand a good chance of hitting a new high this year."—Publishers' Auxiliary.

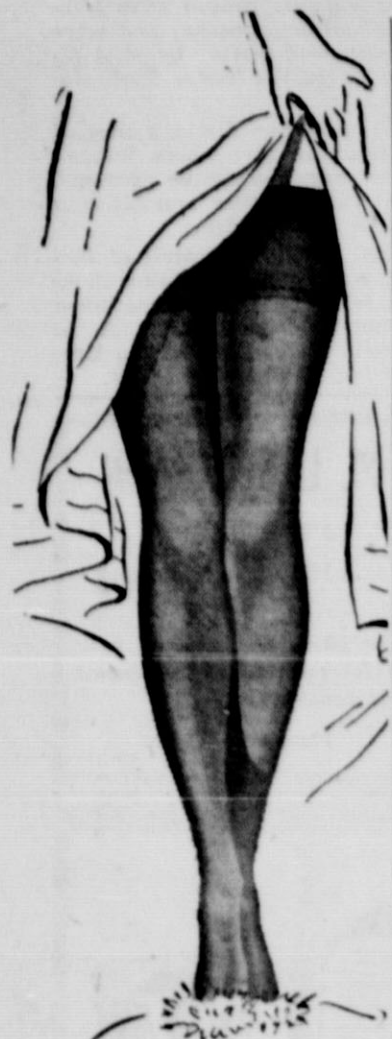
