## Assistant U.S. Attorney Promises Strong Enforcement of Campus Gun-Free/Drug-Free Laws

Assistant U.S. Attorney Tanya Northrup promised strong enforcement of federal laws designed to create drug-free and gun-free zones around schools during a visit to Motley County.

Ms. Northrup joined Motley County Independent School District Superintendent George Blanch and Motley County High School Principal Dick Van Hoose in unveiling a sign at Motley County High School on May 13, 1992, noting the 1,000-foot zone around the campus.

Ms. Northrup's appearance was part of a day-long effort by the U.S. attorney to inform educators and law enforcement officials about the new law, which took affect last year.

She was accompanied by Jennifer B. Crabtree, director of U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm's regional office in Lubbock, who read a letter from the senator highlighting the virtues of the legislation.

"Congress has basically said we want to make islands of safety at schools," said Ms. Northrup, who credited Senator Gramm for his understanding of the drug problem and hard work on Capitol Hill to put the Drug-Free/Gun-Free effort into motion.

"Phil Gramm has devoted a significant portion of his 13 years in Congress to visiting school campuses to educate students, faculty and parents about the dangers of drugs. He is convinced that America will win the drug war through the efforts of our young people who commit to make the drug-free lifestyle popular.

"I support that reasoning and am fully committed to providing these young people with an environment conducive to learning," the Assistant U.S. Attorney added.

Passed by Congress in 1990, the law makes it a federal offense to knowingly possess drugs or firearms on a school campus or within 1,000 feet of the school.

The drug conviction carries a mandatory one-year jail term if the criminal activity is committed at the school, plus any sentence the person receives could be doubled. People convicted of carrying guns on or near a campus face a five-year term and a possible \$5,000 fine.

"We will enforce the statute," Ms. Northrup said. "We will vigorously prosecute violators in federal court, and those caught with drugs and guns within the zone will serve their sentences in federal prison where there is no early parole. We take this statute very seriously."

Senator Gramm said his goal is to have a sign at every junior high and high school in Texas by the end of 1992.

"This initiative represents a significant endeavor to halt the spread of drugs and violence on to our campuses," the senator said. "I appreciate the leadership Motley County Independent School District is providing the community in fighting the drug war and in educating America's next generation of workers and leaders."

## Trail Driver's Missing Diary Focus of Search

When John Hobert Smith went up the trail in 1891, driving a herd for the Matador Land & Cattle Co., Ltd., to Montana, he kept a journal of his experiences. The diary or "way bill" required by the manager of the Scottish syndicate was referred to by J. Frank Dobie in his book THE LONGHORNS. Terse entries by the trail boss outlined such events as "StomPead" which took three days to bring the cattle back under control.

Found in a clean-up at the Matador Ranch in the mid-thirties, the diary was supposedly given to "a museum in Lubbock." However, according to Mrs. Maxell Smith of Tulia who recently donated material about John and Minnie Davis Smith to the Motley County Museum, a prolonged search by family members has failed to turn up any clues.

Although extensive records of the Matador Land & Cattle Co., including ranch managers diaries, are held by the Southwest Collection at Texas Tech, John Smith's long lost way bill does not appear.

As Minnie Smith recalled in an interview in 1937, John Smith "came to the plains in 1879, with the first Matador

cattle when he was 18 years of age...My husband was a cattle hand. Since there was no railroad, he would round up the cattle and take from 2,500 to 3,000 steers and trail them to Wyoming and Montana. He was trail boss, had to pick routes and water holes, and took eight or ten men with the herds."

"One trip started April 15, 1893, and he came back September 19, 1893." She continued, recalling her own hardships at being left behind as a young bride, "That was a long, lonesome time while he was gone. He would let the cattle fatten on the way and graze from one water hole to another water hole. They hunted and fished on the way for they went slowly with the cattle. I have heard that a few women went on the trails in the early times, but no woman ever went with the Matador cattle."

"On the trail, they always had to swim across the streams and even swam the chuck wagons too. He would let the leader, a good old steer, put in first and then the whole bunch would swim across. He had some experience in quick sand and had to dig some cattle out and even the chuck wagon sometimes."

When cattle, more prone to be restless on a cloudy night, would stampede the men would try to head off the leaders and circle them to calm and hold them. If that didn't work, the cowboys might go to bed and wait until morning to begin a roundup of the scattered bovines.

Despite the hazards and obstacles encountered along the route which covered six states and required five months of the year away from his young bride, John Smith did his work, and did it well. Earning master wages of \$100 a month, plus a bonus worth a month's pay at the end of the drive, Smith was considered well paid in an era that ordinary cowboys pulled in only \$25 a month. According to Mrs. Smith, "In all the years in driving up to Montana, he only lost a few cattle."

Despite the fact that neither the Southwest Collection nor the Panhandle Plains Museum at Canyon know of the whereabouts of the small book, family members continue to hope that it will surface and they will be able to read of their ancestor's adventures in his own handwriting, when he went up the trail to Montana.

## Matador City Council Report

The City of Matador met May 14 to hire a law firm to collect delinquent taxes and take care of other business at hand. William-Newberry, Tax Attorney of Shaw and Associates of Houston presented a 2-year contract to Title Research of delinquent taxes for the City of Matador beginning July 1.

During discussion the Mayor, Gary Lancaster, explained the last firm was dropped approximately 10 years ago, because they never filed suit for any delinquent property tax.

The City accepted the contract with one added stipulation, that the firm guarantee at least one tax sale a year. Council also passed resolution #3307 to collect 15% of delinquent tax balance for Attorney fees.

Also discussed were the following:

\* Mayor received one bid on City Audit from King, Moore, Trulove & Pharis for \$200 less than cost for '91 audit. Council accepted.

\* Mrs. Neva Reese, tenant in city rent house explained plumbing emergency on a Saturday had been repaired and several other repairs need to be done. Council elected to make these repairs, and to keep record of future problems.

\* Council read letters of complaint of danger of partially burned and abandoned house on West Dundee. Weeds and trash

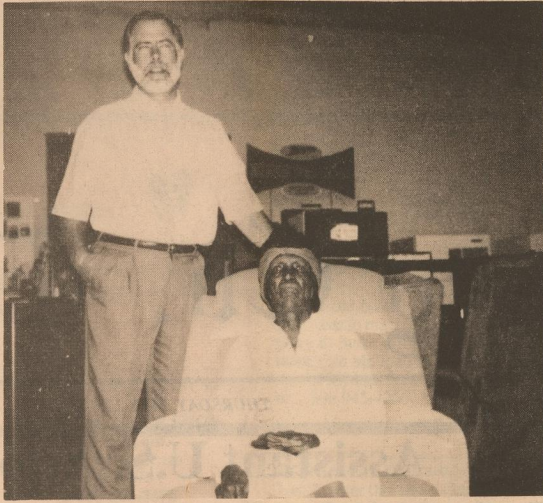

## Home Economically Speaking

### "KIDS SHOULD LEARN SAFE MICROWAVE USE..."

In today's world of convenience - working parents and latchkey kids - the microwave is a popular appliance for both parents and for their children, but one that should be handled with care.

Parents should know that severe burns and other accidents can and do occur from improper use of microwaves by children. According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, over 1,000 children under age 15 suffered severe microwave-related burns in 1990.

Making after-school snacks is a favorite pastime for many school children. Also, during the summer, some children at home alone prepare their own food.

Special packaging for kids' favorite foods, like popcorn and pizza, can get too hot for kids to handle. Steam can burn the eyes, face and hands. The inside of some foods such as donuts and pastries can reach scalding temperatures.

Safety also becomes a factor if some foods are not cooked thoroughly. Foods should be cooked properly to prevent the risk of foodborne illness.

If parents allow their children to use the microwave, especially when alone, it's a good idea to hold a training session. Kids, as well as adults, need to follow these safety rules when using the microwave:

- \* Do not allow children to use the microwave if they have to reach up to remove food from it.
- \* Use only microwave-safe cookware. Other containers are not meant to withstand high temperatures and create a potential food safety problem. Parents can mark microwave-safe utensils and containers and store in a special place.
- \* Never turn on an empty microwave

oven, and learn to use oven controls correctly. Supervised practice sessions to learn how to use controls properly are very important.

- \* Rotate food in the microwave and stir halfway through cooking if possible. This promotes even cooking throughout the food. Also, observe standing times. These are necessary to ensure thorough heat penetration.
- \* Learn to read and follow label directions. A child who cannot do so may be better off not attempting the process.
- \* Learn to use potholders safely to remove food from the microwave.
- \* Learn to avoid contact with the steam that may escape from a covered dish or container. If plastic wrap is used, turn up one corner. Also, pull plastic wrap off so that the steam escapes away from face and hands.
- \* Guard against the danger of biting into foods directly after removing from the microwave. Internal food temperatures can burn sensitive mouths. Allow the food to cool. It also may be a good idea to stir or break the food before eating.

Children can learn by doing and practicing. So, protect your child by allowing adequate training in using the microwave.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are for people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap, or national origin.

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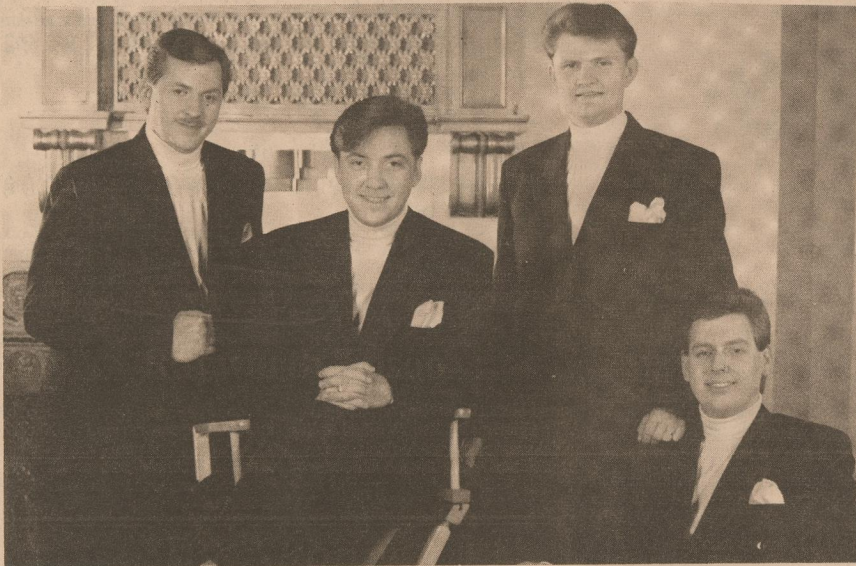
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# Childress VFD To Sponsor Gospel Music Concert and Talent Show

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
