



# Matadors, Scoreless In First Quarter, Take 33-6 Victory From Jackrabbits

## Giesecke Solves Point Puzzle

Brady Thomas' Matador Coach Faris Nelson Jackrabbits last Friday on Burleson Field and with a 33-6 victory to their second conference game.

passes which isn't ordinarily caught. Colonel got the heave off under adverse circumstances, and Wayne Timmons had to stoop rather low in order to get his mitts on the flying pigskin. High point man of the game was Stephens, who made 12 pointers. Edmondson, Nelson, and Rushing scored one tally each, and Giesecke's drop kicks earned three points. Two of the scores were made on the receiving end of Edmondson's passes. In all, it was a very satisfying contest—the Matadors were hitting on all cylinders, particularly the linemen. And with Giesecke, another name was added to the scoring list. Quarterback Bob Rushing made his first score of this season by nabbing an Edmondson-pass in the second quarter.

**First Quarter**  
Ralls' Rowell sent the game's opening kickoff to Fullback Billy Joe Stephens, who took the pigskin from Matador's 10 to their 35-yard marker. The most thrilling play of the quarter came some time later when Tailback Herbert (Colonel) Garth heaved a pass from his own 46 to Right End Wayne Timmons. The ball flew 32 yards to Ralls' 21 yard line, where Right End Wayne Timmons backed up and made the catch at shoe-top level. However, Matador lost the ball on the next play by virtue of a fumble. No scores were made during the first period, although Matador had their opponents bested by way of statistics. Matador made four first downs and Ralls was accredited with three. Matador hit Ralls' 21-yard line, and Ralls worked down to Matador's 40-yard stripe for their deepest penetration. When the quarter ended, Ralls had the ball on Matador's 40 with a fourth coming up.

**Second Quarter**  
Ralls chose to boot on this fourth down, but Center R.C. Giesecke blocked Quarterback Keith's attempt and Matador took over on their own 49. Matador then proceeded to pick up three consecutive first downs, and made a fourth when Halfback Bonner Nelson scooted around right end from the Ralls' 7 to their one-yard marker. Halfback Tom Rufus Edmondson powerhosed his way over next down. The try for extra point, a pass from Edmondson to Timmons, was no good. Stephens sent the next kickoff off to Ralls' 15-yard line and Fullback Campbell brought it back to his 30-yard marker before being nailed by Giesecke. An incomplete pass, a four-yard running gain, and a second incomplete pass ate up three downs for the Longhorns. Keith punted on the fourth down, and Bonner Nelson grabbed the ball and uncorked one of his twisting runs which wasn't terminated until he hit Ralls' 43-yard line. Nelson took the first-ball snap and shook off three tacklers to pick up a first down on the Longhorn 21. Stephens took the ball on the next down and handed to Quarterback Bob Rushing who reached Ralls' 10 for another first down.

Ralls' Heathington and Page crashed through and set Nelson back to the 15-yard line on the next play, and Edmondson was stopped at scrimmage on the second down. The ball was centered to Stephens on the third down. Stephens handed the pigskin to Edmondson, who then shot a touchdown pass to Rushing who had streaked over to the west boundary line. The pass for extra point, from Edmondson to Timmons was no good. This second tally was made seven minutes after the first. The first half ended eight plays later, with the ball in Matador's possession on Ralls' six-inch line. The Matadors had one down to pick up the six inches.

**Third Quarter**  
Ralls' chose to receive the kickoff to begin the second half of the play, and Stephens sent the boot to Keith, who was stopped on his 30 by Left End Walter Wayne Spray. Hard luck then plugged the Longhorns. Keith's lateral to Right Halfback Arthur set Ralls back on their 29. Keith's second down lateral was fumbled and the Longhorns lost eight yards in recovering the pigskin. Campbell worked his way back to the 30 on the third down.

Nelson then took Keith's fourth-down boot and eased his way to Matador's 39. Stephens took the first snap from center and made the 44-yard marker, but a five yard penalty erased the down and set Matador back on their own 39. The next running play stopped on the Matador's 45. With down number two coming up, Stephens let loose one of his galloping runs and slipped through Ralls' line, backfield and hustled 45-yards for a touchdown. It was the longest run of the game and much the same play in which Stephens streaked 66-yards for a touchdown in the Petersburg game of the previous week. Center R. C. Giesecke then made public his latest ability and put a drop kick between the uprights to boost the score 19-0. Stephens' next kick off was taken by Ralls' Keith who reached his 25. Hardluck took over on the first ball snap and Matador recovered a fumble on the Ralls' 21. Nelson took the first down snap over center for seven-yards to the Longhorns' 14. Matador went to the 11 for another first down. Nelson again took the first ball-snap and the play was good to the six-marker. But on the next down, Ralls' Howard crashed in from his left end position and set Stephens for a ten-yard deficit on the 16. Edmondson's third-down pass to Nelson was wide, but the same play on the fourth down was good for a score. Giesecke again drop kicked the pigskin and set the score up one notch—26-0. The fourth tally was made within seven minutes of the third. The third quarter ended 17 plays later, after both teams had picked up one first down each. Ralls went to the Matador's 33 yard line in penetrations and put their opponents back on their 27 by a fourth down boot once. Matador went to the 35-yard marker of Ralls for their deepest penetration. Of the outstanding plays in the remaining minutes of the third period, Giesecke's pass interception, a and Stephens' squelching of a probable long run by a Longhorn who had broken loose were the highlights.

**Fourth Quarter**  
Matador had ball possession on their own 27-yard line with two downs coming up at the beginning of the fourth quarter. Rushing used this third down to pick up a yard on a running play. Stephens then kicked and Heathington received and got to the Matador 49 before being halted by tackle Don Bradley and right guard Albert Marshall. Ralls then got hot and began a determined drive which terminated after two consecutive first downs put the ball on the Matador's 25-yard stripe. Ralls' Campbell took the first ball snap around right end to the 22, and Keith took it to the 10 on the next. It was on the third down that Keith handed the ball to Heathington, who raced around right end to score Ralls' only tally. The attempted field goal was no good, and the score stood 26-6 in Matador's favor. Rowell kicked off for Ralls, and Nelson picked up the pigskin near his 10 and worked down to Matador's 35. The Matadors worked up to their 40, were pushed back to their 38, and were forced to boot on the fourth down. Stephens' boot was good to Ralls' 40-yard stripe, but a fumble recovery by Rushing gave the Matadors ball possession. Matador picked up five yards on the first down, and Stephens broke loose with another of his line-backfield crashes on the second down and ran 35 yards for the final score of the game. Giesecke's drop kick was good, and the score was boosted to 33-6.

Later in the fourth period, Ralls began another drive and picked up two consecutive first downs. Ralls had the ball on Matador's 28 yard marker with four downs coming up when the final whistle blew.

This Friday night will be a blank for Matador High School's football team. The Department of Agriculture is urging farmers to search their farms for scrap metal to ease the shortage of scrap for producing steel. The production of farm machinery and other metal products has been slowed up by the serious lack of scrap iron and steel. Every ingot of steel is half scrap metal.

Although scrap collected from farms will not go exclusively into the manufacture of farm machinery, it will indirectly help increase machinery output. Scrap from farms can be sold to local metal dealers or to farm machinery dealers.

### Farm Machinery Priorities for Veterans:

If you're a World War II veteran who's tried every way to get new or used farm machinery and can't, then ask this office for a priority. This priority gives you first chance to buy the

kind of machinery you want from your local dealer before he sells to anyone else. On the whole, farm equipment dealers are cooperating in every way possible to help veterans get set in farming. You can get priority to buy plows, planting, seeding and fertilizer equipment, harvesting machinery, dairy machines, and tractors.

However, before you come in to file an application be sure that you have made proper arrangements for land to farm and have personal need of equipment requested. Also the signature of the land owner is required on the application at the time of filing.

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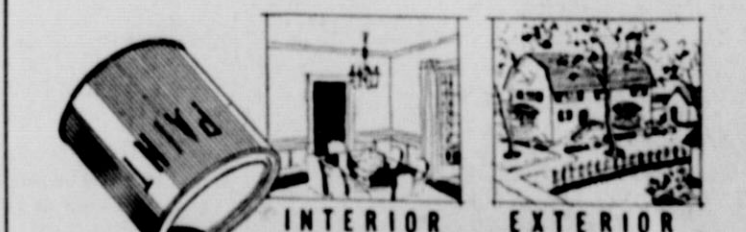
