### **New Records Show** Mistake In County "Big Yield" Report

EXCEPT for a short period over the week-end when mist and rain slowed up the cotton harvest, Motley county gins have failed to make any appreciable gain on the flood of cotton flowing out of fields. Most gin yards refilled quickly after the sun had been shining a few hours. Driver of a large cotton truck told a Tribune reporter yesterday that he had been at a Matador gin for 20 hours and that 40 bales of cotton were still ahead of his turn under the suction.

The bulk of the crop has been ginned, however, and much of the cotton now arriving at the gins is being loaded from piles in the fields. Many of the crews of pickers have already left the relax from the 24-hour operation schedule.

Combine egg whites, sugar, salt, water, and corn syrup in top of double boiler. Beat with rotary egg beater or electric beater about minute, or until thoroughly mixed.
