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\$25,000 LOSS IN COTTON FIRE SET

MORTON, December 11—High winds today were blamed for a fire in the storage yard of the Morton Co-op gin here Saturday and for a subsequent grass fire nearby.

J. T. Lilledahl, manager of the gin, said strong winds blew off the top of the gin's burr pit, caved in a side, and sent sparks showering over the storage yard starting the fire that damaged an estimated \$25,000 worth of cotton there.

The wind also caused some damage on the Slaughter Farms project six miles south of town, which is managed by Lloyd Miller. Miller reported here that a henhouse and some other buildings had been damaged by a small twister which struck in the area.

The cotton fire, which started shortly after noon, destroyed about 200 bales of cotton, and the equivalent of ten bales of unginned cotton, said Lilledahl. He said personnel at the gin had worked all day today to check damage, but that exact figures could not be released until Monday. Lilledahl said the storage yard had about 1,100 bales in it at the time of the fire.

More than 100 volunteer fire fighters checked the spread of flames shortly after 4 p. m., but it was after 9 p. m. before fire-fighting crews, using bulldozers to stir the smoldering cotton, had extinguished the last spark.

A grass fire, northeast of the gin yard, which is located three blocks north of the Morton business district, started during the afternoon from sparks from the

Uncle Sam To Use Army Of Census Takers In Texas

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—A small army of Texans will fan out over their state next April 1 to count the number of people living between the Red River and the Rio Grande.

Uncle Sam will employ 8,659 workers to do the job.

When results of their two-week survey is completed it should show the official 1950 population of Texas to be somewhat larger than the 7,532,000 persons estimated to be residing in the state last July 1.

The first federal census in Texas, taken exactly a century earlier, showed an 1850 population of 212,592. The 1940 census—they're taken every 10 years—showed a population of 6,414,824.

The increase of more than one million which Texas will show is a much greater gain than most states will register.

Consequently, Texas is expected to be allocated at least one, and possibly two, more seats in the House of Representatives. The total number of

seats in the House remains fixed at 435, so some states will have to give up a fraction of their representation.

California is expected to show the greatest gain of all states. Her population was estimated at 10,665,000 last July 1, an increase of 3,673,000 over 1940. Michigan's population went up to 6,252,000, an increase of 1,092,000 in the same period.

The new census will turn up a lot of facts besides bare population figures.

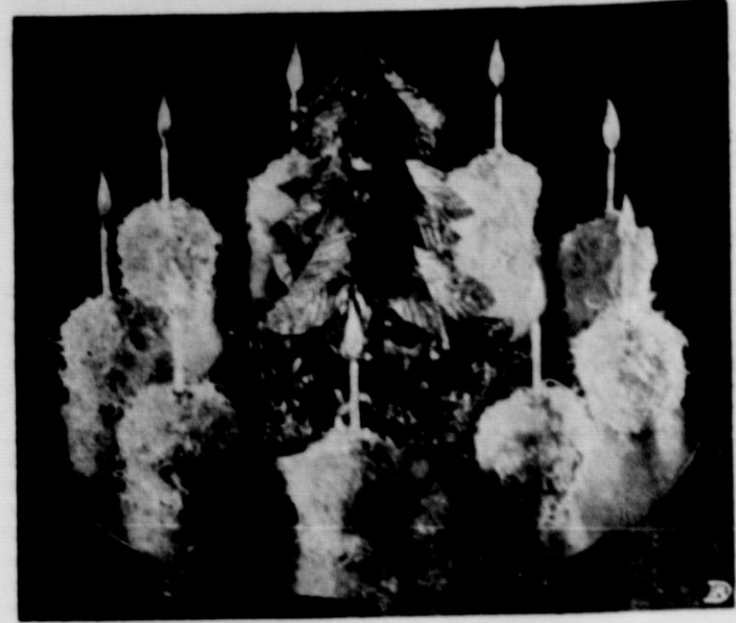
It will disclose how many Texans own television sets, still cook with wood or kerosene and how many are in debt. It will reveal such sociological data as the number who have been divorced, live on farms or in city slums. Of course, the basic questions will show the complexion of Texans as to race, sex, age and citizenship.

In order to get this gigantic nose-counting task over with, the government divides the nation up into regions, states and districts. Fort Worth is the headquarters of a census bureau region comprising Texas, Arkansas and Louisiana. The overall operations in Texas also will be centered in Fort Worth.

There will be 22 district offices throughout Texas set up to carry out the census, each comprising one or more counties. The personnel in each district will include those working in the office to handle administra-

Christmas Candle Cupcakes

1 1/2 cups sifted cake flour
1 1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup butter or other shortening
1 egg
2 eggs, well beaten
2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted
1/2 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift together three times. Cream shortening, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well; then add chocolate and blend. Add flour, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Add vanilla. Turn into greased cupcake pans, filling them about 3/4 full. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 20 to 25 minutes, or until done. Dip cupcakes in Seven Minute Frosting. Then roll in shredded coconut. Insert tiny candle in top of each cake and light candles just before serving.

Seven-Minute Frosting

1 egg white, unbeaten
1/2 cup sugar
Dash of salt
1/2 cup water
1 teaspoon light cream
1 teaspoon vanilla

Combine egg whites, sugar, salt, water, and cream in top of double boiler. Beat with rotary egg beater for at high speed of electric mixer 7 minutes, or until frosting will stand up in stiff peaks. (Stir frosting up from bottom and sides of pan occasionally with rubber scraper, spatula, or spoon.) Remove from boiling water. Add vanilla and beat 1 minute, or until thick enough to spread.

Note: For a smoother frosting, wipe down sides of pan with a fork wrapped in a damp cloth before and during cooking and beating, to prevent crystallization.

13,975,926 bales of the 1949 crop had been ginned by Dec. 1. That compares with 12,151 bales for 1948 and 10,046,013 bales for 1947.

Officials said the crop is expected to add about three million bales to the nation's surplus cotton stocks. Most of the surplus is being held by the government under its price support program.

The government already has moved to curtail production of further surpluses next year. Secretary of Agriculture Charles W. Brannan has asked growers to accept rigid production controls aimed at reducing plantings by 20 per cent in 1950.

TURKEY YOUTH DIES AS RESULT OF GIN ACCIDENT

J. N. Majors was seriously injured at the West Texas Gin, Turkey, Thursday, November 24 about 4:30 o'clock. The gin was closed down for awhile to clean the most boards. Thinking the saws had completely stopped, he started cleaning and his fingers were caught in the saws, injuring his arm to above the elbow.

He was taken immediately to Matador where Dr. Stanley advised rushing him to Lubbock. Dr. Stiles amputated the arm above the elbow. A blood clot formed while he was under the anesthetic which proved fatal.

His body was brought to Turkey for the last rites which were held at the First Methodist church, Saturday afternoon, Nov. 26 at 2 o'clock with Rev. C. W. Parmenter officiating, assisted by Rev. P. A. Powell of the Baptist church.

The body was then taken to Paducah for interment under the direction of Frank Daniel Post, American Legion, of Turkey. Ambulance service, funeral and burial arrangements were handled by McDonald Funeral Home of Turkey.

bara Harlan, Nan Berryman of Matador, Lorene Setliff, Bobbye Iola Christian of Amarillo. Jasper Newt Majors was born January 29, 1928 at Paducah, Texas. He died Nov. 25, 1949 at 12:20 a. m. in the Lubbock Memorial hospital at the age of 21 years, 9 months and 25 days.

He made his home in Turkey the past seven years, farming with Doc Williams the past three years and working at the West Texas gin.

He united with the Dunlap Methodist church when he was 12 years old.

He entered the U. S. Army Ground Forces Anti-Aircraft in 1946 and served about a year. He was stationed at Fort Bliss, Texas.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Majors of Paducah; 5 sisters, Mrs. Ernest Rogers of Vernon; Mrs. Emma Lou Burns of Vernon; Mrs. Doc Williams of Turkey; Mrs. Jack Seals of Lefors, and Shirley Ann Majors of Paducah; three brothers, Jim of Turkey, Nelson of Paducah and Cpl. COTTON CROP AT 16 MILLION BALES

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The Agriculture Department today estimated this year's cotton production at 16,034,000 bales, largest in 12 years.

The department said the crop was 510,000 bales larger than estimated last month.

The crop is the seventh largest in history. It will provide far more cotton than needed to meet domestic and foreign demand during the marketing years.

It compares with last year's output of 14,868,000 bales and average production of 11,306,000 bales during the previous ten years.

The yield of cotton lint was estimated at 285.8 pounds per harvested acre, and the previous 10-year average of 254.0 pounds. Abandonment was estimated at 17 per cent of the 26,380,000 acres in cultivation July 1.
