

The required six quarters of work may have been done at any time since the law went into effect in 1937 and can be from either steady work or scattered jobs with several different em-

One effect of the changes, Hutton pointed out, is that a large number of workers, many well past the age of 65, who were not eligible under the old rules, may now qualify for payments. The majority have already filed applications, but Hutton is certain that there are many in the Lub bock area who have not filed claims and are losing payments. "We can make back payments for only 6 months," Hutton said, "so that a claim filed now will
