A HEREFORD STEER won the Grand Championship award here Saturday in the 32nd annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show. The steer, from the W. E. Burselon herd, was shown by Berry Bostick and weighed 922 pounds. Floor price on steers was 35c and premiums included \$300 over market price in bids by W. E. Bostick and Green Bostick, \$50 by Kinder of Floydada, and \$25 by Ralston-Purina of Lubbock. Berry Bostick is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Bostick of Matador.

In the rabbit division, 1st place doe was shown by Kellie Taylor, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Taylor of Matador. Reserve Champion buck was exhibited by Kay Phillips, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Grady Phillips of Matador.

Charles Martin, Matador, exhibited the 1st place open gilt, the only swine breeding class entered. A trophy was presented by Eternas Study Club.

In addition to winning the Grand Champion steer award, Berry Bostick also won the showmanship award in the beef division. Gerald Jackson won the award in the swine division. Show halters were presented by the Plains Production Credit Association.

Berry Bostick also received a trophy in the breeders heifer class. The trophy was presented by the American Legion. Guy Campbell of Matador was presented a trophy by Bob Stanley Pharmacy and David Boykin of Northfield received a trophy presented by Floydada Seed and Delinting Co. The steer trophy was presented by the VFW, the market hog trophy by Wylie Petroleum, Floydada and the rabbit trophy by Matador Auto Co., Matador.

Returns total was \$9,716.83. The 18 steers, 20 heifers, 38 hogs and eight rabbits were placed (steers and heifers) by Billy Roach of Snyder, hogs by Milton Mann of Clarendon and rabbits by Jerry Slaton of Patton Springs, who also judged the showmanship. J. C. Cross served as announcer.

Prominent auctioneer Ken Roseman of Lubbock served during the auction for premiums above floor bids. The auction total was \$2,130 and sale of the 18 steers and 29 market hogs brought \$6,980.78. The Motley County Farm Bureau provided additional money for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place animals in steer, market and breeding hogs classes. Additional prizes were provided by "Doc" and Harold Campbell for 1st and 2nd place rabbits. The show was opened by a women's choral group who marched through the audience to the stage, singing campaign songs. The group included Mesdames Pat Seigler, Dean Turner, Vann Francis, Robert Darsey, Charles Johnson and W. F. Jacoby.

## P. A. (Bud) Simpson Is Victim of Crash

A PROMINENT rancher and farmer of the Northfield community and member of a pioneer family, P. A. (Bud) Simpson, 72, was killed instantly at the intersections of U.S. 83-42 and 287 in West Childress, at 2:28 p.m. Friday.

Mr. Simpson was driving north across U.S. 287 at the west edge of town when his pickup was struck by a tractor-trailer, driven by Jimmy Bowen of Houston.

He was knocked from the pickup and struck by the tractor-trailer, according to reports. Bowen was not injured.

Paul Augusta Simpson was born November 6, 1899 in the Northfield community, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Ben F. Simpson, among the first arrivals in the community. He was married to Miss Mollye Bourland, May 2, 1931, in Quitaque. In 1930 they moved to property in Hall County, which was still in the Northfield area and adjoining this county.

Mr. Simpson, who was known by his friends and acquaintances, as "Bud" was en route to visit his brother, A. B. (Bake) Simpson, a patient in the Childress General Hospital, when the accident occurred. His death on March 24, was the first highway

fatality of the year in Childress County.

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Sunday in the Northfield School Building and burial was in the Northfield Cemetery by Newberry Funeral Home.

Officiating the memorial service were Travis Boyd, minister of the Ropesville Church of Christ, Rev. Nathan Mulder, pastor of the Northfield Baptist Church and Sam McKnight of Lubbock, minister of the Northfield Church of Christ, of which Mr. Simpson was a member.

He is survived by his wife; two sons, Billy Paul Simpson of Northfield and Gayland Simpson of Midland; one brother, A. B. Simpson of Northfield; one sister, Mrs. E. M. Timmons of Northfield and two grandchildren. Serving as pallbearers were Rush Timmons, Delmont Hays Clem Timmons, W. J. Boykin Allan Thomas and Johnny Thomas.

Miss Ann Timmons, Matador senior and Fifth Vice President of Area I FHA, introduced the group on stage during the morning session.

Recognized and presented with Honorary Membership certificates at the afternoon session, were Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Meador, Tribune publishers. Others honored with honorary membership were FHA sponsors and school officials in the area.

Keynote speaker for the Saturday session was Dr. Gerald Mann, pastor of First Baptist Church in Hereford, who cautioned the delegates to "Be sure you choose the right dream," as he emphasized the FHA theme, "Decisions for you in '72."

The youth of America, he said, has three options in choosing the right dream. "Youth can choose the fantasy world of believing that this nation has done no wrong — a view shared by members of the extreme right, or they can choose the view of the extreme left which results in a national nervous breakdown," he declared.

"This nation is in the adolescent

stage of development. Ideals and myths have been shattered. We no longer believe the extreme right who say that the nation has never committed an act of aggression or broken a treaty. Nor do we accept the views of the extreme left who say that past policy has been completely wrong."

Urging the girls to commit themselves to the third dream or "the middle of the road," he said that "we must recognize our limitations" and stop playing "godfather" to the rest of the world.

"The middle of the road will require more courage and commitment than either the right or left. Know the national and personal limitations and accept them," he said. "Commit yourself to know yourself."

The two-day meeting, Friday and Saturday, March 17-18, was attended by approximately 3,000 Future Homemakers, their sponsors and guests.
