One of Motley county's most valuable crops is in peril because of inadequate number of cotton pickers (pullers). Hundreds of fields are white with high-costing and valuable cotton and harvest hands are becoming almost impossible to obtain. County Agent Rufus Emmons said yesterday that the Latin American labor is going to the irrigated area of the Plains where crops are better despite the fact that lower prices are being paid. He said prevailing prices on

the Plains are \$1.50 and \$1.75 per 100 pounds, delivered to the gin, while average price in this county is \$2.25.

"The prospect for any improvement in the labor situation is not very bright." Mr. Emmons declared. He said at least 40 crews are needed now by farmers in the county.

Anyone whose net earnings from self-employment are \$400 or more in a taxable year is "covered" under the new law, unless the earnings are derived from the operation of a farm or the practice of an excluded profession. Among those excluded, are doctors, dentists, veterinarians, full-time practicing public accountants, professional engineers.
