

Matadors Drop Game to Paducah 6-0; Tie Ralls, Crosbyton for Fourth Position

Matadors Stymied On Paducah's Four

Last Thursday's Thanksgiving game with Paducah was as evenly a matched game as the Matadors have played this season. Both teams made serious threats, and both stiffened up when their opponents were pounding at the goal line. However, the Paducah Dragons were a little more serious in their threats and got a little stiffer than did the Matadors.

Three costly fumbles from the over-eager Matadors was probably what turned the tide in Paducah's favor. Nevertheless, and in spite of the 6-0 score, the Matadors came up with some sparkling plays—but so did the Dragons.

Halfback Billy Joe Stephens broke loose for three spectacular runs. One was a 20-yard sprint, another was good for 19 yards, and the third, though only good for 12 yards, looked plenty good from the sidelines.

Colonel Garth had trouble with his passes, but he nabbed two Paducah passes, either of which might have boosted the score. The Dragons generally sent their pass receiver far behind the Matador defense. Bonner Nelson broke up one sure-

fire pass on Matador's 2-yard line.

It was these passes, fumbles and Paducah's Joe Sandlin which did the Matadors in.

Other Matadors Shine
R. C. Giesecke broke up two passes, and with Albert Marshall threw the sparkplug Sandlin for a six yard loss on one play. Marshall soloed on a Paducah loss when he nabbed Sandlin for one 10-yard loss.

Tackle Norman Spray and Guard John Houston Irwin averted another Paducah touchdown when they nabbed Paducah's Gorlyn Lee just after he had intercepted a Matador pass.

From the Paducah side of the field there were constant complimentary remarks on the offensive playing of "that number 11." Those Paducah fans who thumbed through their programs found that number 11 was Bob Rushing, who really went to town on offense.

Misled were the services of Halfback Tom Rufus (Slasher) Edmondson and Hal Courtney. Edmondson was kept out of the game by a back injury and Courtney is still nursing a bum leg. But James (Pup) Price, James White and Wayne Timmons helped to nullify the loss by good offensive and defensive play.

In the matter of statistics, Paducah had a slight edge over the Matadors. All five of the Matador passes were incomplete but the Dragons completed three of their 14 attempts (one good for a touchdown), and intercepted three Matador passes.

Paducah picked up eight first downs and the Matadors picked up five, but one was cancelled by a penalty Matador was penalized for a total of five yards and the Dragons lost 80 yards thru penalties.

As far as Matador is concerned, it was three costly fumbles which turned the tide against them. All were in Matador territory. One was on the 28, another on the 12 and the other on the 35. It was from the 12 that the Dragons recovered and began their touchdown trek. In all, Matador fumbled four times and recovered only one of their drops. Paducah also fumbled four times, but in all cases recovered the ball themselves.

Paducah's Drive
Paducah's quarter back, Joe Sandlin, began the game with a kickoff which bounded over the goal line. Matador consequently took over on its own 20 and was held to the 25 before Halfback Billy Joe Stephens got off a punt which died on Matador's 40.

Paducah then took over but lost ball possession near Matador's 30 after completing four downs.

Matador's first play from this point ended in one of three costly fumbles which occurred during the first half. Paducah recovered and began play on Matador's 28.

Fullback Lynden Tatom streaked to Matador's 18 on the first ball snap for another Paducah first down. Tatom took the next ball from center and again dashed for a first down—this time to the Matador 8. Matador stiffened and the Dragons were unable to go beyond this point.

Halfback Herbert (Colonel) Garth took the first play from this point, handed to Stephens, but the play netted only two yards. On down two, Colonel was jarred loose from the pigskin and Paducah's left end, Gorlyn Lee, recovered on the Matador 12.

Paducah's next play resulted in the only score of the game. Sandlin took the snap from center, faded back and shot a touchdown pass to Halfback Royce Latimer. Sandlin's attempt at the extra-point place kick was no good.

Matador's Drive
Matador's only serious scoring threat began late in the final quarter shortly after Colonel Garth intercepted a pass thrown by Sandlin. The Matadors took over near the 50 yard line.

An incomplete pass ate up the first down, and a 15 yard Paducah penalty killed a Paducah pass interception on the second down. Thus, the Matadors took over on Paducah's 35.

Stephens took the ball from Colonel on down one and picked up a yard, and Halfback Bonner Nelson picked up eight on the second down to place the ball on Paducah's 28.

Stephens got another first down for Matador on the next play, an eight yard gallop to Paducah's 20. Colonel handed to Nelson on the next play and the Dragons stopped the gain down to one yard.

At this point Paducah received another 15 yard penalty and the ball rested on the Dragon's four yard stripe. It looked as though the Matadors were on their way for a score, but it was as close as they got to the Paducah goal.

Rushing was held to scrimmage on the first down, and Paducah's left guard, Billy Holley, crashed through the line and took Stephens for a 11 yard loss on the next play. Center Rudy Rochelle halted Stephens on the 11 on the next play, and the Matadors lost ball possession on the next when a pass from Colonel to Rushing was incomplete.

The game ended approximately five minutes later.

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Nelson Nabs Most Of MHS '46 Scores

Coach Brady Thomas' Matadors went down in a 6-0 defeat before Coach R. N. (Stormy) Davis' Paducah Dragons at Paducah on Thanksgiving and threw the District 4-A Conference into a three-way tie for fourth position.

Matador was trying to wind up with a third-place tie with the Dragons, but the Dragons came off the best and ended up the season as the only team on the third place perch.

Matador tied for fourth place with Crosbyton and Ralls. Crosbyton snipped Matador 19-12 and Matador whipped Ralls 33-6 earlier in the same season. (See tables at end of story.)

Nelson Is High Point Man
Halfback Bonner Nelson ended this season as the high point man for the Matadors in conference play. Nelson copped 49 points, including 19 points in the Lockney game—the greatest number of points racked up by one player in any of the Matadors' conference games.

Next in conference scoring for the Matadors is Halfback Billy Joe Stephens with a 34 point total, and Halfback Tom Rufus Edmondson trails Stephens by only four points. Quarterback Bob Rushing chalked up six pointers, and Center R. C. Giesecke nabbed four points.

Of course, many points accredited to other players were results of pass heaves by Edmondson.

Matadors Best Opponents
In conference play the Matadors accumulated 123 points to their opponents' 108 marks. Counting the two non-conference games, played with Turkey and Quitaque earlier in the season, the Matadors bested their opponents by 217-108. All scoring against the Matadors was, unfortunately, in conference play.

Also considering the two non-conference games, both Stephens and Edmondson beat Nelson's individual scoring record for points earned in one game. Edmondson got 24 points in the Turkey game, and Stephens earned 24 in the Quitaque affair. And it was in the Turkey contest that Guard John Houston Irwin picked up two points by virtue of effecting a safety.

The high point man for all games, counting the two non-conferences, was Edmondson, with his 72 points. Nelson's 67 points came next, and Stephens' 66 was third. Giesecke got his four points and Rushing picked up his six in conference play.

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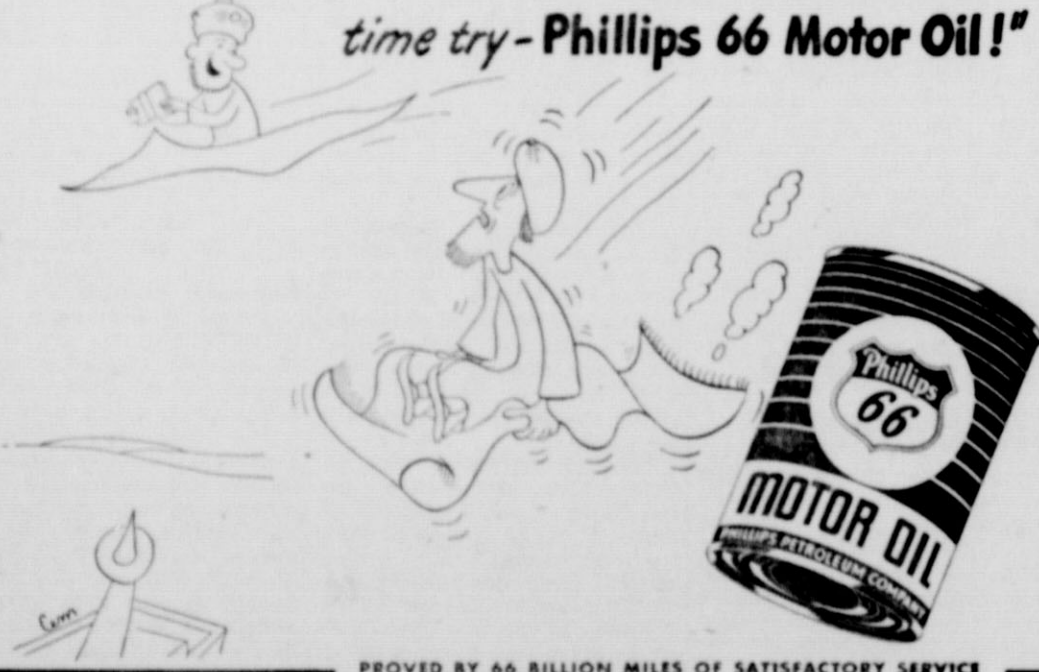

ANNUAL CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE TO BE AVAILABLE TO MILITARY PERSONNEL

The 40th annual Christmas Seal Sale which opened Monday No. 25th will carry a life-saving Christmas tradition not only into Texas homes but to all military installations in Texas. In a letter to Pansy Nichols, executive secretary, Texas Tuberculosis Association, General Jonathan M. Wainwright yesterday endorsed the State-wide campaign for funds to combat tuberculosis, and declared that Christmas Seals would be made available to military personnel throughout the State. "The purchase and use of the Christmas Seals has become an institution in this country of ours," General Wainwright said, "and I would like to have you know that your efforts in raising funds through the sale of seals for use in the control tuberculosis has my wholehearted

endorsement. "It has come to my attention that over 17,000 members of the armed services had to be discharged during the first three years of World War II because of tuberculosis. I know from personal experience of many occasions during the war when 17,000 men could have influenced a battle decisively. "In these times it is most important that the preservation of good health and the treatment of disease receive proper emphasis in conjunction with other measures of preparedness presently being advocated by those who realize the necessity for a strong United States. "I am certain you will find the commanding officers of the several posts, camps and stations within the Fourth Army Area very happy to cooperate with you in any way they can in promoting the sale of Christmas Seals to military personnel. "You have my best personal wishes for very successful drive. If I can be of any assistance, please call upon me," he concluded.

According to a recent report by the Texas Tuberculosis Association, activities of the National, State and County tuberculosis Seal Sale funds, include education of special groups and the general population, case-finding, operation of clinics, nursing services, rehabilitation, personnel training, cooperation with the medical profession in tuberculosis work and financial support of medical research. Ninety five cents out of every dollar raised in Texas fights tuberculosis within the State, and five cents is sent to the National Tuberculosis Association to support the services which it performs on a nationwide basis to further the campaign against the disease.

For eight years now the Texas Safety Association has been asking motorists not to kill themselves. That works with some people, but others apparently attach little value to their continued existence on this earth. To those drivers the Association now is offering a more cold-blooded idea, if you don't value your life, think of your car! MATHEMATICAL WIZARD STILL NIMBLE AT 79

Paris—At 79, Jacques Inaudi claims to be still the mathematical mental wizard who once confounded the French Academy of Sciences with his rapid-fire mental calculations in 1892, beat twenty-seven different makes of calculation machines in a speed test in America and was received by heads of state, including Edward VII.

Pattering around in the flower garden of his small suburban house at Champigny, Inaudi recalled that he only learned to read and write when he was 30 years old, after he had been brought to Paris to be seen by Paul Broca, the great brain specialist.

Born of poor parents in northern Italy, Inaudi says he became interested in figures at

the age of 5, when he developed a mania for counting everything after his mother died and his father brought him to France. At 13 his genius for mental reckoning made his an attraction at a Marseille cafe where he worked as busboy.

Inaudi asked to be given a figure to prove he was still spry in mathematical acrobatics. Given the number 627,318, he announced, faster than the results could be taken down that its cube was 246,867,118,312,401,432, or enough to make any national debt look like pin money.

Inaudi suggested it should be checked on by the public "to give the readers something to do." All it requires, he said, is 108 individual multiplication operations and adding up 120 different units in the results.

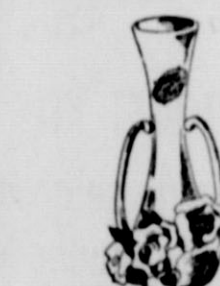
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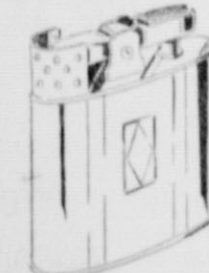
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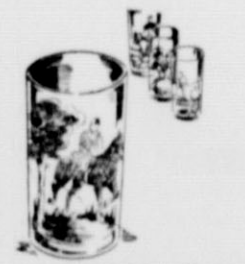
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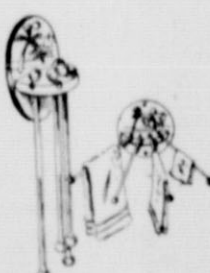
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MARCH DATES SET FOR S.P. JUNIOR FAT STOCK SHOW

GOVERNOR WANTS STATE TO BUY BATTLESHIP

AUSTIN—Governor Coke R. Stevenson will recommend to the next regular session of the legislature that it provide for the acquisition and berthing of the battleship Texas as a state monument.

The only hitch to acquiring the old battleship is that of providing funds for its berthing and maintenance, the governor said. Estimates of the cost of berthing the vessel have ranged from \$40,000 to \$130,000.

Annual maintenance has been estimated at \$18,000 by Russell Waite, director of the port of Houston.

The governor conferred with a committee from the Sons of the Republic of Texas, headed by Lew Kemp of Houston and James Shaw of Austin, about acquiring the ship.

The Texas is now tied up at Norfolk, Va., and has been out of service for some time, the governor said. The navy is ready to convey the ship to the

state as soon as a means can be provided to receive it.

A plan long under discussion is for the battleship to be berthed permanently in a slip on the Houston ship channel adjacent to the San Jacinto battleground. Excavation for the slip will be the largest cost of berthing, unless it is decided to embed the vessel in a concrete base.

Funds for the berthing cost could be raised by popular subscription, the governor said, but he thought that all of the people of the state should participate through the use of public funds.

There was the possibility that once the ship is permanently berthed, that visitors fees would provide enough for annual maintenance, the governor thought.

Colored Women's Legion Post Is Chartered

CHICAGO — The first all-women's colored American Legion post has been chartered here. It is composed of colored World War II service women.

The new post has been designated as the Pallas Athene Post 1103 according to Department Adjutant William C. Mundt. It has 15 charter members. Grace B. Prettyman is post commander.

This raises the number of women's posts in The American Legion to 145 of which 84 are World War II posts.

Bernhardt advocated organization of current events discussion groups in social science classes to help students develop a perspective of world affairs. A serious lack of information on important historic and current events, as shown by recent sur-
