

Fighting to prevent the spread of polio and other diseases. Matador will make war next week on flies, mosquitoes and other insects in a complete DDT spraying of every street and alley in the city. C. A. Booth of Floydada will provide the equipment and DDT spray under a contract made here Tuesday.

Mr. Booth had previously made a survey of Matador and offered to do the complete spray job for \$75, useing his own equipment and chemicals. The spray machine provides a dense cloud of DDT fog. The mixture is harmless to all animals (including human beings and fowls. It only destroys insects (including bees)
