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
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

would be impossible in some instances. For example, the bill

states that only nursing homes "having arrangement with a hospital" are eligible to be in the program. Fewer than 1500 of the nation's 25,000 nursing homes could qualify. In

some states only one or two nursing homes would be eligi-

ble for the program. This certainly would not offer free choice of nursing home to many elderly. In fact, it obvious-

ly would be difficult for a patient to get into a nursing home if fewer than 1500 in the nation would be eligible un-

der the Medicare plan. Furthermore, to qualify for Medi-

care coverage, the patient would have to be transferred to




