New Building Is Constructed For Father-Son Partnership



Cleaning business is a family affair with E. A. Day, left above, and his father, R. A. (Riley) Day, right. Mrs. Day, who has been working in a cleaning shop most of the time since 1919, is not shown with her son and husband.

Riley Day has been in the cleaning business for 33 years. His first shop was a partnership with Malcolm Morriss, in building now occupied by Barkley cotton office. His first experience with equipment was a "gooseneck" (22 pound) iron heated over a gasoline flame. Short-

ly after the business was established (in 1914) Day purchased Morriss' interest. When son E. A. Day entered the armed services March 6, 1943, Mr. Day had retired to his farm. Discharged December 2, 1945, (he was overseas 2 years, 2 months and six days) son E. A. and his father began plans for a new cleaning establishment in Matador. On April 1, 1946, they started work on a new building located on highway 70, one block east of Main street. The building was completed, new equipment installed and Day by Day Cleaners opened for business on Labor Day, September 2, 1946.
