Four Plane Victims Found Near Matador

WRECKAGE arrived in a blinding rain for three passengers and the pilot of a light plane Thursday morning, October 28, in the shinnery-studded Red pasture of the Matador Matador about 28 miles southeast of Matador. The wreckage was found until Monday morning.

Report of the find ended an extensive search which had extended over a vast area following the route. The plane apparently disintegrated on striking the sandy slope about one half mile inside the Dickens county line. The wreckage was almost in the northeast corner of Dickens county where three other counties join (Motley, Cottle and King).

First arrivals viewed a scene of tragic horror. Pieces of human flesh and parts of the plane were found over a wide area surrounding the crater where the engine plunged into the sand. It was as if the plane and its four passengers exploded upon striking the earth. Only small pieces of clothing were found.

Voters Approve Sewer Bonds Fifteen To One

Landslide of votes by Matador taxpayers Monday approved the proposed \$85,000 water improvement and sewer-purchase bonds by more than fifteen to one. Although only 117 voters went to the polls, both propositions carried almost solidly (voters were asked to vote for or against both propositions). On proposition 1 (water works improvement) 111 voted for and 6

against. On proposition 2 110 voted for and 7 against. In meeting Wednesday night the council ordered an issuance of the bonds through Clarence R. Hendricks and Murry W. Moore investment securities firms. It is expected the bonds may be approved by the Attorney General in two or three weeks.

One of the first acts of the council following the canvassing of the vote was to establish lower sewer rates when the purchase is completed with the Southwestern Sewer Company. The old rate of \$1.50 for residences and \$2.50 per month for business firms, was established.

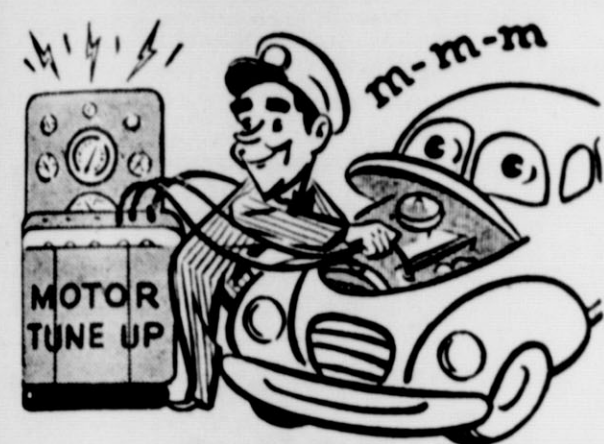
