### Call Made For Street Paving Bids

Bids for drainage, curbing and paving Matador's recently-voted street improvement plan, will be received May 11, according to an announcement published elsewhere in this issue of the Tribune.

Mayor Douglas Meador declared that the bids of a number of contractors are expected due to the amount of interest being shown before date to receive bids was set at a special meeting of the council Friday evening.

Actual work on the street improvement has already started through the city's water superintendent Herman Stanfield. About 15 laborers have been employed to lower water lines crossing the streets to be improved. Old, corroded and leaking pipe is being replaced by new copper tubing, providing permanent water lines under the paving.

Altho more expensive than galvanized pipe, the copper saves much of its cost in installation.

### Summer Water Rate Effective April 20

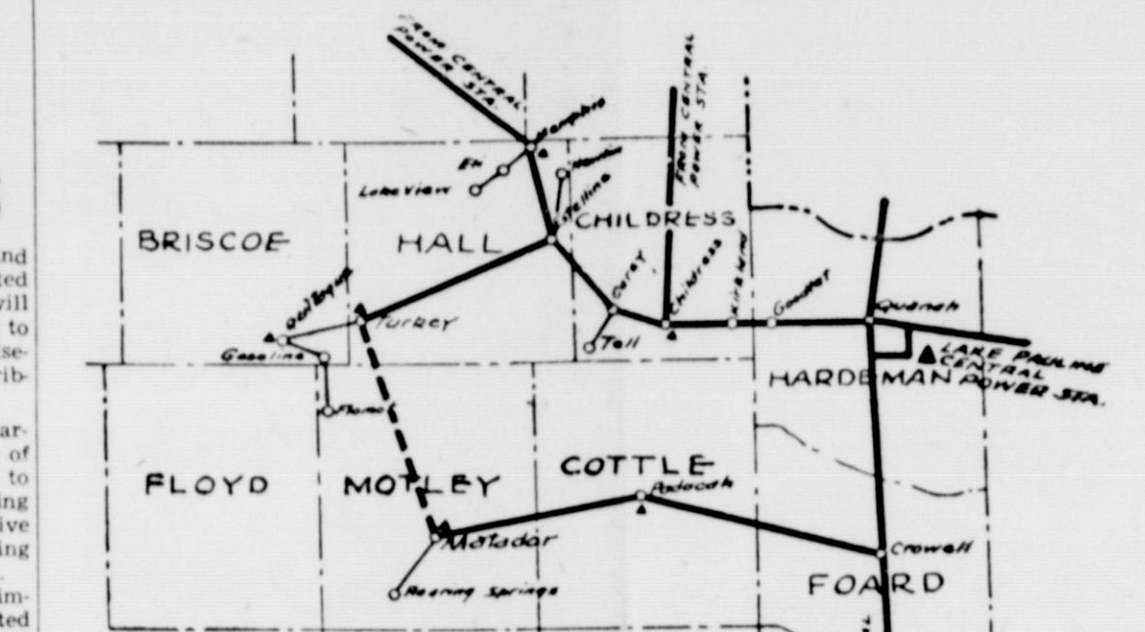
Lower summer water rates became effective for customers of Matador Municipal Water System after the meters were read April 20.

The new rate is 20¢ per 1,000 gallons over the minimum of 2,000 gallons until 7,000 gallons is used (5,000 over the minimum) and then drops to 15¢ per 1,000 gallons. Under present arrangements, the summer rate only affects domestic users.

### New Power Loop Will Protect Matador Against "Black-Outs"



ABOVE MAP (dotted line) shows where West Texas Utilities Company will construct 30 miles of 66,000 volt (66KV) power line. The new line between Matador and Turkey will connect two existing 66,000 volt lines, thus completing a power loop. The new line will enable the power firm to provide Matador, Paducah and Turkey with 66,000 volt service from two directions and several central power stations. First work on the new \$145,000 project will begin next week when survey crews start staking out the route. Some of the materials to be used in the line have been ordered two years.

### Matador Schools Purchase Surplus CAAF Buildings

Eight barracks type buildings formerly located at Childress Army Air Field, have been purchased by Matador Schools system, it was announced this week by school officials after they had received notice of the sale to the school, from the War Assets Administration.

Five of the buildings are 20x100 ft., one is 25x130 ft., and two are 20x56 ft. These structures, complete with all equipment, were sold to the local schools for a total price of \$345.

Equipment included in the sale consists of ten large gas heaters, ten large janitor gas circulating stoves, three ten-thousand unit air conditioners, approximately fifty commodes, fifty lavatories, forty urinals, thirty two showers, four large gas kitchen ranges, two large restaurant sinks, six or seven hot water heaters, and a large amount of pipe and lighting fixtures.

School officials plan to use one 20x100 building for a new colored school; and another for a lunch room. One building will be converted into an agriculture class room, carpenter shop, mechanic shop and butcher shop. Another will be made into a show barn and bus garage, while another will be made into a dressing room for the football teams. The latter buildings will be located just north of the tennis courts on the property adjacent to the football field. The remainder of the buildings will be torn down and the lumber used to repair and maintain the buildings that are to be moved intact. The buildings will eventually be stuccoed and made into permanent units.

The local Vocational Agriculture class and the Veterans Agriculture class will cooperate in laying foundations and doing other work necessary to get the buildings ready for occupancy by next school term.

### Green Light On For Courthouse

A green light is shining in front of Motley county Commissioners Court. It is the "go-ahead" signal from the people of Motley county to build a new courthouse with the \$175,000 voted several years ago. The signal resulted from a "thoroughly Democratic" meeting in the

District court room Tuesday afternoon where the commissioners sought the attitude of the majority of the people.

Fred Buford, representing the Wyatt C. Hedrick, Dallas-Fort Worth firm of architects, displayed a plan for a modern two floors and basement, brick, stone and tile construction building. The structure would face the south with north, east and west entrances. It would be approximately 116 feet x 51 feet and provide about 17,000 square feet of floor space (about twice the size of the old courthouse). It would cost between \$200,000 and \$220,000. The county has sufficient funds.

County Judge Wm. R. Cammack said yesterday that the county's excavating equipment would dig the basement and save approximately \$3,000. Changes in final plans will be made by architects and submitted to the court. Cammack estimated that work might start by late summer.

Only one speech was made against immediate construction of the courthouse. In a standing vote to give sanction to the court for starting the structure, only five or six in the crowded room remained seated. On motion from one taxpayer opposed to immediate construction, a second vote made the former motion unanimous.

### Mrs. Freeman Thacker Escapes Injury As Pick-up Overturns

Mrs. Freeman Thacker escaped serious injury Wednesday evening when the pick-up in which she was returning home from Floydada, overturned about 16 miles west of Matador, at the rim of the caprock near the Ned Martin ranch home.

A heavy shower and slick pavement caused the pick-up to leave the highway and overturn as Mrs. Thacker applied her brakes in an attempt to slow down. The Martins brought her to town, where she was treated for shock and bruises at Stanley Clinic, and several stitches were taken in a cut on her head.

Although able to discuss the accident several hours later, she had difficulty in recalling all the details.

### Two Injured When Truck Crushes Car

J. V. Shirley of Roaring Springs and his brother-in-law, R. G. Nichols of Crowell are in Traweek hospital here, suffering painful (if not serious) injuries and shock, as result of a high-way accident about 5 p. m. Monday, 14 miles of Glenn, in Dickens county.

The two men were driving north on Highway 62 when a large Fox refrigerator truck from Oklahoma City, bore down on them from the rear, crushing their 1942 Ford sedan. The sky was cloudless and no other vehicles were on the highway, the men declared.

Driver of the truck said he topped a hill and did not see the car until it was directly in front of him. Mr. Shirley said he was driving about 45 miles per hour and did not know the truck was behind him.

The two men miraculously escaped with their lives. Mr. Shirley was soaked in gasoline when recovered from the wreckage. He had a large quantity of matches in his pockets. Mr. Nichols was believed dead at first and a motorist stopping soon after the accident, covered his face with a pillow from his car. Condition of both men was declared improving late yesterday. They were rushed here as soon as the accident was reported by a McDonald ambulance.

### Price Records Set At 40c Per Pound

PIONEER Motley county stockmen saw beef cattle sell Saturday on Matador's square for more money per 100 pounds than they used to receive for a good 1,000-pound beef steer. It was the occasion of the county's annual Junior Stockmen's Fat

SUCCESS of the Junior Stockmen's auction is credited in a large measure to Dale K. Schooler representing the Barrick Cattle Company of Amarillo and Dixon, Ill. Mr. Schooler, at the request of John Russell, also a buyer for the firm, made a special trip to Matador with instructions to pay "any price" for the Grand Champion calf. After buying the top calf Mr. Schooler continued his bidding to add many dollars to the total auction sales. Buyers of stocker cattle, the Barrick Co. has purchased many thousands of Motley county cattle.

Stock Show, followed by a live-auction where all of the prize stock was sold. Two prize-winning steers sold for 40¢ per pound on foot, the highest price ever paid in Motley county for beef.

Waybourn Mitchell, after receiving the first prize of \$25 in cash, had the experience of seeing his 940-pound calf sell for 40¢ per pound to the Barrick Cattle Company. Total in prize and sale, \$401.

Second prize winner Dewayne Martin, receiving \$20 in award, also received 40¢ per pound for his 915-pound calf to Joe M. Gaines, manager of the West Texas gin. Cash for calf, \$366.

Third place winner was Roger Kingery whose 825-pound calf, after winning an \$18 award, sold to Campbell's Food Market for 38¢ per pound, bringing \$313.50.

Fourth place and \$17 cash went to Ted Kingery whose 910-pound calf was bought by the First State bank at 36¢ per pound, bringing \$332.15.

Jerry Warren won fifth place and \$16 with his 760-pound calf selling to Farmers Coop gin at 36¢ per pound and totaling \$273.60.

Raymond Speer won sixth place and \$15 with his 840-pound calf which sold to D. I. W. Birnie of Spot Cash grocery for 39¢ per pound and totaling \$327.60.

Raymond Speer also won 7th place and a second award of \$14 with his second entry weighing 805 pounds and selling to Joe Speer for 37¢ per pound and totaling \$299.86.

Leslie Kingery calf winning 8th place and \$13 in award, was not sold.

Jerry Green won 9th place and \$12 award with his 900-pound steer which was purchased by Campbell's Food Market for 35 7/8¢ per pound and bringing a total of \$321.75.

Dewayne Martin's second calf won 10th place and \$11 award. It was purchased by D. I. W. Birnie for Spot Cash grocery at 38¢ per pound, totaling \$328.76.

The nine calves sold at auction brought \$2,939.16; an average price of \$326.57.

Hogs Sell High  
The hog show entries, in two divisions; barrows and gilts, were also sold at auction.

In the barrow show Roger Kingery won first place and \$7.50. John Russell paid 30¢ per pound. Jerry Green won 2nd and \$5. His pig was sold to Doc Burleson for 28¢ per lb. (See STOCK SHOW back page)



## FLYING CROSS AND OTHER MEDALS ARE RECEIVED BY PARENTS OF WAR HERO SON

Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Jackson have recently received the Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal and Gold Stars, in lieu of a second and third Air Medal with citations, which were awarded their son, the late First Lieutenant Charles M. Jackson, U. S. Marine Corps Reserve.

Lt. Jackson was reported missing in action on October 23, 1944 in the Philippine Islands area, and a year later officially reported killed in action by the Secretary of the Navy. The medals, which were received by the hero's mother last month, were displayed at a recent meeting of Matador Lions Club. The lieutenant was born in Matador January 16, 1917, but the family moved to Uvalde while he was still in childhood, and he received his education in the schools there.

Citations accompanying the medals are as follows, in sequence order of the missions for which they were presented:

"The President of the United States takes pride in presenting the AIR MEDAL to First Lieutenant Charles M. Jackson, United States Marine Corps Reserve, for service as set forth in the following CITATION:

"For meritorious achievement in aerial flight as Pilot of a Fighter Plane in Marine Fighting Squadron One Hundred Fifteen during action against enemy Japanese forces in the Philippine Islands Area, from 23 April to 2 May 1945. Participating in five daring combat air patrols and cover missions. First Lieutenant Jackson rendered valiant service throughout each vital assignment and, by his superb skill and cool courage, contributed

materially to the success of his squadron in the fulfillment of these important missions. His aggressive spirit and zealous devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service.

For the President, (signed) James Forrestal, Secretary of the Navy.

The GOLD STAR in lieu of a second Air Medal, was accompanied by the following Citation:

"For meritorious achievement in aerial flight as Pilot of a Fighter Plane in Marine Fighting Squadron One Hundred Fifteen during action against enemy Japanese forces in the Philippine Islands Area, from 22 June to 8 July 1945. Participating in five daring missions to complete a total of ten missions during this period, First Lieutenant Jackson rendered valiant service throughout each vital assignment and, by his superb airmanship and cool courage, contributed materially to the success of his squadron in the fulfillment of important combat air patrols and a bombing mission. His resolute conduct and unwavering devotion to duty in the face of grave hazards were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service.

For the President (signed) John L. Sullivan, Secretary of the Navy." In lieu of a third Air Medal, a Gold Star was accompanied by the following Citation:

"For heroism and extraordinary achievement in aerial flight as Pilot of a Fighter Plane in

Marine Fighting Squadron One Hundred Fifteen during action against enemy Japanese forces in the Philippine Islands Area, from 10 to 26 July 1945. Undaunted by grave hazards, First Lieutenant Jackson boldly penetrated hostile territory to execute five daring missions, which completed a total of fifteen and, striking with determined aggressiveness at his assigned targets, contributed materially to the success of his squadron in the fulfillment of numerous bombing, strafing and fighter cover missions. His superb skill as an airman, cool courage and bold tactics throughout reflect the highest credit upon First Lieutenant Jackson and upon the United States Naval Service. Signed by James Forrestal, Secretary of the Navy, for the President."

The DISTINGUISHED FLYING CROSS was accompanied by the following Citation, signed For the President, by James Forrestal, Secretary of the Navy: "For meritorious achievement in aerial flight as Pilot of a Fighter Plane in Marine Fighting Squadron One Hundred Fifteen during operations against enemy Japanese forces in the Philippine Islands Area, from 26 July to 3 August 1945. Participating in five combat air patrols and cover missions, to complete a total of twenty missions during this period, First Lieutenant Jackson rendered valiant service throughout each vital assignment despite grave hazards and, by his brilliant airmanship, contributed materially to the success of his squadron in the fulfillment of its important assignments. His skill, cool courage and aggressiveness throughout were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."
