Crippled Children Of Texas Eligible For Assistance

In an effort to familiarize every person in Texas with the services offered by the Crippled Children's Division of the State Health Department, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer has released the following state-

Every crippled child in Texas, under 21 years of age, and of normal mentality whose parents are unable to pay for needed care, is entitled to assistance from this Division.

Crippling conditions which may be treated are infantile paralysis, osteomyelitis, club feet, harelip and cleft palate, burns, curvature of the spine, arthritis, bow legs, rickets, tuberculosis of the bone, flat feet congenitally dislocated hip, supernumery fingers and toes, muscular dytrophy, wry neck, spina bifida, elephantiasis, brachia palsy, Potts' Disease, congenital anomalies, amputation, webb fingers, spondylelisthesis, epiphsitis, and sarcoma.
