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Judges Faced With Big Task to Name Winners

Worley Says Farm Purchasing Power Must Remain High

If the world in general and the United States in particular is to avoid another depression, farm purchasing power must remain high, Congressman Eugene Worley told his audience Thursday night in an address at the high school auditorium which officially opened the Motley county fair. Almost all available seats in the building, including the balcony, were occupied.

"When the farmer's purchasing power collapses, we have depression," Mr. Worley declared, "and that is the principal reason for farm price supports. The economy of the nation is geared to the farmer-rancher. Yet some of our critics are unhappy because our farmers and ranchers are 'eating at the first table' with labor and industry, in national income. It is our best insurance against loss. The country can not be prosperous unless the farmer is prosperous."

Without referring directly by name, Mr. Worley sanctioned the Farm Bureau organization as necessary to the future welfare of the American farmer. "Everything is completely organized except agriculture," Mr. Worley declared, "and through organization needs, problems and demands are heard."

Referring without naming the Republicans, Mr. Worley declared, "they don't want to be fair, they want a fair advantage."

Touching briefly on the world situation, Mr. Worley declared that Congress is trying to avoid war. He explained that because of air transportation the world has shrunk to about one-fifth the size it was 20 years ago and that the problems of international peace are of world concern if civilization is to be preserved.

Firemen's Training School in Progress

L. O. "Doc" Bynum of Texas A&M is conducting a firemen's training school here. The school is being conducted Mondays and Thursdays (excepting Oct. 14 on account of the Firemen's Benefit dance at Roaring Springs). The school includes hose drill and practice, and will continue for three weeks.

Motley county's old dream of oil discovery is being taken out of the moth balls and dusted this week as Humble Oil & Refining company starts a 9,000-ft. wildcat test (No. 1-H) on Matador Land & Cattle company land about 16 miles east of town, near old Swenson line camp, north of Highway 70.

Humble employees have been searching for apartments in Matador during the past week. Two or more furnished apartments are needed. M. M. Payne said this week that the test well would probably require employees living here for five months.

Flomol Girl Wins Beauty Contest

EVERYBODY was surprised and admitted it. Motley county's first fair in 20 years was a colossal success, outdistancing the most optimistic visions of its sponsors. It was an inspiring exhibition of progress, achievement and development, a parade of knowledge, talents and labors of the people of Motley county.

Displays were more numerous, contained greater variety and were better arranged than the public expected. Many visitors who attended Lubbock and Amarillo fairs were more impressed with the exhibition opening here Thursday night with an address by Congressman Eugene Worley at the high school auditorium.

Judges faced difficult problems of determining places in canned goods, needlework, home making exhibits as were encountered in agricultural and livestock exhibits. Agricultural first place went to the combined display of Darden Canyon and Teepee Flat communities, with Matador receiving second and third place going to Flomol.

Many visitors were equally impressed by exhibits of Whiteflat and Folley communities as with those of the winners.

Of unusual interest was the merchandise and service exhibits which might have been a part of the Dallas Fair for the smaller places allotted in the fair buildings.

Three disinterested out-of-county judges, Superintendent and Mrs. H. W. Cross, and High School Principal Mitchell of the Quitaque schools, voted unanimously for Miss Wanda Pearl Fisher, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Earnest Fisher of Flomol, as queen of the Farm Bureau beauty contest. She was crowned by Congressman Worley as the closing feature of the program Thursday evening.

War veteran and Tech student Joe B. Meador was master of ceremonies as the fair opened. Superintendent Bert Ezzell, general chairman of the fair, delivered a brief address of welcome. In arranged sequence excellent choral numbers were presented by the Roaring Springs choral club under the direction of Mrs. Homer Kingery and the Matador high school choral club under the direction of Mrs. L. D. Wilkerson, followed by a piano selection by Miss Janella Jones of Flomol. Queen contestants were introduced by Matador Lions Club president E. F. Reeves, who is also secretary and treasurer of the Motley County Farm Bureau.

Congressman Eugene Worley was introduced by Matador Mayor Douglas Meador. Following the program "Genial Gene" Worley visited the fair and renewed acquaintances among Motley county friends until about 11 p. m. when he departed for Paducah where he had an appointment to meet with a group of farmers early Friday morning.

Body of War Hero Is Enroute Home

Body of Pvt. William B. Long, war hero whose life was given for his country, is enroute home from Europe, according to recent advice received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Long.

The youth lost his life March 30, 1945 in Germany, after entering the armed forces October 6, 1944. He received 16 weeks training at Camp Wolters before being sent overseas. He had not reached his 19th birthday at the time of his death.

Another son of Mr. and Mrs. Long, Ensign T. E. Long, Jr., was reported missing in action February 14, 1944 while on a flight to Jauluit Atol in the Pacific. His body was never recovered.

Definite arrangements for interment of Pvt. Long's body are pending further notice from the war department as to the time of its arrival here.

Light Rains Beneficial

Light rain which started falling here Saturday morning and continued throughout the day, was highly beneficial to seeded wheat lands, altho it delayed the cotton harvest now reaching its zenith.

Total rainfall registered here by the U. S. rain gage, was 40-inch according to water superintendent H. E. Man Stanfield. Heavier rainfall was reported in other sections of the county.

The rain reduced attendance during the last day of the Motley county fair, but because of the ample fair buildings, the colt show was held inside Saturday afternoon instead of Burleson field as previously announced.

Wearing apparel merchants reported a rush business Saturday, partly caused by the rain and cooler weather. One merchant declared his sales exceeded any other single day since he entered business.

A sprinkle of rain fell here yesterday afternoon and heavy cloud banks to the east were believed responsible for the interruption of electric power service which caused electric clocks to lose 50 minutes.

WORK RESUMED ON COURTHOUSE

Activity was resumed on the courthouse square Monday afternoon after a delay of several weeks while construction company attorneys and financing company representatives ironed out a minor flaw in warrant advertising.

No changes were made in the original contract and the entire arrangement between the commissioners court and the building contractors is on the same basis as originally announced. Material (sand and gravel) is being unloaded on the new courthouse building site. The BMFP construction of Lubbock, general contractors, were making tests of the ground for supporting strength Monday afternoon.

Hares Claim Victory In Tight Tilt

Ralls Jackrabbits needed the magic of rabbit feet to win over the Matadors on Burleson field here Friday night, despite the one-sided appearance of the final score, 13-0.

For three quarters of the game nothing happened as each team tried vainly for an opening that would let them through to pay dirt. Spectators developed an irritable rash because of the unusual amount of "officialing" which caused the game to drag.

Somewhere in the fourth quarter, Ralls fullback Kelly Ferguson plunged five yards to end a 75-yard Jackrabbit drive. He acquired the one point conversion tally with an end run. After the crowd had started to break up, Ralls left half Billy Woods caught a flat zone pass and galloped 45 yards to the team's second score. The attempt at conversion fizzled.

Between officialing sprees the Matadors threatened in the first quarter when they drove the Hares leather to the 15. The Hares failed in rabbit foot luck when end of the one foot line.

Outstanding for the winners were Ferguson, Woods, Duane Bolander and J. B. Morrison. Looking good in the Matadors' play were fullback Garland Ratan, quarterback Sappo Giesecke and left end Joe Pitts.

It was the second time the Matadors had tasted defeat in conference games played on their own range. The team has an open date Friday.

New Grading System Employed by School

A new system of grading grammar school students has been placed in use here according to Principal Lake Edwards. Students are subjected to a battery of standardized tests to establish an ability level.

Beginning with the first six weeks report cards, students will be graded under the new system. Satisfactory grades will be marked "S". Unsatisfactory reports will be marked "U", and if the student shows need of improvement, the card will be graded with an "N". Passing standards will not be lowered by the new system, Edwards declared. Through its use teachers will be able to make a better report to parents on the progress of their children. "Through use of their new system," Edwards said, "each student will be competing with his own level of ability."

Sewer Election Date is Named

Without trying to steal any of the general election's thunder, Matador will hold a city bond election one day previous, November 1st, to determine the attitude of tax-paying voters (only those residing inside the city limits) with regards to purchasing the Southwest Sewer company system here and improving the municipal water system.

The total revenue bond issue will be for \$85,000. The bonds will not affect the present tax rate and will be made against the revenue of the water and sewer system. The bonds can never become a direct obligation of the city of Matador and for which a tax can never be levied for the payment thereof. The bonds will not represent a mortgage on the system, but will be paid solely out of the net revenues of the systems.

Two Propositions

The ballots, to be legal, will contain two propositions. One proposition will be the \$45,000 water revenue bonds (for or against) and two will be \$40,000 sewer revenue bonds (for or against). However, voters are asked to vote for or against both propositions since they are in fact one bond issue.

The election was called in a special meeting of the council Tuesday night. Date was decided on November 1 in order to hold the election as soon as possible after advertising, and also to avoid conflict with the general election. Every tax-payer interested in the election, is asked to read the election notice published elsewhere in this issue of the Tribune.

NEW TRAINING AIDS

New visual training aids have improved conditions in the Matador grade school according to officials. A new and versatile projector is being employed which will project pictures of any kind on the screen or show pictures and allow the students to draw them on glass. The machine uses filmstrip and projects small glass slides.

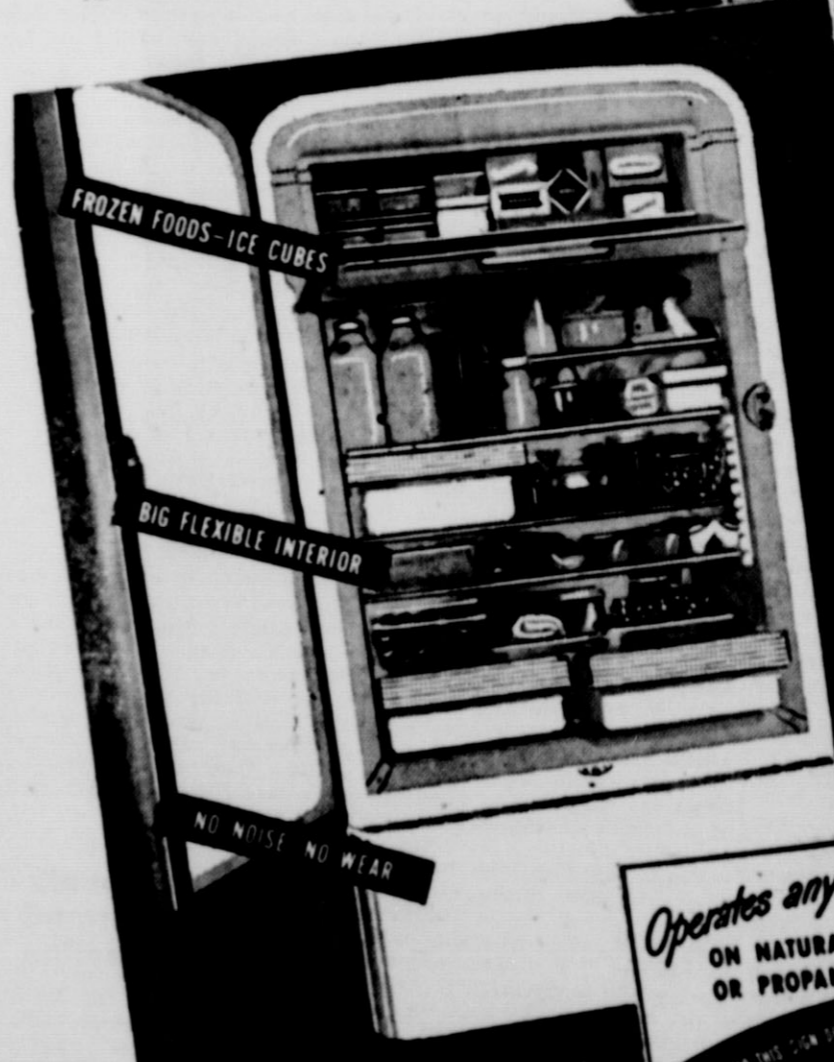

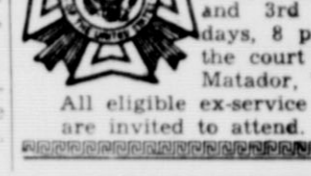

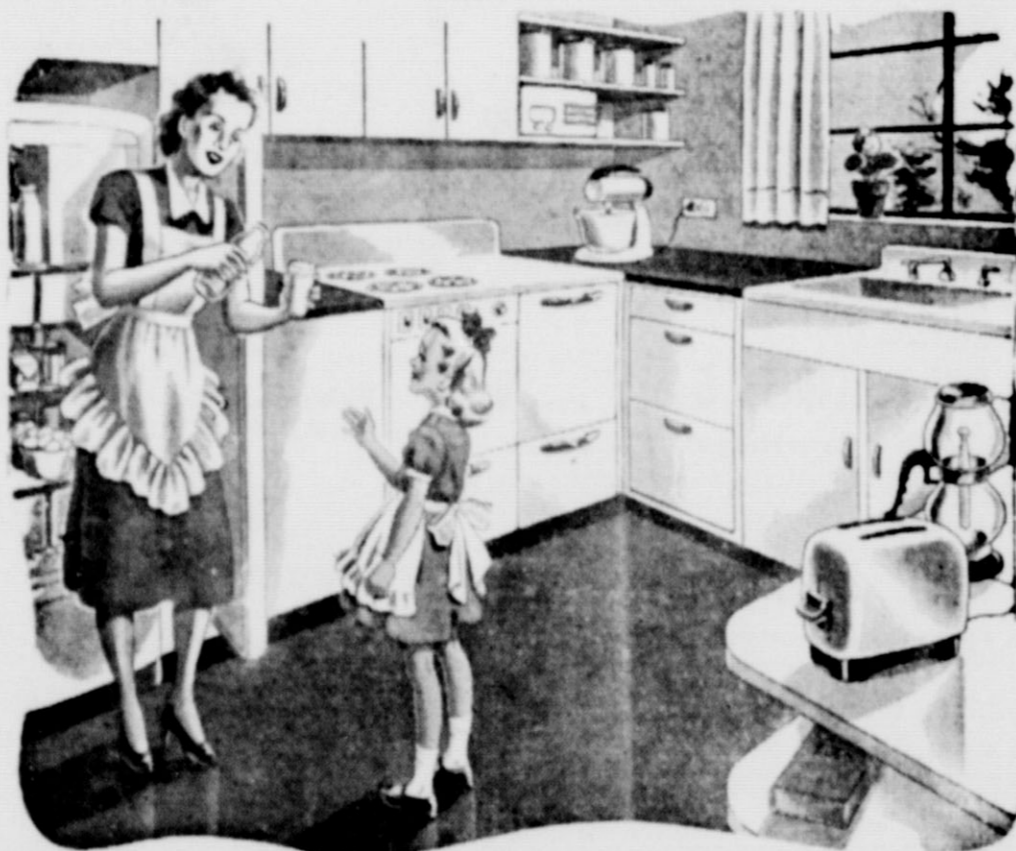

She married John J. Dunn on March 3, 1933, and thereafter moved to Racine, Wisconsin. She and her husband moved back to Texas in May 1947 and made Menard their home. Her health had been poor for the last two or three years. Burial was in Menard cemetery.—The Menard News.

Crippled Children Of Texas Eligible For Assistance

In an effort to familiarize every person in Texas with the services offered by the Crippled Children's Division of the State Health Department, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer has released the following statement:

Every crippled child in Texas, under 21 years of age, and of normal mentality whose parents are unable to pay for needed care, is entitled to assistance from this Division.

Crippling conditions which may be treated are infantile paralysis, osteomyelitis, club feet, harelip and cleft palate, burns, curvature of the spine, arthritis, bow legs, rickets, tuberculosis of the bone, flat feet, congenitally dislocated hip, supernumerary fingers and toes, muscular dystrophy, wry neck, spina bifida, elephantiasis, brachial palsy, Potts' Disease, congenital anomalies, amputation, webbed fingers, spondylolisthesis, epiphysitis, and sarcoma.
