FIRE DRIVES RESIDENTS OUT OF HOME TO FACE BLIZZARD

Fire of unknown origin swept through the L. D. Carmon home occupied by Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Farm Prices Show Strong Up-Trend

Southwest markets opened Thanksgiving week with nearly all farm products higher than the previous Monday. She plans her in an unknown after securing her innocence, with diabolical trying within tables, and cents of cabinet floor. of the advent of ale, with calm with a hidden s which might

minimal markets discouraged marketings from South Texas.

Cattle prices turned stronger Monday before Thanksgiving after drifting downward for more than a week as a result of increased shipments and sluggish demands in dressed beef centers due to a holiday shift to poultry. But when Monday's cattle receipts dropped to the lowest volume in several weeks, prices responded to active trading with gains of 25 to 50 cents per 100 pounds at most southwest markets, bringing quotations near the previous week's level.

After slipping \$1 or more during the previous six days of trading, hogs advanced Monday despite seasonally heavy receipts. Prices climbed \$1 to \$1.50 higher than the previous Monday. Top prices ranged mostly between \$23.25 and \$23.50 at most southwest as well as Midwest markets. This was \$2.50 to \$3.00 per 100 less than on the comparable day last year.

Broad demand for scarce supplies of slaughter lambs pushed prices up 50 cents or more per 100 pounds at most southwest markets during the past week. Ewes and goats advanced, too. Feeder lambs held about steady. Southwest wools moved well at steady to firm prices. Trading in mohair was dull due to higher asking prices.

Cottonseed meal, bran, shorts and other feedstuffs advanced \$2 to \$6 per ton on the wholesale market last week. Also, hay went up as demand improved for scarce offerings of the better qualities.

Wheat jumped a nickle per bushel from Monday to Monday of this week to reach the highest price since May, \$5.14 per bu. Also, white corn went up about 5 cents, yellow corn and oats about 3 cents per bushel and sorghums 3 cents per 100. Barley declined but closed Monday at the previous week's level. Farmers held on to their rice in firm markets.

Most farmers' stock peanuts continued to sell at the government support level. Demand for shelled goods was slow with prices about the same as a year ago at this time.

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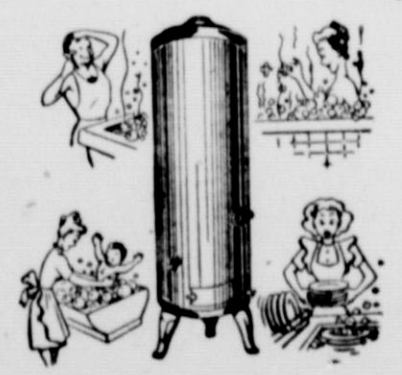
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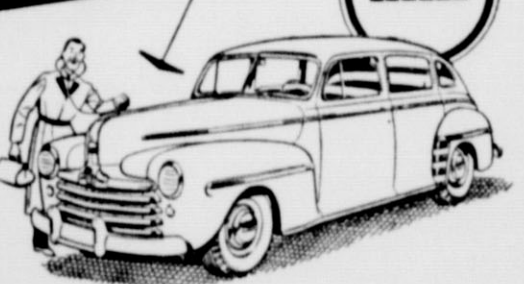
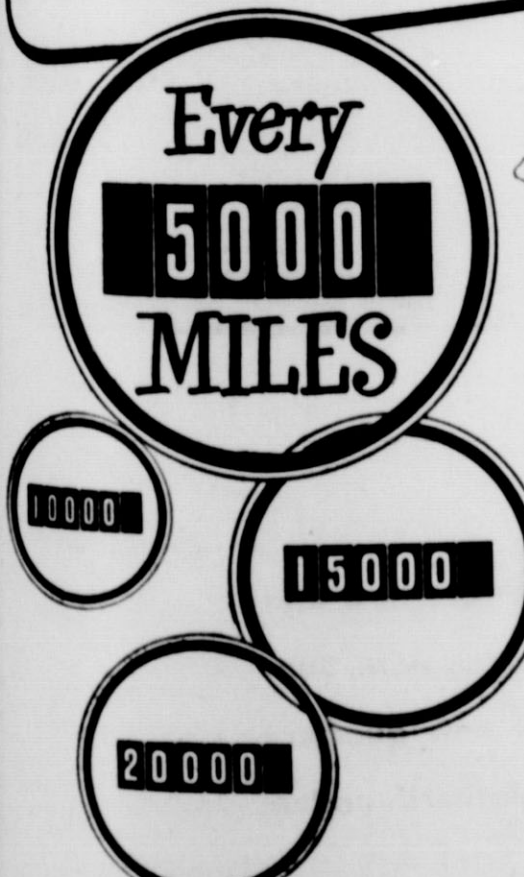

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Election Places Are Announced

Polling places and election judges for the ACP Committee elections to be held week of December 6, were named by the County Committee this week. The Flomot Community will hold their election on December 9, and Matador, Whiteflat, and Roaring Springs will hold their election on Saturday, Dec. 11. Delmont Hays, chairman of the committee, said that in the elections farmers will vote for members of the local community committee and for delegates to the County convention to elect the County Committee.

Every eligible farmer should vote in the election. Eligible farmers who fail to vote in these elections are not carrying their share of the responsibility for good administration in the farm program, says Hays. Polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. on the date of the election in the above communities. The election will be held in the following places: Flomot, Spears Gin, Rufus Tanner, Gilbert Gin, Calvin Franks, Whiteflat, Whiteflat Mercantile, T. M. Dixon, Northfield, Bethany Store, W. T. Moore, Lane Store, Allen Thomas, Matador, AAA Office, Sterling Price, Roaring Springs, Thacker Supply, Melvin Thacker. The above election judges are present Community committeemen, Hays said.

Eligible farmers are those who have participated in the 1948 Agricultural Conservation program, those who have harvested cotton, wheat, or grain sorghum which is eligible for a commodity loan or other price support.

"Through these elected committeemen," says Hays, "farmers have a direct channel to those who administer these programs in the State and in the nation. It is up to the farmers of Matley County to see that committeemen are elected who can best administer the farm programs and who understand local farm problems. Democracy is as good as we make it. When we don't participate we are placing all the responsibility on the other fellow. We are not carrying our share of the load. Not only that, but as we fail to participate we lose just that much of our democracy.

Behind The Wheel Morons Come Into A Place Of Honor

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22—The next time some driver roughs you up in traffic, shout at him (or her): "Aw, your old lady has a high IQ!"

For the consensus is that—so far good driving is concerned—it's as bad to be too smart as it is to be too dumb.

This all started with Dr. Winfred Overholser, one of the nation's top psychiatrists and her of St. Elizabeth's Hospital here. Dr. Overholser was making a speech to examiners for driver's licenses. Someone made a crack about morons, whereupon Dr. Overholser replied: "Why, morons make good drivers."

Later he told me that he's known this for a long time. Years ago, he said, a friend of his conducted some experiments in Massachusetts. It turned out that the feeble minded made excellent drivers.

"The thing most people forget," explained Dr. Overholser, "is that to be a good driver you need emotional stability. And that has nothing to do with intelligence."

Dr. Overholser didn't say whether he would go as far as James Stannard Baker, research director of the Northwestern University Traffic Institute.

Baker recently complained that intellectuals can't keep their minds on their driving. His conclusion: "A high grade moron makes the best automobile driver."

"One more authority, and we'll rest the case. The Automobile Association of America has in its files a report by Dr. A. R. Lauer of Iowa State College.

Dr. Lauer's tentative conclusion: The poorest drivers are the hopeless morons and those with the highest intelligence. The best drivers are somewhere in between.

So it seems obvious that in your next traffic accident it would be a time-waster to yell, "Moron!" for first you would have to ask yourself: "Is this moron low or high grade?"

No, it's best to shout that he

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 24—Pity the poor Los Angeles cop. He never knows what to expect during his routine day in this city of the unexpected.

Take today, for example. He not only had to put up with the courtroom antics of a young blonde who afterwards danced nude on the City Hall lawn, but it took eight squad cars and 20 of his brethren to give a jaywalker a ticket!

First there was this blonde, who said she was Miss Robin Park, 25, an art editor. When she was halted in traffic court for making a U-turn she drove police officials dizzy by:

- (1) Spinning around on a swivel chair;
- (2) Banging the judge's gavel on his desk; and
- (3) Trying to take a nap on the counsel table.

After she had paid a \$4 fine she walked out of the building and, in sight of some 900 persons who watched in amazement she calmly stripped down to the skin and began a dance of spring.

They took her away again, this time to Georgia Street hospital for observation. Her mother told physicians that her daughter recently had suffered a nervous strain.
