Raw Milk Declared Principal Cause Of Undulant Fever

As a safeguard against the serious and disabling disease known as undulant fever or Malta Fever, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises Texans to drink milk only from approved sources. Undulant fever is usually acquired by human beings as a result of consuming raw milk or raw milk products from cows infected with Bang's disease.

Raw milk or milk products can be consumed with safety only when they are known to be produced by cows tested and found to be free of Bang's disease. Pasteurization, of course, will kill the germs if present.

To assist in lowering the incidence of undulant fever all dairymen should remove cattle infected with Bang's disease from their herds as soon as the disease is discovered. Even if the milk is made safe for human consumption by pasteurization, infected cows are still a menace to health since they can transmit the disease to healthy animals and to their owner and other persons who handle them.

"Undulant fever from cattle," Dr. Cox said, "is one health hazard we can eradicate in our State through absolutely safe milk supplies from dairy herds

free from Bang's disease.

"Unless a herd is known to be free from this infection, only pasteurized milk should be used so that the disease cannot be passed on to the consumer of milk and dairy products."

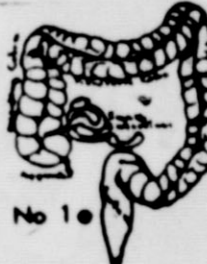

DALLAS, Feb. 20.—The Southwestern Association Telephone company will move its general offices to Dallas from Lubbock starting Friday, Roy Autry, vice-president and general manager, announced Saturday. The company will occupy two floors in the new Reserve Loan Life building at 505 North Ervay Street. It expects to complete the move in time to open for business Monday, Feb. 28. Company officials, headed by R. B. Fairly, president, will make their home in Dallas. Approximately 130 members of the Lubbock staff will be moved by the company to Dallas. G. P. Norton, a representative of the firm, is here making advance arrangements for homes and apartments.

The revenue accounting department will remain in Lubbock, Autry said. Southwestern Associated Telephone company is one of the country's large independents. It operates in 350 towns and cities in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arkansas, Kansas and Louisiana. It has 192 exchanges with more than 67,000 telephones in service. At present the company has about 1,500 people on its payroll, Autry said. The move to Dallas is being made to place the company's headquarters in a more central location for the management of

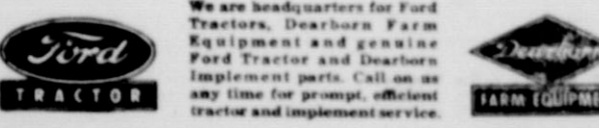

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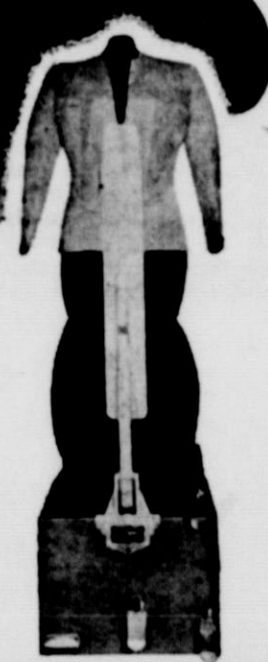

FARM NEWS

ACP Builds Motley County Motley County is richer and more productive because of the

work done by farmers of the county who have cooperated in the Agricultural Conservation Program, says Delmont Hays, chairman of the county ACP committee. Few people, besides the farmers themselves, realize all that has been done to protect and improve the soil and water resources of the county. Under the 1948 program, alone, 273 farmers carried out one or more conservation practices.

Several practices carried out in Motley county in 1948 include 23,289 cubic yards in diversion terraces, 580,043 linear feet of large ridge terraces, 2398.1 acres strip cropping, 6,430.8 acres contour seeding small grains, 200.0 acres reseeded pastures, 45 tons superphosphate, 19,261.8 acres contour listing, 3,450.6 acres summer fallow, 6,382.4 acres feed stalks left on the land. Through these practices farmers of the county have made material progress in controlling erosion and making the land more productive. The chairman points out that to the farmer this means that he can look to his land for continued production. To the man on Main Street it means a continued and stable business, a permanency which

permits planning for the future. As the chairman explains, "It will not be like a mine that means an end of business when the coal or the ore gives out. The conservation program is getting farmers away from mining the soil."

Sign-up For 1949 ACP Started Delmont Hays, Chairman of the Motley County Agricultural Conservation Committee, said today that farmers of the county can now sign-up to participate in the 1949 Agricultural Conservation Program. The chairman advises that an increase in funds has been authorized for the 1949 program, and a material increase in conservation work is expected. The program is open to all farmers of the county. Farmers can come to the county ACP office at Matador and one of the committeemen or some qualified person will help fill out conservation plans for the coming season. Mr. Hays urged farmers to consider their conservation needs carefully and to make their plans accordingly. It will continue to be the policy of the county committee, the chairman states, to concentrate on the most needed conservation prac-

tices. Mr. Hays pointed out that quite often a combination of conservation practices is needed to accomplish the greatest amount of conservation. Terraces often must be accompanied by sodded water outlets. The use of lime and phosphate usually give the greatest return in conservation when used in connection with the growing of legumes and grasses. Farmers' plans should be made to cover several years.

In cooperating in the Agricultural Conservation Program, the chairman explained, farmers are working with the rest of the people in protecting soil and water resources. In this they have a responsibility to the country to give value received for the assistance given in carrying out conservation practices. That assistance is given, he explained, because this has been found to be the most effective and economical method of getting essential conservation work done.
