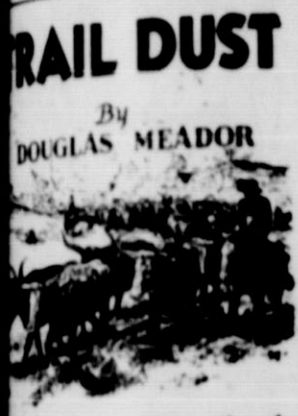

Community Shocked By Death Of Child

There is a vacant desk in Matador grammar school third grade room. It was occupied last week by Carol Ann Young, 8, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Lee Young. Carol Ann will not return. She died Saturday of bulbar polio at the Plainview West Texas Polio center. She was Matador's first fatality from the dreaded disease and the third fatality at the center this year.

Shocked and alarmed the community bore its grief stoically as it paid final tribute to the little brown-eyed girl trapped in the web of fatal destiny. Business houses closed during the funeral.

Funeral Held Monday

Funeral services were held Monday at 4 p. m. in First Methodist Church, with the pastor, Rev. Marvin Brotherton, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. Keith McCormick, pastor of First Baptist Church.

Pallbearers were Billy Wason, Vernon Brogdon, Freddie Earl Brandon, Bill McCaghen and Calvin Gilbert. Third grade school mates were flower girls. They were: Sue Cross, Marilyn Brandon, Christina Darnon, Mary LeI Groves, Judy Hobbs and Cherri Ann Barton.

Interment was in Matador East Mound cemetery under direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home.

Carol Ann was born at Matador, September 19, 1943, and would have been 9 years old on her birthday.

She is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Willard Young, three sisters, Mrs. Givens Lawrence, Mrs. Bill Jameson and Loretta Young, a brother, Larry Young, and her grandmother, Mrs. I. N. Plumlee, all of Matador.

X-Ray Tests Near 800

Excellent response was being received late yesterday to the county-wide drive for X-Ray chest examinations in cooperation with the State Health Department's campaign to reduce tuberculosis in Texas.

At the 5:30 p. m. closing hour yesterday a total of 786 had been examined during the first two days of the four-day drive. J. R. Emmons, county chairman of the drive said 342 were examined the first day and 442 had stood before the camera Wednesday.

Examinations, which are made without charge, require less than two minutes and are less involved than having a picture made. The examination station is located in the American Legion building and will be open today and Friday until five-thirty p. m.

School Will Admit Under-Age Pupils

Under-age children may attend Matador grade school, providing they meet with a number of provisions stipulated by the school board, in regular meeting Tuesday evening.

The parents must show reasonable evidence why the under-age child should be permitted to attend school, and space must be available in the first grade without crowding or hindering the program for eligible first grade children. A two-weeks trial period must show that the child is capable of doing the first grade work.

The parents will be required to pay a proportionate share of operating the grade school for one year, estimated to be between \$18 and \$200 per student.

Other business transacted by the school board in its Tuesday night meeting included a contract with the Matador Butane Company to supply fuel for the season, collision insurance for the four school buses and the adoption of a provision regarding teacher applications.

Applications will be kept on file for one year. Applications must be renewed (by filing a new application) at the end of that period.
