Henry Campbell's Farewell Address Urges Cowboys to Own Land

Custom of the Matador Ranch during the pioneer days when it was managed by Henry H. Campbell, was thesannual Christmas dances which lasted three days and nights. Cowboys from all the early-day ranches came to the Matador for the excellent food prepared by Mrs. Campbell, the music and dancing.

At the beginning of this Christmas event in 1890. Henry H. Campbell delivered his farewell address to his cowboys, associates and the cowboys of other ranches. He had resigned from the helm of the Matador. The address is as follows:

Gentlemen of the Matador Land and Cattle Company:

I am heartily glad to greet you, one and all, this evening. These annual festivities are always seasons of freedom from care, good fellowship and happy reunion. But this particular occasion is fraught with special, almost painful, interest to me. The flood gates of thought are opened up, and the lights and shadows of years filled with joys and sorrows, battles and victories, successes and failures, chase each other in rapid succession across the field of consciousness. You, my friends, have all traveled far enough along the journey of life to have observed that nothing is permanent, and that change is everywhere prevalent. The winds of heaven that blow across our limitless plains change continually. The sleepless rivers that roll on to the ocean are continually carving out new channels and gnawing at the banks that confine them Old Ocean himself is restless and unceasing in his lashings of the coast that confines his angry billows. Here he founded the Matador Land & Cattle Co. which he later sold to the Scotch syndicate. He helped organize Motley county and was the first county judge. The city of Matador is located on a section of land which he once owned. Born in North Carolina, Mr. Campbell first came to Texas in 1854 and moved to Ellis county in 1860. He had driven cattle to California, Montana, Dodge City and New Orleans. He found here in the foothill country the ideal area for cattle raising. He bounded the ideal region as 40 miles east of the Caprock thence north to Red river and south to Duck creek. He died
