Further, they have not actually agreed upon a price. The agreement refers to an estimated price of \$800. They should be specific and make either a fixed price contract or an agreement whereby the builder is reimbursed for his expenses plus a definite profit percentage. Perhaps the XYZ Company feels that if their expenses are higher than anticipated, they will be able to charge more than the stimated \$800. On the other and, Mr. Householder probably eels that \$800 is the maximum price he will have to pay.

The most important thing in contract is to determine the essential elements of performance. This is not as difficult as it might seem. Here is a good rule to follow: As to the acts of each party determine what is to be done, when, where and by whom. See that these essential parts are included in your agreement. In addition, remember that if a contract is worth signing, is is worth reading and understanding-all of it.
