

Four Flyers Killed In Crash of Jet Bomber

Rugged Area on County Line Is Scene of Grim Air Tragedy

FLYING through a blinding sandstorm shortly after noon Friday a new Army Air Force B45 jet bomber crashed in a rugged area almost on the line between Motley and Cottle counties, approximately five miles north of US Highway 70. The plane with the speed of a shooting star, disintegrated when it struck a clay ridge between two gypsum rimmed canyons about two miles east of Cow Hollow tank, just north of the old Paducah-Matador wagon road, and carried four young flyers to instant death.

The men were listed by the Air Force as Pfc. Thomas Penninger, 21, gunner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harlon M. Penninger, Lubbock; First Lt. Billy M. Reynolds, 26, Cleveland, Miss.; Lt. Winfield R. Waller, Denver, Colorado and Cpl. Henry G. Geiger, 18, Cedar Rapids, Iowa. The plane was on a routine cross-country training flight from Langley Air Force Base, Virginia and was returning from Mather Air Force Base, California.

Explosion Is Seen

There were several witnesses to the crash. One was Mrs. I. R. Hull, wife of a railroad worker who lives at the Narcisso section house, on the Quanah, Acme & Pacific railroad. She said the plane came over her house, flying low and smoking badly. She saw it explode a few moments later but was unable to determine whether it exploded in the air or when it crashed into the ground. Mrs. Hull notified J. E. Emmons.

Officials of the Flying Safety Office of Reese Air Force Base, Texas, today requested the cooperation of all citizens of Matador and Paducah in locating any fragments of the B-45 which crashed here last Friday.

Anyone finding a foreign object which may have been in the aircraft or a part of the aircraft (particularly portions of the plexiglass canopy) is requested to contact Sheriff Elmer Clark of Paducah immediately.

Norris funeral home in Paducah who notified the Eudy Seale Funeral home here. Bill Seale said he received the call at 12:35 which was 29 minutes after the 400-miles-per-hour plane had left Reese Air Force Base in Lubbock. It is believed the plane struck the earth about 14 minutes after leaving Lubbock, about 100 miles away.

Because of the rugged terrain it was approximately two and one-half hours before searching parties reached the scene of the accident. The Paducah and Matador ambulances were the first to find the wreckage.

Air Force ambulances, fire-fighting equipment and military police were rushed from Lubbock to the scene of the accident. Remains of the ill-fated airman were taken to the Paducah funeral home and later removed by the Air Force. Guards were thrown around the crash scene allowing only officials, police

Landowners To Discuss Rain-Making

Modern "push-button" rain-making methods will be the object of a meeting to be held in the Motley county courthouse (District Court room), here Tuesday night, April 1. The announcement was made this week by County Agent Rufus Emmons.

Ford Hubbard, representing the Water Resources Development company of Denver, will explain the program and answer questions, Mr. Emmons declared.

Farmers, ranchers, businessmen and the public are invited. The meeting will begin at 7:30. Similar meetings have been held in Childress, Hall, Armstrong, Donley and Collingsworth counties, and other meetings are scheduled for King, Dickens and Briscoe counties. The company desires that a number of counties in this area be grouped into one unit.

If property-owners and sponsors of the plan accept the company's program, they will be required to pay a fixed amount per acre, and the total cost will depend on the number of acres in the county (Texas Almanac gives Motley county 647,040 acres).

A news item in the March 1 issue of the Ft. Worth Star-Telegram declared Childress county citizens voted during a similar meeting to pay a total sum of \$5,000 to take part in the plan. They agreed to pay 2¢ per acre toward raising the fund, the article declared.

Mr. Emmons declared that everyone interested in the plan is invited to attend the Tuesday night meeting and take part in the discussion.

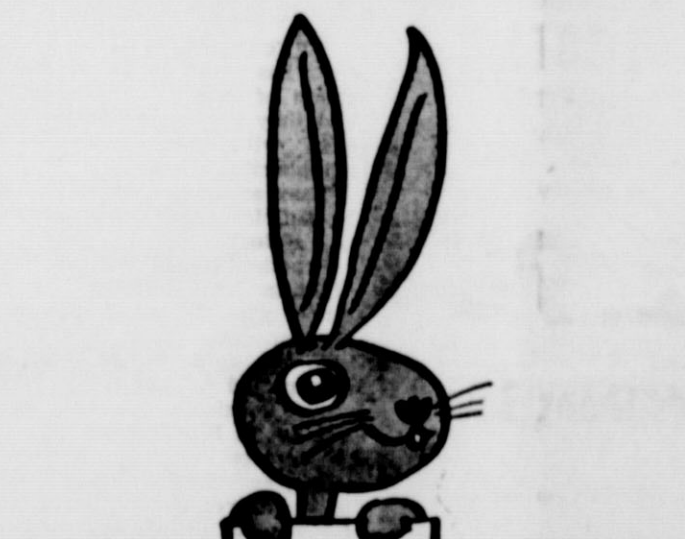

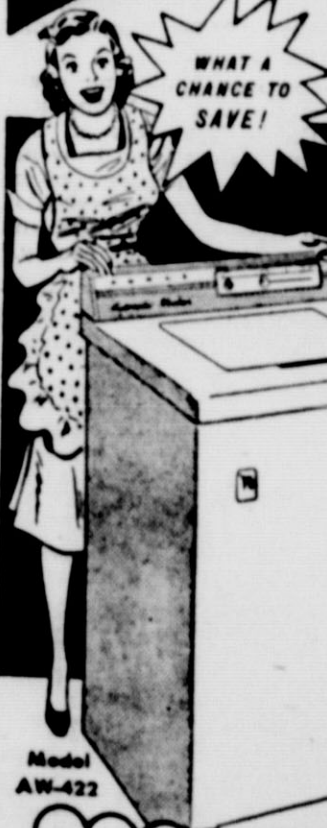

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

GRAND JURY INDICTMENT OFTEN CONFUSED WITH CONVICTION FOR CRIME

What does indictment by a grand jury mean? Lawyers find that many persons are inclined to confuse indictment by a grand jury with a court conviction for a crime.

This misconception is unfair to anyone who becomes the subject of a grand jury investigation. Justice, in the United States, is based on the theory that a man is innocent until proven guilty, and public opinion should withhold its verdict until the courts have had an opportunity to determine guilt or innocence.

An indictment is simply a written accusation presented by a grand jury to the district judge. It charges some person or

persons with a crime. It is not a conviction. When a grand jury indicts a person it merely affirms that there is sufficient reason for him or her to stand trial. That is as far as the grand jury goes.

After that, the judge and the trial jury take charge of the case. At the trial the indictment is simply the State's pleading in the case, to which the defendant may plead "Not Guilty". The trial jury is instructed by the judge that it must not consider the indictment as any evidence of guilt.

All felony offenses in Texas, that is all offenses punishable by imprisonment in the State penitentiary, must be prosecuted on an indictment by a grand jury. A grand jury may indict an individual for a misdemeanor or an offense punishable only by a jail sentence or by fine, but this is rather an unusual procedure.

Misdemeanor cases are customarily prosecuted on the basis of an "information" filed by the County Attorney. This serves the same function as a grand jury indictment.

The importance of a grand jury verdict is this: If it votes a "True Bill"—that is, if someone is indicted—the District Attorney must prosecute the person indicted; but if the jury votes a "No Bill"—that is, not to indict

The Top O' The Mornin'



That's the time to prepare this handsome dessert for your St. Patrick's Day party in the evening; and, sure, folks will flock to the table for this festive and delicious fruit-flavored gelatin shanrock. Moreover, they are in for a wonderful taste surprise because oranges, dates and coconut combine in this dessert to put it in the "special" class.

One of the nicest things about this party gelatin mold is that you can prepare it ahead of time—all except the whipped cream and coconut topping.

Undoubtedly, on such a gala day, the flavor of this dessert is enhanced by the shamrock shape. So, if you do not have this kind of a mold, just use a cardboard pattern to cut out the shamrock. The trimmings won't be wasted—they can be piled lightly into sherbet glasses and served at another meal.

Jellied Coconut Fruit Mold

- 1 package raspberry-flavored gelatin
- 1 cup hot water
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1 orange, sectioned and diced
- 10 cut dates
- 1/2 cup shredded coconut

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add cold water and orange juice. Chill until slightly thickened. Fold in orange, dates and coconut. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold. Using pastry tube, make an outline of a shamrock on the mold with whipped cream. Makes 6 servings.

—the suspected person cannot be tried.

In most cases, the District Attorney informs the grand jury of persons or crimes to be investigated and produces the evidence for it. However, the jury is free to order any further witnesses if they wish to hear brought before it, and is by no means limited to the evidence the District Attorney produces.

A grand jury cannot require a suspect to testify before it. But suspected persons sometimes ask to be allowed to appear before a grand jury to testify in their

own behalf. They may do so and still be prosecuted and convicted.

The grand jury procedure is one of the basic protections enjoyed by the common man against outrageous procedures of would-be tyrants, and dates from early Anglo-Saxon times. It assures that no person shall be forced to stand trial for a felony on the basis of a malicious or frivolous accusation having no apparent factual support.

When called to serve on a grand jury you share with a group of fellow citizens some of the most solemn responsibilities known to our democracy. Consequences of life-or-death importance may hinge upon your vote.

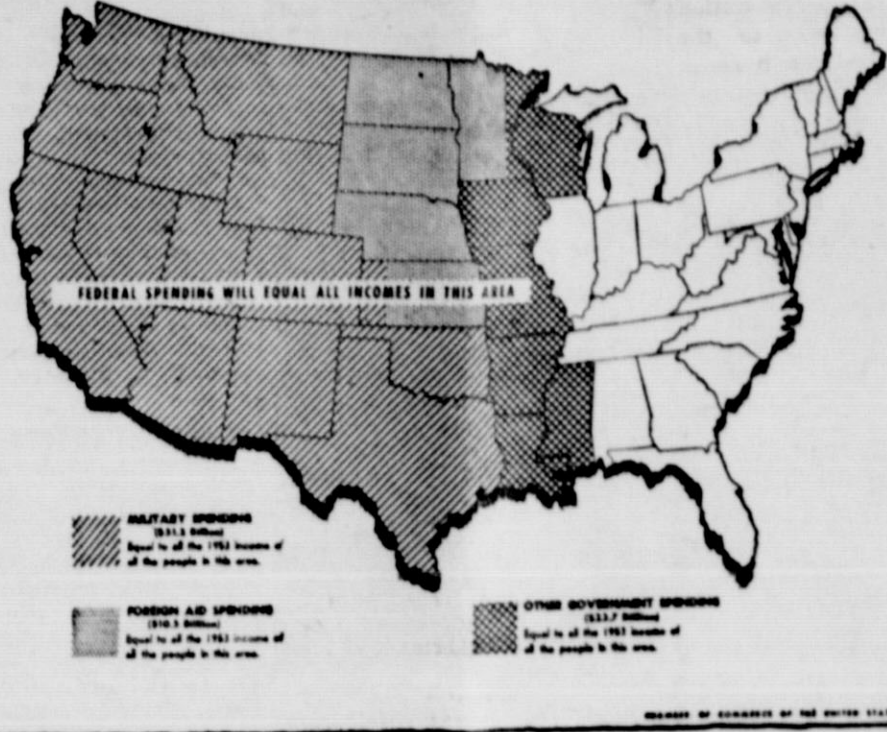

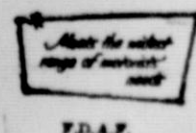

 officers and newsmen to enter. The point where the plane struck looked as if a powerful bulldozer had plowed a ditch on the ridge about four feet deep, ten feet wide and fifty to sixty feet long. The crumpled metal of one jet engine was found at the farther end of the ditch. The exploding plane hurtled across a small canyon, disintegrating in its tragic course. The ground was swept as if by a giant broom by the force of the explosion. Burning fuel set the grass afire and burned an area of approximately five acres. Ex-

cept for the short grass the high, cold north wind would have carried the fire south to Tongue river. Few pieces of the plane remained larger than an automobile fender. Most of the wreckage was small pieces of metal, glass, rubber and insulation. At one point a piece of metal was imbedded in a mesquite tree. Pfc. Penninger called his mother when the plane stopped for fuel at Lubbock and told her he hoped to have time to come home for a few minutes, but later in the conversation told her he must go as the plane was ready to take off. A short time later she heard of the fatal crash on the radio.

 infant boy's grave is not known, but the marker was placed near that of his deceased sister, Elizabeth Cooper, born January 1887 and died the same year. Also buried in the family cemetery is Mrs. A. S. Johnson, aunt of Mrs. Cooper's, who died in 1887. Mr. Cooper and his sister still own the 160-acre homestead. The graves are located about 100 yards east of Teepee creek. Two other graves are in the Teepee City area. I. O. Armstrong is buried on the west bank of Teepee creek, and another man, (name unknown) on the east side of Teepee creek. Mr. and Mrs. Cooper were married in Denver, Colorado, December 1878 and came to Dallas, via Kansas City, where they purchased wagons and teams for the trip west. They filed on the Teepee City homestead in 1879. A postoffice was established in Teepee City in 1887 and discontinued in 1900. Mr. Cooper died in Sitka, Alaska, November 25, 1916, where he is buried. Mrs. Cooper died here July 25, 1932 and is buried in Matador East Mound cemetery. Those attending the ceremony held yesterday at Teepee City included Jim Cooper, his son, J. B. Miss Nora Cooper, Henry Pipkin, Colquett Warren, Mrs. Gerald Waybourn and daughter, Barbara, Jim and Joe Meador and John Sparks of Spur, who erected the grave marker.
