Forrest Aubrey, 37, of Paducah, died shortly after in a Paducah hospital. Ernest Aubrey, 21, his brother, and driver of the west bound 1941 Ford in which three men were riding, died Sunday morning. Pfc. Luther T. Roberts of the 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, N. C., third passenger in the car, is reported to have died in a Wichita Falls military hospital, where he was taken after receiving treatment in Paducah. Roberts' home was Niles California. The accident occured about 11 p. m. Saturday.
