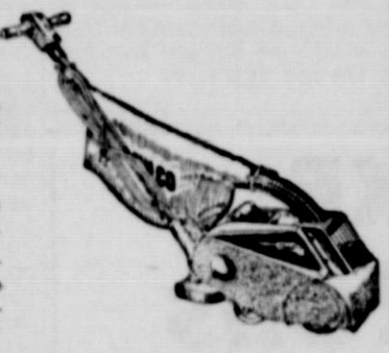

County Agent Says Flea Hopper Being Held In Control

Nature is "to an extent" combating the cotton flea hopper, County Agent J. R. Emmons said today.

Emmons finding came after about two weeks observation of the hopper, currently the most active of cotton insects, in fields in Motley county.

The natural effects which are partially nullifying the work done by the hopper are "hot, dry climate and the lady bug", Emmons said.

Three flea hoppers to five stalks of cotton in the James Ed Russell field is the most alarming evidence found this season. Russell has dusted a portion of his cotton with satisfactory results.

"In some of the fields where the hopper was abundant last week", Emmons continued,

"there are few now because of the hot weather."

But not to appear too optimistic, the county agent warned the hopper had "picked up" in other places. He still advised spraying or dusting whenever one hopper is found to every four stalks.

Along with the cotton hopper the grasshopper is the only insect bothering crops now, but the damage they do "is not too great."

The lady bug described by Emmons is one of farmers' best friends, is a hard-shelled, reddish-brown insect with five spots on each wing. They eat the hopper's eggs and young.

"The lace wing helps some too", Emmons added. "If both these insects are present, it's all right."

Dusting or spraying when the two friendly insects are around will kill them along with the hopper.

Emmons is planning an extensive orientation on the boll worm next. It is not prevalent now because bolls have not yet appeared. But he warns the farmers have to act fast to catch this one.

"It only takes three or four days from the time the egg hatches until it is big enough to go into the boll," he said.

The boll worm lays one single egg on top of a leaf, not the bottom as the popular belief goes, Emmons said. It is about the size of a pinhead.

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ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING WATER METERS AND LEVYING MINIMUM WATER RENTALS ON CONNECTIONS TO THE MUNICIPAL WATER SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF MATADOR OF RESIDENCES OCCUPIED BY TWO OR MORE FAMILIES AND OF PREMISES OCCUPIED BY TWO OR MORE FAMILIES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MATADOR, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: Water meters shall henceforth be required as follows on connection to the municipal water system of multifamily residences and of premises occupied by more than one family:

(A). A separate water meter shall be required for each family housing unit which is equipped with a set of plumbing fixtures in all residences which are occupied by more than one family.

(B). On premises occupied by two or more families a separate water meter shall be required for each apartment or other family housing unit which is

equipped with a set of plumbing fixtures.

SECTION 2: In lieu of separate water meters on housing units as set out in Section 1 of this ordinance, the property owner may at his election be assessed a minimum water rental on each such housing unit which is equipped with plumbing fixtures.

SECTION 3: Definitions. The term "set of plumbing fixtures," as used in this ordinance is hereby defined to mean and include bath room plumbing and fixtures consisting of a bath, lavatory, and commode, and in addition it may include kitchen plumbing and fixtures. The term "premises occupied by more than one family," as used in this ordinance, is hereby defined to mean a lot containing two or more housing units or adjacent lots under common ownership which contain two or more housing units and which are served by a common water meter and connection to the municipal water system.

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE LEVYING SEWER RENTALS ON CONNECTIONS TO THE MUNICIPAL SEWER SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF MATADOR OF RESIDENCES OCCUPIED BY MORE THAN ONE FAMILY AND OF PREMISES OCCUPIED BY MORE THAN ONE FAMILY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MATADOR, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: The following sewer rentals are hereby levied on connections to the municipal sewer system of multifamily residences and of premises occupied by more than one family:

(A). On each residence occupied by two or more families and equipped with two or more sets of plumbing fixtures, a monthly rental of \$1.50 for each set of plumbing fixtures.

(B). On apartments and other housing units on premises occupied by two or more families, whether said housing units are occupied by separate families in one house or building or in separate houses and buildings, a monthly rental of \$1.50 for each housing unit which is equipped with a set of plumbing fixtures.

SECTION 2: Definitions. The term "set of plumbing fixtures," as used in this ordinance is hereby defined to mean and include bath room plumbing and fixtures consisting of a bath, lavatory and commode, and in addition it may include kitchen plumbing and fixtures. The term "premises occupied by more than one family," as used in this ordinance, is hereby defined to mean a lot containing two or more housing units or adjacent lots under common ownership which contain two or more housing units and which are served by a common connection to the municipal sewer system.

Scientists To Study Origin Of Stone Mill

NEW YORK, July 25—One of the most puzzling mysteries dealing with early American history may be solved this summer, when two archaeologists investigate the origin of the old stone "mill" in Newport, R. I.

The building, long the subject of speculation as to its age, is a round granite shell, supported by eight columns.

There are three conflicting theories as to its origin. The first maintains that the structure was built by Norsemen as a church. The second claims that the tower was built by the Pilgrims as a tower to watch for the approach of ships. The third says that it was built by Portuguese explorers before the coming of the Pilgrims.

This summer, however, William S. Godfrey, Jr., and L. T. Homer, both Harvard archaeologists, will sift the soil surrounding it, in an attempt to answer the puzzle.

Last summer, Godfrey, who is doing post-graduate work at Harvard, dug a series of tren-

ches around it to a depth of five feet, and as a result of his efforts, uncovered, among other things, a penny dated 1696.

He thinks this summer's work may uncover the necessary proof to substantiate its date for the reason that a great trench, dug prior to its construction, was filled in, and may contain clues.
