Voluntary Regulation Precludes Water Crisis

The present heat wave has unabated there is a possibility you may open a water tap without anything happening. City of Matador water does not face any water emergency. The three city wells are being operated constantly being sufficient water for all use. But present water conservation is not normal.

Stanfield called Mayor Douglas Meador yesterday afternoon and explained the situation which might develop into a crisis in event of a serious fire. For over an hour the big automatic pump hummed at 440 gallons per minute without gaining on the supply in the lower tank. More water was being used than could be produced and the tank marker showed decrease instead of increase. After a time the pump

was gaining and soon filled the tank but water in the two 100,000-gallon supply reservoirs was only about four feet in depth—a dangerous situation in event of fire. Matador water users have been taking about 350,000 gallons daily from taps on the system during the blistering heat wave, which is approximately one third above normal consumption. Superintendent Stanfield

says he can handle the needs if he can get a break in the peak hours of consumption and a little time in which to fill the reserve reservoirs. Water users are asked to cooperate in this voluntary plan. Homes which face streets running north and south will water lawns, flowers and gardens on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Homes facing streets running east and west

will water lawns, flowers and gardens on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. This voluntary cooperation will preclude any danger of crisis and provide protection in an emergency. (No regulation will apply to Sunday since water use falls off because of businesses being closed). At present Mr. and Mrs. Stanfield are watching the pumps and water supply on a 24-hour

basis. There is no danger in the city's water supply except the abnormal use during certain periods. Wells do not show any lowering of water levels and all equipment is functioning properly. In addition to the automatic pump which keeps pressure at the wells at 70 pounds, there is an auxiliary pump capable of producing 640 gallons per minute in the pumphouse basement.

This equipment is kept in reserve in case of an emergency and would not help the present situation except in failure of the automatic pump. August heat records (by government thermometer at the city wells) show exceedingly high readings: Aug. 1, 100; Aug. 2, 99; Aug. 3, 99; Aug. 4, 102; Aug. 5, 105; Aug. 6 (Monday) 107 and Aug. 8, 106.

Street Paving Job Completed

One of the most creditable improvements in Matador's history has been completed. Approximately three miles of city residence streets have been paved at the expense of property-owners. Forrest Campbell who has served as a "collection agent" for Sheppard & Luce contractors, declared that of the \$10,445.20 meeting by property-owners, all pledged by the amount but \$440.85 had been paid. (Property-owners paid 60¢ per running foot on property facing street and the city paid for street and alley intersections.) Final settlement of the city's part in the project will be paid Friday. The city paid for sealcoating existing 20 blocks of paving at a cost of approximately \$3,500 and \$2,500 (approximately) for street and alley intersections. Gravel supply was exhausted because of a "break-down" in the Crews plant before the last few blocks were completed and Sheppard & Luce were obliged to haul rock from Hamlin at a cost to them of \$8 per cubic yard. A total of 110 yards of the expensive rock was required.

Humble To Explore All Of Ranch Land

SEISMOGRAPH CREW MAY LOCATE HERE IF HOUSING FOUND

SEARCH FOR OIL is going to center in Motley county when Humble Oil and Refining company seismograph crew starts about September 1 on 465,000 acres Matador ranch lands which figured last month in one of the largest land deals since the selling of the XIT ranch. Humble holds oil lease on the Matador acreage. John Stevens, local manager of the ranch, Tuesday announced at the Matador Lions Club meeting that every section of the ranch would be tested by the seismograph crew and that estimates were from 12 to 18 months to complete the work. Members of the crew which is composed of 11 families and eight single men were in Matador this week in an effort to locate housing facilities. A spokesman told City Alderman Loyd Latimer that furnished houses or apartments would be required since none of the crew owned household furnishings.

"We want to locate in Matador because of the central location to our work," the spokesman declared, "but we need housing facilities. We do not expect any special concessions but we do expect clean, modern living quarters at fairly-priced rents. The nature of our work makes it impractical for us to own place to place. Our people are educated, respectable and accustomed to living standards which compare with other families in average or above, income brackets. We usually buy our needs in the communities in which we are located."

Alderman Latimer said he is to notify the crew if accommodations can be furnished in Matador. In the meantime several businessmen have become interested in the possibility of locating the well-paid Humble employees here and a movement is being considered to secure furniture for vacant houses which might accommodate the newcomers.

THEREIN BY COUNTIES SHALL BE VOLUNTARY, AND AUTHORIZED BY THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF SUCH COUNTY PROVIDING THE LEGISLATURE SHALL NOT BE AUTHORIZED TO MAKE AN APPROPRIATION TO PAY ANY RETIREMENT OR DISABILITY BENEFITS AUTHORIZED HEREIN, AND PROVIDING THAT ADMINISTRATION OF SAID SYSTEM MAY BE COMMITTED TO THE SAME BODY SET UP TO ADMINISTER THE STATEWIDE MUNICIPAL RETIREMENT SYSTEM AUTHORIZED UNDER SECTION 43 OF ARTICLE III PROVIDING FOR THE DRAINING OF AN ELECTION AND THE REGULATION AND ISSUANCE OF THE PROCLAMATION THEREOF.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. THAT ARTICLE XVI OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, BE AMENDED BY ADDING THEREAFTER A NEW SECTION, TO BE NUMBERED SECTION 43, WHICH SHALL READ AS FOLLOWS:

"SECTION 43. THE LEGISLATURE SHALL HAVE THE AUTHORITY TO PROVIDE FOR A STATEWIDE SYSTEM OF RETIREMENT AND DISABILITY BENEFITS FOR APPOINTIVE OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE SEVERAL COUNTIES OF THIS STATE UNDER SUCH A PLAN AND PROGRAM AS THE LEGISLATURE SHALL AUTHORIZE, PROVIDED THAT PARTICIPATION THEREIN BY COUNTIES SHALL BE VOLUNTARY AND AUTHORIZED BY VOTE OF THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF SUCH COUNTY PROVIDING THAT THE LEGISLATURE SHALL NOT BE AUTHORIZED TO MAKE AN APPROPRIATION TO PAY ANY RETIREMENT OR DISABILITY BENEFITS AUTHORIZED HEREIN, AND PROVIDING THAT ADMINISTRATION OF SAID SYSTEM MAY BE COMMITTED TO THE SAME BODY AS MAY BE SET UP TO ADMINISTER THE MUNICIPAL RETIREMENT SYSTEM PROVIDED FOR BY SECTION 43 OF ARTICLE III."

SEC. 2. THE FOREGOING SHALL BE SUBMITTED TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THIS STATE ON THE SECOND THURSDAY IN NOVEMBER, THROUGHOUT THIS STATE ON THE BALLOTS SHALL HAVE PRINTED THEREON THE WORDS "FOR OR AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING A STATEWIDE SYSTEM FOR RETIREMENT AND DISABILITY BENEFITS FOR APPOINTIVE COUNTY OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES."

SEC. 3. THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF TEXAS SHALL ISSUE THE NECESSARY PROCLAMATION FOR SAID ELECTION, AND SHALL HAVE THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT PUBLISHED AS REQUIRED BY THE CONSTITUTION FOR PROPOSED AMENDMENTS THEREOF.

SEC. 4. IF AT SAID ELECTION A MAJORITY OF THE VOTES ARE "FOR OR AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING A STATEWIDE SYSTEM FOR RETIREMENT AND DISABILITY BENEFITS FOR APPOINTIVE COUNTY OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES" THE FOREGOING PROPOSED AMENDMENT SHALL BECOME A PART OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, AND PROCLAMATION SHALL BE MADE BY THE GOVERNOR THEREOF.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 27
PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE VII OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS BY ADDING A NEW SECTION AFTER SECTION 14, WHICH SHALL BE DESIGNATED AS SECTION 14A, WHICH SHALL READ AS FOLLOWS:

"SECTION 14A. IN ADDITION TO THE BONDS NOW ENDETERMINED IN SECTION 11 OF ARTICLE VII OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, THE PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND MAY BE INVESTED IN SUCH OTHER SECURITIES, INCLUDING BONDS, PREFERRED STOCKS AND COMMON STOCKS, AS THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS MAY DEEM TO BE PROPER INVESTMENT FOR SAID FUND, PROVIDED HOWEVER THAT NOT MORE THAN FIFTY PER CENT (50%) OF THE SAID FUND SHALL BE INVESTED AT ANY ONE TIME IN STOCKS, NOR SHALL MORE THAN ONE PER CENT (1%) OF THE SAID FUND BE INVESTED IN SECURITIES ISSUED BY ANY ONE CORPORATION, NOR SHALL MORE THAN FIVE PER CENT (5%) OF THE VOTING STOCK OF ANY ONE CORPORATION BE OWNED; AND PROVIDED FURTHER THAT STOCKS ELIGIBLE FOR PURCHASE SHALL BE RESTRICTED TO STOCKS OF COMPANIES INCORPORATED WITHIN THE UNITED STATES WHICH HAVE PAID DIVIDENDS FOR TEN CONSECUTIVE YEARS OR LONGER IMMEDIATELY PRIOR TO THE DATE OF PURCHASE AND WHICH INSURANCE POLICIES ARE LISTED UPON AN EXCHANGE REGISTERED WITH THE SECURITIES AND EXCHANGE COMMISSION, ITS SUCCESSORS OR THE COMMISSION SHALL BE SELF-INSURING."

SEC. 2. THE FOREGOING CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT SHALL BE SUBMITTED TO THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THIS STATE ON THE SECOND THURSDAY IN NOVEMBER, THROUGHOUT THIS STATE ON THE BALLOTS SHALL HAVE PRINTED THEREON THE WORDS "FOR OR AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING A STATEWIDE SYSTEM FOR RETIREMENT AND DISABILITY BENEFITS FOR APPOINTIVE COUNTY OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES."

SEC. 3. THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF TEXAS SHALL ISSUE THE NECESSARY PROCLAMATION FOR SAID ELECTION, AND SHALL HAVE THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT PUBLISHED AS REQUIRED BY THE CONSTITUTION FOR PROPOSED AMENDMENTS THEREOF.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 28
PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE VII OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS BY ADDING A NEW SECTION AFTER SECTION 14, WHICH SHALL BE DESIGNATED AS SECTION 14B, WHICH SHALL READ AS FOLLOWS:

"SECTION 14B. IN ADDITION TO THE BONDS NOW ENDETERMINED IN SECTION 11 OF ARTICLE VII OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, THE PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND MAY BE INVESTED IN SUCH OTHER SECURITIES, INCLUDING BONDS, PREFERRED STOCKS AND COMMON STOCKS, AS THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS MAY DEEM TO BE PROPER INVESTMENT FOR SAID FUND, PROVIDED HOWEVER THAT NOT MORE THAN FIFTY PER CENT (50%) OF THE SAID FUND SHALL BE INVESTED AT ANY ONE TIME IN STOCKS, NOR SHALL MORE THAN ONE PER CENT (1%) OF THE SAID FUND BE INVESTED IN SECURITIES ISSUED BY ANY ONE CORPORATION, NOR SHALL MORE THAN FIVE PER CENT (5%) OF THE VOTING STOCK OF ANY ONE CORPORATION BE OWNED; AND PROVIDED FURTHER THAT STOCKS ELIGIBLE FOR PURCHASE SHALL BE RESTRICTED TO STOCKS OF COMPANIES INCORPORATED WITHIN THE UNITED STATES WHICH HAVE PAID DIVIDENDS FOR TEN CONSECUTIVE YEARS OR LONGER IMMEDIATELY PRIOR TO THE DATE OF PURCHASE AND WHICH INSURANCE POLICIES ARE LISTED UPON AN EXCHANGE REGISTERED WITH THE SECURITIES AND EXCHANGE COMMISSION, ITS SUCCESSORS OR THE COMMISSION SHALL BE SELF-INSURING."

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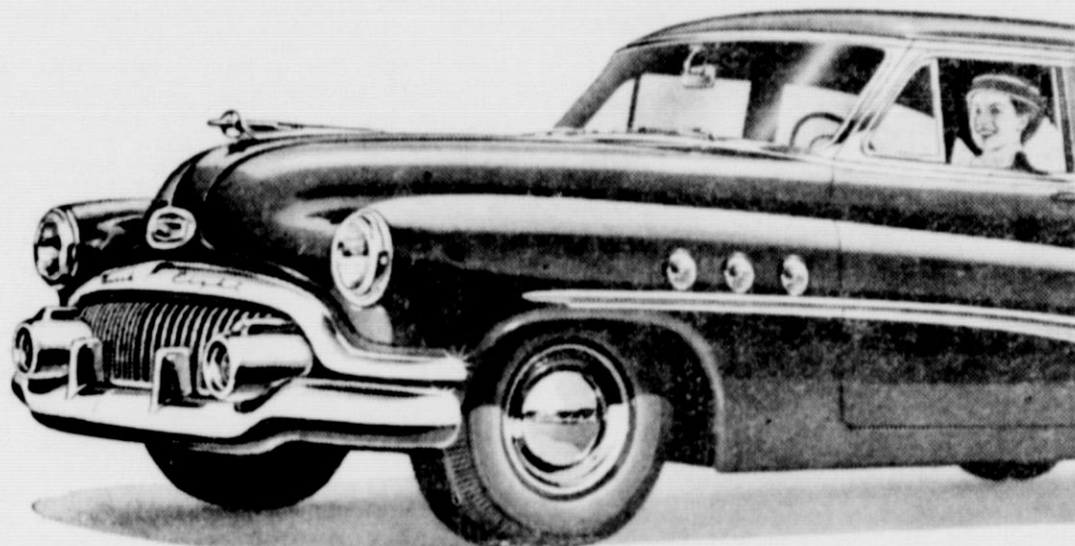

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 6

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AMENDING ARTICLE III, SECTION 51A, PROVIDING THAT THE LEGISLATURE SHALL HAVE THE POWER TO PROVIDE ASSISTANCE TO AND PROVIDE FOR THE PAYMENT OF SAME TO RESIDENTS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS WHO ARE NEEDY AGED PERSONS OVER THE AGE OF SIXTY-FIVE (65) YEARS, NEEDY BLIND PERSONS OVER THE AGE OF SIXTY (60) YEARS, NEEDY CHILDREN UNDER THE AGE OF SIXTEEN (16) YEARS, REMOVING THE THIRTY-FIVE MILLION DOLLAR (\$35,000,000) LIMITATION UPON EXPENDITURES FOR SUCH PURPOSES AND PROVIDING FOR A LIMITATION OF FORTY-TWO MILLION DOLLARS (\$42,000,000) UPON SUCH EXPENDITURES; PROVIDING A MAXIMUM PAYMENT OF THIRTY DOLLARS (\$30) PER MONTH FROM STATE FUNDS FOR OLD AGE ASSISTANCE, PROHIBITING PAYMENT OF ASSISTANCE AFTER DISPOSITION OF PROPERTY UNDER CERTAIN CONDITIONS, PROVIDING FOR THE ACCEPTANCE OF FINANCIAL AID FROM THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA FOR SUCH ASSISTANCE, PROVIDING THAT THE

PAYMENT OF SUCH FROM STATE FUNDS SHALL NEVER EXCEED THE PAYMENTS FROM FEDERAL FUNDS, PROVIDING FOR THE NECESSARY ELECTION, AND PROVIDING FOR THE FORM OF BALLOT, PROCLAMATION AND PUBLICATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. THAT SECTION 51A OF ARTICLE III OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS BE AMENDED, AND THE SAME IS HEREBY AMENDED SO THAT THE SAME SHALL HEREINAFTER READ AS FOLLOWS:

"SECTION 51A. THE LEGISLATURE SHALL HAVE THE POWER, BY GENERAL LAWS TO PROVIDE, SUBJECT TO LIMITATIONS AND RESTRICTIONS HEREIN CONTAINED, AND SUCH OTHER LIMITATIONS, RESTRICTIONS AND REGULATIONS AS MAY BY THE LEGISLATURE BE DEEMED EXPEDIENT FOR ASSISTANCE TO AND FOR PAYMENT OF ASSISTANCE TO:

(1) NEEDY AGED PERSONS WHO ARE OVER THE AGE OF SIXTY-FIVE (65) YEARS, PROVIDED THAT NO SUCH ASSISTANCE SHALL BE PAID TO ANY INMATE OF ANY STATE-SUPPORTED INSTITUTION, WHILE SUCH RESIDENT OF THE STATE, IF OTHERWISE ELIGIBLE, MAY NOT BE EXCLUDED WHOSE PARENT OR OTHER RELATIVE WITH WHOM THE CHILD IS LIVING HAS RESIDED IN THE STATE FOR ONE (1) YEAR IMMEDIATELY PRECEDING THE FILING OF THE APPLICATION FOR SUCH ASSISTANCE, OR IF SAID CHILD IS UNDER THE AGE OF ONE (1) YEAR WHOSE PARENT OR OTHER RELATIVE WITH WHOM THE CHILD IS LIVING HAS RESIDED IN THE STATE FOR ONE (1) YEAR IMMEDIATELY PRECEDING THE BIRTH OF SUCH CHILD;

"THE LEGISLATURE SHALL HAVE THE AUTHORITY TO ACCEPT FROM THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES SUCH FINANCIAL AID FOR THE ASSISTANCE OF THE NEEDY AGED, NEEDY BLIND, AND NEEDY CHILDREN AS SUCH GOVERNMENT MAY OFFER NOT INCONSISTENT WITH THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, PROVIDED, HOWEVER, THAT THE AMOUNT OF SUCH ASSISTANCE SHALL NEVER EXCEED THE AMOUNT PAID BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AND PROVIDED FURTHER THAT THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF SUCH ASSISTANCE SHALL NEVER EXCEED THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF STATE FUNDS FOR SUCH ASSISTANCE TO THE NEEDY AGED, NEEDY BLIND AND NEEDY CHILDREN SHALL NEVER EXCEED THE SUM OF FORTY-TWO MILLION DOLLARS (\$42,000,000) PER YEAR.

"SHOULD THE LEGISLATURE ENACT CERTAIN LEGISLATION PROVIDING AN ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION HERE TO IN ANTICIPATION OF THE RECEIPT OF THIS AMOUNT, SUCH ACTS SHALL NOT BE INVALID BY REASON OF THEIR CHARACTER."

SECTION 2. THE FOREGOING CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT SHALL BE SUBMITTED TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF TEXAS AT THE ELECTION TO BE HELD THROUGHOUT THE STATE OF TEXAS ON THE SECOND TUESDAY IN DECEMBER, 1951, AND THE BALLOT THEREON SHALL BE PRINTED IN SUCH BALLOT THE FOLLOWING:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION GIVING THE LEGISLATURE POWER TO SET UP A SYSTEM OF PAYMENTS OF ASSISTANCE TO NEEDY PERSONS OVER SIXTY-FIVE (65) YEARS OF AGE TO NEEDY CHILDREN UNDER THE AGE OF SIXTEEN (16) YEARS, REMOVING THE THIRTY-FIVE MILLION DOLLAR (\$35,000,000) LIMITATION UPON AMOUNT OF STATE EXPENDITURES FOR SUCH PURPOSES; DISQUALIFYING PERSONS WHO DISPOSE OF PROPERTY UNDER CERTAIN CONDITIONS, PROVIDING A MAXIMUM PAYMENT OF THIRTY DOLLARS (\$30) PER MONTH FROM STATE FUNDS FOR OLD AGE ASSISTANCE, PROHIBITING PAYMENT OF ASSISTANCE AFTER DISPOSITION OF PROPERTY UNDER CERTAIN CONDITIONS, PROVIDING FOR THE ACCEPTANCE OF FINANCIAL AID FROM THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA FOR SUCH ASSISTANCE, PROVIDING THAT THE
