Men Of Draft Age Urged To Report Change Of Status

PLAINVIEW, Texas, March 30.—The secretary of the Floyd, Hale, Swisher and Motley county draft board today warned men of draft age in the four-county area that it is to their advantage to report changes of status which are affected by the draft law.

C. C. McGlasson, the board secretary, said the board especially wanted to warn young married men who have no children to report expected birth of a child.

"If such men don't report the expected birth of a child and they should get an order to report for induction," Mr. McGlasson said, "the board, under the regulations is powerless to defer them."

"If they do report before they get an order," he continued, "the board then puts them in a deferred class because of dependency."

Mr. McGlasson said notification should be in the form of an ordinary certificate from a licensed physician stating that a child has been conceived.

The secretary also warned men who happen to be in college that they must ask the board for a deferment to continue study if they want to be considered.

"The fact that the college reports a student's class standing, or that the board is furnished results of his taking the draft qualification test is not sufficient for the board to give consideration," Mr. McGlasson said.

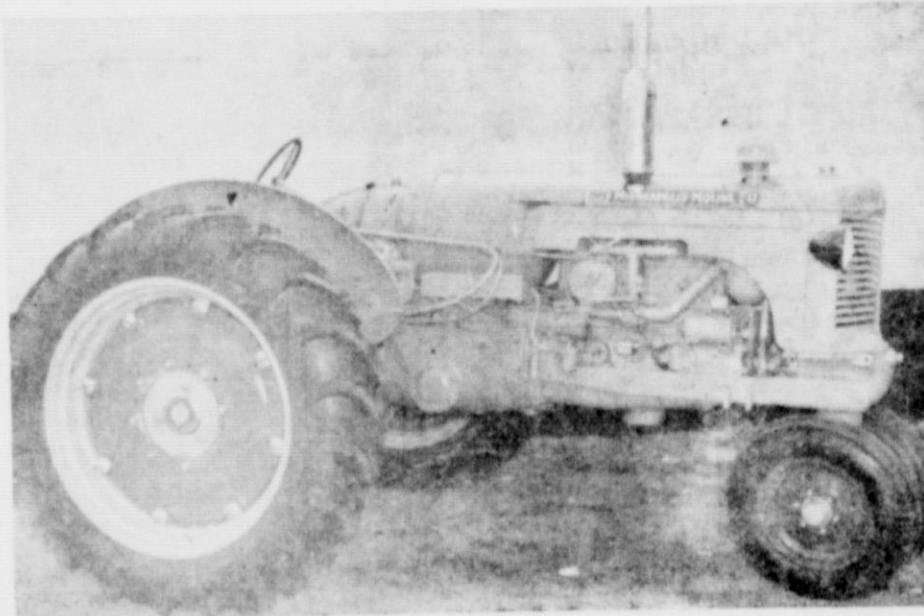
"The student must write the board a letter requesting deferment for this purpose," he continued. "If the student does this, then we can properly consider his request under the regulations."

Palo Duro Canyon Schedules Sunrise Easter Services

CANYON (Special) April 8—Annual sunrise Easter Service in Palo Duro Canyon State Park will be conducted by the Dawn community Baptist church beginning at 6 o'clock Sunday morning.

Site for the service is the Number One Crossing area which will accommodate several hundred parked cars. The Rev. Paul McClung, pastor of the Dawn church will deliver the sermon from the top of a hill which rises out of the red bluffs of the Prairie Dog Town Fork of Red River. 1952 POLITICAL CALENDAR

April 23—Last day for county executive committee to post notice of precinct conventions for political parties desiring to send delegates to the national political convention. Art. 235.

May 3—Precinct conventions meet on the first Saturday in May to elect delegates to county convention. Art. 235.

May 5—Request to have name placed on primary ballot must be filed not later than the first Monday in May. Art. 190.

May 6—County convention meet on first Tuesday after the first Saturday in May to elect delegates to the "first state convention." Art. 235.

May 27—First sworn statement concerning campaign contributions and expenses to be filed by each candidate. "Statements shall and must be filed at intervals of twenty (20) days beginning sixty (60) days next preceding the date of any election." Art. 244.

June 16—Candidates second sworn statement concerning campaign contributions and expenses to be filed. Art. 244.

June 16—County Executive Committee meets on the third Monday in June to estimate and apportion cost of primary among the various candidates for nomination, to "determine by lot" the order of candidates names on the ballot and appoint a subcommittee to make up the official ballot. Arts. 186, 191, 192, and 193.

June 21—Assessments of primary costs due and payable to the county chairman "on or before the Saturday before the fourth Monday in June." Art. 186 and 193.

June 23—Primary subcommittee meets on the fourth Monday in June to make up the official ballot. Art. 192.

June 26—Minors and former

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non-residents who shall have become eligible to vote after January 31st may obtain poll tax exemption certificate from tax collector "not later than thirty (30) days before any election." Art. 49.

July 6-7—Candidates third sworn statement concerning campaign contributions and expenses should be filed. Art. 244.

July 6—Applications for absentee ballot may be made "at any time not more than twenty (20) days, nor less than three (3) days," prior to the date of such an election. Art. 37.

July 16—Notice of hour and place of precinct conventions to be posted by County Chairman "at least ten (10) days prior" to said convention. Art. 212.

July 21—Fourth sworn statement by candidates concerning campaign contributions and expenditures to be filed "not more than five (5) days nor less than two (2) days prior" to the election. Art. 244.

July 22—Last day to apply for absentee ballot. Sec. 37.

July 23—Last day of candidates to file fourth sworn statement concerning campaign contributions and expenditures. Art. 244.

July 26—First Primary Election held on "the fourth Saturday in July." Art. 181.

August 2—Second County convention meets "on the first Saturday after primary election day." Art. 212.

August 3—Absentee ballots for second primary may be applied for "at any time not more than twenty (20) days, nor less than three (3) days," prior to the date of such election. Art. 37.

August 4—Candidates appearing on the "run-off primary" ballot must file sworn statement concerning campaign contributions and expenses "not more than twenty (20) nor less than fifteen (15) days" preceding such second primary election. Art. 244.

August 7—Candidates in the first primary must file a sworn supplemental statement concerning campaign contributions and expenses "not less (apparently) than ten (10) days after the election." Art. 244, section (c).

August 8—Election contests must be filed "within ten (10) days from the date of declaring the result by the executive committee." Art. 28.

August 8—Last day for candidates in the run-off primary to file first sworn statement concerning campaign contributions and expenditures. Art. 244.

August 18—Run-off candidates to file second sworn statement concerning campaign contributions and expenditures "not more than five (5) days nor less than two (2) days" prior to said run-off primary. Art. 244.

August 19—Last day to apply for absentee ballot. Art. 37.

August 20—Last day for run-off candidates to file second sworn statement concerning campaign contributions and expenditures. Art. 244.

August 23—1:00 p. m.—County Clerk to deliver absentee ballots to special canvassing board. Art. 37, subdivisions 5 and 6.

Sept. 2—Candidates in the second primary election must file a sworn supplemental statement concerning campaign contributions and expenses "not less (apparently) than ten (10) days" after the election. Art. 244.

Oct. 15—Time for nominees in November general election to file third sworn statement concerning campaign contributions and expenditures. Art. 244.

Oct. 15—Applications for absentee ballot may be made "at any time not more than twenty (20) days, nor less than three (3) days" prior to the date of such an election. Art. 37.

Oct. 30—Nominees in November general election must file sworn statement concerning campaign contributions and expenditures "not more than five (5) nor less than two (2) days" prior to the election. Art. 244.

Oct. 31—Last day to apply for absentee ballot. Art. 37.

Nov. 1—Last day for nominees to make fourth sworn statement concerning campaign contributions and expenditures. Art. 244.

To the eligible veterans, the Veterans of Foreign Wars offers an opportunity to serve the community in which he lives and his country—plus the chance to help protect the benefits to which he is entitled under the law.

The membership dues in the average Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars seldom exceed the nominal sum of \$4.00 per year. This is an insignificant investment for the eligible veteran who appreciates the opportunity to help preserve and protect certain government benefits to which he, or his loved ones, may be presently entitled—and other benefits for which he, or his dependents, may be qualified under future emergencies.

Compare the small investment of \$4.00 per year to an insurance premium amounting to at least \$200 annually, which non-veterans would be required to pay in exchange for equal benefits.

Every benefit being granted to veterans by the federal government can be credited to the Veterans of Foreign Wars, which all veteran legislation is established today.

Every eligible veteran owes it to himself, and to his dependents, to subscribe to the one form of "insurance protection"—membership in the Veterans of Foreign Wars—that will help safeguard benefits to which he is entitled.

GOVERNMENT BENEFITS

- Free hospitalization for service-connected disabilities in government hospitals, including necessary medical or surgical treatment. Free hospitalization and medical treatment, for non-service-connected disabilities, optional in discretion of Veterans Administration.
- Out-patient and dental treatment, and prosthetic appliances.
- Vocational rehabilitation, including education or on-the-job training, for service-disabled war veterans.
- Domiciliary care in VA Homes or State Soldiers Homes for veterans unable to earn a livelihood due to permanent physical ailments from accidents or old age.
- Compensation ranging from \$15 to \$360 monthly for war veterans with 10 per cent or more service-connected disabilities.
- Compensation ranging from \$12 to \$288 monthly for peacetime veterans with 10 per cent or more service-connected disabilities.
- Dependency allowances for dependents of veterans who are service-disabled 50 per cent or more.
- Pensions from \$60 to \$120 monthly for war veterans (90 days or more of honorable service) with permanent, total non-service-connected disabilities.
- Compensation for widows and dependent children of service-deceased war veterans starting at \$75 per month for a widow, plus allowances for children.
- Pensions for widows and dependent children of deceased World War I veterans starting at \$42 per month for widows, plus extra allowances for children. Same pension provision applies to widows and dependent children of deceased World War II veterans where said veterans had some degree of service-connected disability at time of death.
- Pensions for Spanish-American War veterans ranging from \$60 to \$120 monthly.
- Payment by the VA of up to \$10,000 on a specially constructed house on behalf of any veteran who has lost the use of his two lower limbs in service.
- Payment by the Veterans Administration up to \$1,600 on an automobile for a veteran of World War II or service after June 26, 1950, when the veteran has lost the use of one or both feet or hands or is substantially blind, such disability having been incurred in service.
- Aid to World War II veterans in obtaining loans for homes or business.
- Burial allowance of \$150 for all veterans, regardless of the size of estate left to the next of kin.
- Free burial privileges in any National Cemetery.
- Flag for nearest kin when any veteran dies.
- Special preference in Civil Service employment.
- Free access to the help of U. S. Employment Service and Veterans Placement Service in every state.

V. F. W. BENEFITS

- Free assistance from Service Officer, Employment Officer and Welfare Officer, in every VFW Post.
- Free access to the help of V.F.W. National Rehabilitation Service in each Regional Office of the V.A.
- Representation before Service Department Boards in Washington, D. C., as to retirement and correction of service records.
- Deposit of copies of service records with Post Service Officers so as to insure prompt action in establishing entitlement to hospitalization or to establish eligibility to benefits for widows and orphans in event of veteran's death.
- Protection of existing veteran benefits, and the enactment of new laws favoring veterans, through representation by the V.F.W. National Legislative Service.
- Free admission to the V.F.W. National Homes for the widows and orphans of deceased V.F.W. members.
- The opportunity to participate in V.F.W. social activities and facilities on the Post level.
- The right to wear and display the emblem of membership in the only veteran organization that is composed exclusively of overseas veterans.

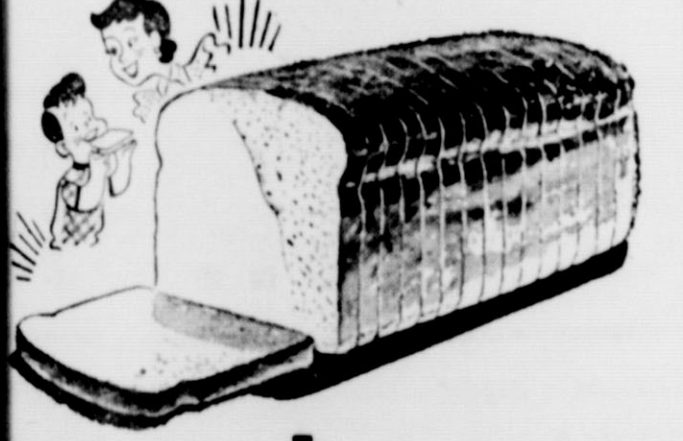

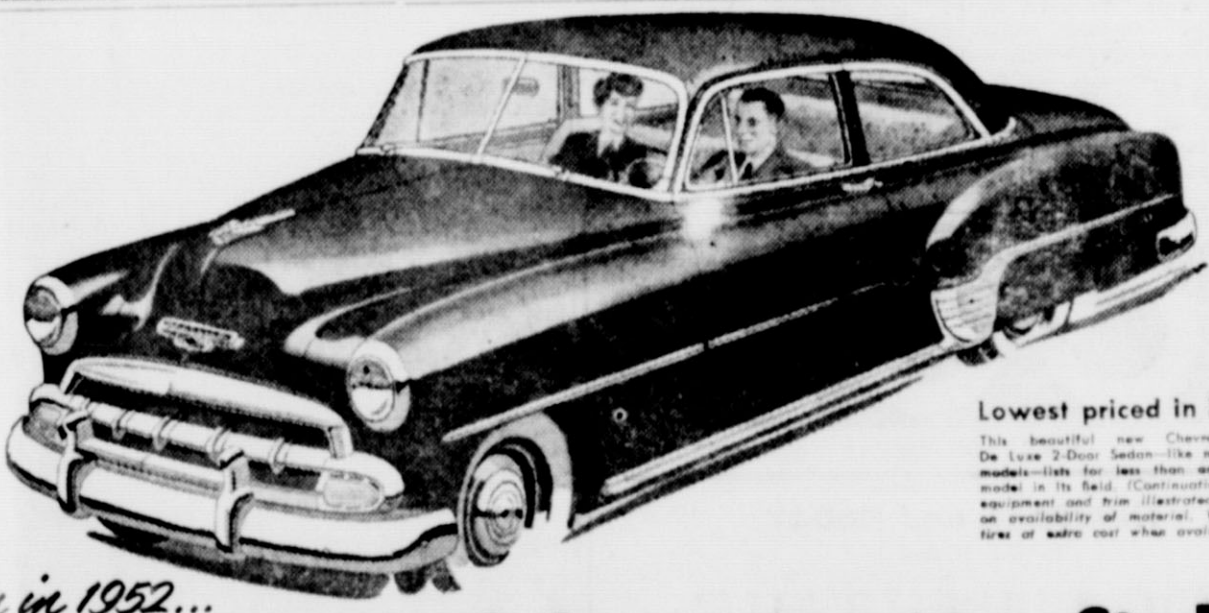

Motorists Warned On Car Inspection

"Time is a wasting" and the first thing several thousand Texas motor vehicle owners know it will be September 7th—and too late.

This was the advice of Jim Riddles, former Lubbock Highway patrolman, now with the State Department of Public Safety (Motor Vehicle Inspection Division) who was here this week.

He said Motley county has approximately 1,000 automobiles and that only about one-seventh of them have been inspected. The county has at present three approved stations (Matador Auto and Campbell Chevrolet in Matador and Braselton Implement Company in Roaring Springs).

Chief G. W. Busby of the SDPS of Austin has issued a statement in which he declares the state's 2,700 approved inspection stations are inspecting 50,000 cars per week, but that they will have to double their capacity to inspect all the cars in the state before the deadline, September 7th.

He declared there can be no further extension of the deadline and operators of vehicles not inspected by September 7th will be subject to arrest. The law provides a fine not to exceed \$200 for any person guilty of operating a vehicle after September 7, which has not been inspected and approved.

GRASS DRILLS OFFERED

Through the Soil Conservation Service vocational agriculture department of the Matador high school has secured three grass drills which are available to the public. A small charge is made for use of the drills (sufficient only to maintain repair on the machines). A commercial fertilizer spreader (made available through Doc Taylor) is also offered under the same terms.

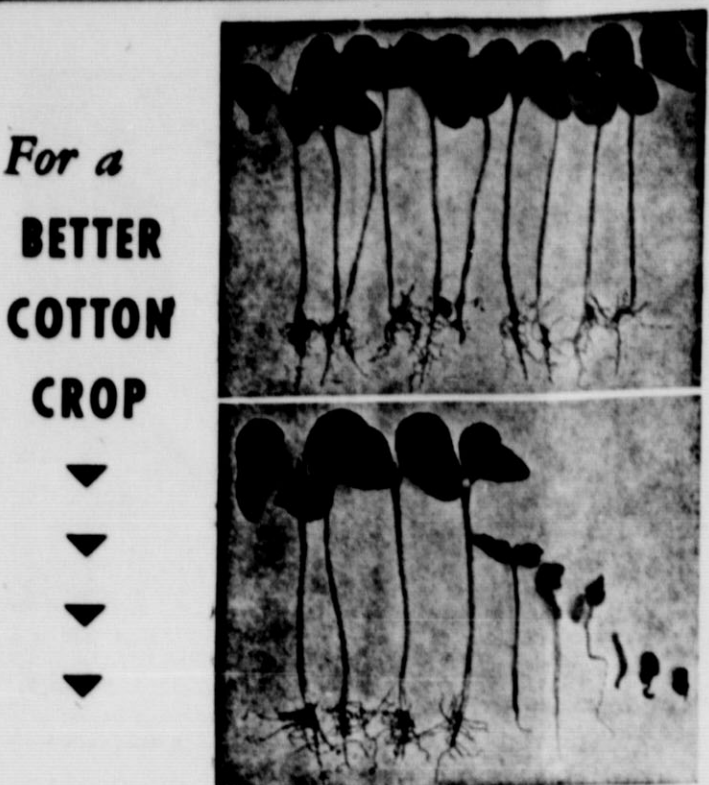

The photo above shows ten good cotton seedlings, well on the way to the kind of growth which can produce a good crop of cotton. This is the result you may expect when properly treated cottonseed is planted... seed that has been treated with a recommended seed disinfectant. Below, the effects of seed decay, sore-shin, and both pre-emergence and post-emergence damping-off are illustrated. This seed was not treated and this is one reason why it is often necessary to replant. Treated seed can be planted 3 to 5 days earlier—can get off to a good start even in cool weather. Once a good stand is established and growing well your chance for a better cotton crop increases.
