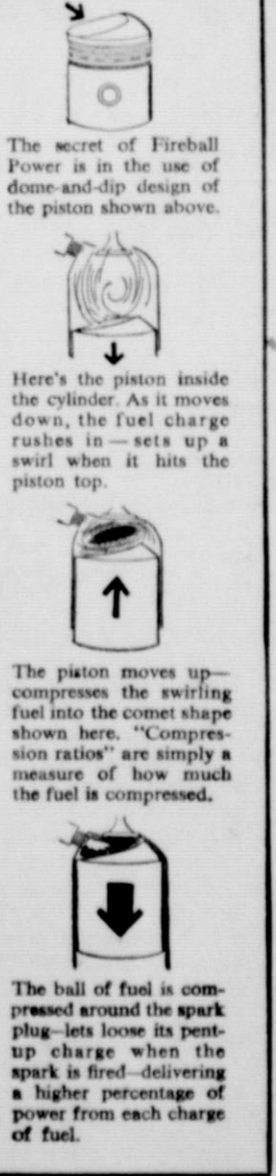

FIRST BALE

into the lint of the first bale late Monday when Mr. Lynn drove under the suction. It was found, however, that he did not have enough snaps to gin out a standard bale and he went back to his field. Shortly before noon Tuesday he brought in sufficient cotton to complete the bale. No report has been received of cotton being ginned elsewhere in the county altho growers declare several bales are ready for gathering in early cotton fields.

The first bale of 1950 cotton was ginned August 28, 7 days earlier than this year's first bale and was grown by Boone Simpson of Northfield. First bale of cotton ginned from 1949's 35,000 bale crop was on Aug. 20th.

Roaring Springs Gins Two Bales

A later report received yesterday by the Tribune said two bales of 1951 cotton had been ginned at Roaring Springs. Both bales were grown by the same farmer, Elbert Mitchell of the Darden Canyon community. He ginned the first bale about 1:30 Tuesday at the Red Ball Gin. From 1,940 pounds of snaps he received a 580-pound bale which graded good middling. Ennis Moss, manager of the plant paid 35¢ per pound for the bale and at the rate of \$67 per ton for the 810 pounds of seed.

Roaring Springs merchants and businessmen contributed a total price of \$102 in cash for the first bale. Mr. Mitchell said he gathered the bale of cotton

from about six acres and estimates that two-thirds of the cotton still awaits maturity and harvest. He said, however, that the average of his 280 acres in cotton will be less, probably one-fourth of a bale per acre.

Mr. Mitchell was ginning his second bale of 1951 cotton yesterday afternoon at the Roaring Springs gin but information regarding the size, grade and turnout was not immediately available.

OPS SPECIALIST TO BE AT COURT HOUSE NEXT WEEK
