

Reeves Wins State Representative Contest

Many Contests End With Photo-Finish In Primary Election; Three County Run-Offs

ELBERT REEVES of Matador has been elected State Representative from the newly-created 88th District. It was not easy. His opponent, Jimmy Faulkner of Clarendon waged a short, effective campaign that brought the vote-counting to a photo finish. Childress county was counting votes late Sunday and it was not until about ten o'clock Sunday night that Mr. Reeves could be certain that he had received slightly less than 400 majority from the approximately 9,000 votes cast in the four counties of Donley, Hall, Childress and Motley. His home county gave the new State Representative about 86% of its votes (1,083 to 190). It is the second time in Motley county's history to send a resident to the state legislature, and the first time a native son has been elected. Previous to the war the late Paul Eubank held the office and was Representative when he lost his life in the service. (G. E. Hamilton was a resident of Childress when he went to the legislature early in the century).

New Representative



Elbert Reeves, above, Motley county farmer and stockraiser, Saturday was nominated as State Representative from the four county 88th District, composed of Donley, Hall, Childress and Motley counties. He was opposed by Jimmy Faulkner of Clarendon. Reeves received 4,592 votes to Faulkner's 4,195.

Vance Gilbreath defeated Fred G. Simpson, Jr. 773 to 534 for the office of county judge and ex-officio county superintendent. The only other county race decided by Saturday's primary was the photo-finish in the precinct two commissioners race when J. E. Monk retained his office by a 2-vote majority over Varner McWilliams (134 to 132).

Three County Run-Offs

Three county races will require run-offs. Sheriff John Stotts (628) and J. D. Spray (545) will be candidates in the second primary, August 23rd. Other votes in the sheriff's race were: Garnett 64 and Echols 96. Largest vote for any office, 1,333, was polled in the sheriff's race. Next was the judge's race in which 1,307 votes were polled. District and County Clerk Pat Sheridan (unopposed) received the largest number of votes, 1,283. Largest number of votes for any opposed candidate was received by Elbert Reeves. Precinct one polled 687 votes, more than half of the county's voting strength.

In the commissioners race here Tom Berryman will meet L. H. Dirickson in a run-off contest August 23. Berryman received 298 votes and Dirickson 172. Other candidates in the race were Jimmy Green 118 and T. E. Long 93. Roaring Springs (precinct four) will also have a run-off in the commissioners race. Charley Posey received 107, Charlie Brooks 104, C. B. Glenn 20 and Billy Hand 83.

Henry Pipkin received 684 votes in the two precinct one boxes for the office of Justice of the Peace. Joe B. Meador (write-in) was elected precinct chairman with 23 votes. In Precinct four J. D. Mitchell received 43 write-in votes to re-elect him to the office of Justice of the Peace. Out at Northfield T. B. (Boone) Simpson, the only unopposed commissioner (Precinct three) in the county received 55 of the 60 votes polled. District Races "Hot"

Hottest races in the primary were in the 110th Judicial District for District Attorney (Motley, Dickens, Floyd and Briscoe) John Stapleton was re-elected against Enos T. Jones with less than 100 majority.

In the race for Senator, 30th Senatorial District, A. J. Rogers of Childress, defeated Harold M. LaFont of Plainview by about 5,000 votes in the 15 counties. NEXT WEEK read how Motley county voted in Saturday's Primary election. NOTE: Although the election has been canvassed in this and other West Texas counties, returns in this issue of the Tribune are unofficial.

Disatisfaction with the present method of selecting presidential and vice-presidential candidates at the state nominating convention, was expressed. The Saturday precinct convention was unanimous in approving a resolution submitted by Howard Traweck to seek a unified state employed by many states in the selection of a presidential and vice-presidential nominee. The chair appointed a committee to prepare the resolution and offer it at the county convention, Saturday. The committee is composed of Douglas Meador (chairman), C. W. Giesecke and Elbert Reeves.

Marvin Patton was named secretary and registered the approximately 20 Democrats who attended the precinct meeting. All attending were named as delegates to the county convention.

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Democrats Select Sparkman as Stevenson's Running Mate

Overtures Made To Solid South Voter

The Democrats dipped into the Deep South Saturday to pick Alabama's Senator John J. Sparkman as running mate for Presidential Nominee Adlai Stevenson in the critical November battle against the GOP tent General Eisenhower and Senator Richard Nixon.

President Truman enthusiastically endorsed the selection of Sparkman.

"We have a winning ticket," he said jubilantly. "There's not a better man alive than John Sparkman."

The arena was half empty and the once-seething galleries almost devoid of life when a motion picture of Sparkman's record in the Senate was shown. Sparkman was named by Acclamation easily carried.

Presidential Nominee Stevenson, fresh-looking despite a limited amount of sleep, escorted the big, curly haired and handsome Sparkman to the rostrum.

"You have inspected some of the finest political livestock in

the United States", Stevenson told the delegates in his cultured manner. "Now I present a prize human animal for your approbation—Senator Sparkman—who will give me all the strength I need, all the heart you need, and give America what we all need."

Sparkman beamed his happiness over the nomination.

"I promise to do everything I can to keep this country great and make it greater," he pledged. He reviewed briefly the committee battles over "the platform on which we can stand and with which we can go to the country and win."

And it was on that note, with Sparkman's wife and beautiful daughter on the stand with him, surrounded by the happy hierarchy, that the convention ended at 1:21 p. m. CST.

The 53-year-old Sparkman was selected by Stevenson and the president shortly before 3 a. m. CST in the convention hall room to which the chief executive and the new presidential nominee had repaired at the end of a tumultuous session.

Battle-scarred, home-sick dele-

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gates quickly approved the choice after one last convulsive demonstration during which they stomped around the arena bearing "Sparkman for Veep" signs which had been ordered printed through the night.

That the vice president nominee would be a Southerner was a foregone conclusion. Not in a quarter of a century has the party made more open-faced overtures to that stronghold below the Mason Dixon Line than during the Chicago convention.

Northern liberals rejoiced in their determination to force an all-out "loyalty pledge" on the South, accepted a watered down civil rights plank and elimination of an antifilibuster resolution and in other ways co-operated in the task of patching the wounds opened in the political session of 1948.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees, providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electorate, and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution, of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows: "Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for

the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines

the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

Each voter shall mark out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot,

leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear that a majority of the votes cast in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State (July 31; August 7, 14, 21, 28, 1952)

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships

may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that

a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the

same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

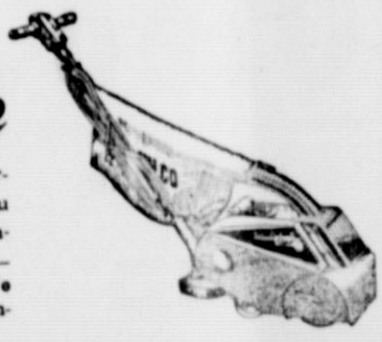
