Caldwell Smith Is Elected President

VETERAN of World War I, Caldwell Smith of Roaring Springs, was elected president of the Old Settlers association when the 29th annual reunion closed with a business session Friday afternoon. Mrs. John Smith, grandmother of Caldwell Smith, was the first president of the organization when it was formed in 1923. Other officers elected include H. H. Havis of Havis of Havis, vice-president; Mrs. Frank Gillispie of Roaring Springs, secretary; John Shirley of Roaring Springs, director; Curtis Meador of Matador, director; Ward Rattan of Matador, president of the rodeo division; Clark Meador of Matador, director of the rodeo division; and Meador of Matador, director.

The new officials were elected unanimously on the recommendation of a nominating committee composed of Elbert Reeves, Mel Thacker and Ed D. Smith. The business session Friday afternoon closed the two-day reunion. The largest of the entire history of the organization was beginning with the rodeo and "backpack wedding", and the dancing. GEESCKE NAMED COUNTY CHAIRMAN OF BLOOD DRIVE

Wounded fighting men on the battlefields of Korea may live again to their homes. This is the goal of the blood drive being conducted by citizens of Motley county. Through the county chapter of the American Red Cross a drive will be made here as secure as much of the precious fluid as possible.

Miss Gene Fitzsimmons, Red Cross field representative of Matador met Friday afternoon at the District Court room with a group of civic leaders for the purpose of organizing the drive. Judge C. W. Giescke has named county chairman and tentative dates were set for the first week in December.

"Blood donated by Motley county citizens will be picked up by a Red Cross truck," Miss Fitzsimmons declared. "and transported directly by air to the West Coast and thence to Korea." The minimum for the drive is 150 pints, she declared. The appeal is made to adults and persons between the ages of 17 and 21 will be allowed to participate. Those under age must have their parents' consent. All interested organizations and individuals will be asked to support the drive. December 3rd has been selected as the date for the Red Cross "Blood-mobile" to be here if the date is acceptable to the Red Cross.

Chest X-Ray Drive Plans Completed

Plans are completed for the second Motley county drive for mass X-ray chest examinations according to J. R. Emmons, chairman of the movement. The examinations, which are free, will start at 8:30 a. m. Tuesday morning, September 9th, and continue without intermission until 5:30 p. m. daily for four days, September 10, 11 and 12. All school children, age 15 and over, are urged to receive examinations Tuesday. The tests will be conducted in the American Legion building in Matador. It is not necessary to be a resident of the county to receive this free test.

School Enrollment Shows Boys Lead

Thirteen more boys than girls are enrolled in Matador schools this year, and total enrollment dropped between 15 and 20 students in high school, according to school officials.

School started Monday with a total enrollment of 311 pupils, 162 boys and 149 girls. Of the total, 244 were elementary pupils and 67 high school. In grade school there are 124 boys and 120 girls, and in high school 38 boys and 29 girls.

City Considers Buying Street Grading Machine

Faced with a maintenance problem that involves approximately \$100,000 worth of paving which property owners have paid for and voted upon themselves, the city council Tuesday night considered the feasibility of buying a grading machine.

In most instances except where the street is paved to the curb, shoulders of the approximately 35 blocks of ribbon paving show rapid deterioration and badly in need of maintenance. In addition to the urgent need of a machine to maintain paving, many blocks of unpaved streets are rough, poorly drained and full of "chug holes." Improvement

of general drainage conditions in the city was cited as partly justifying the investment in the new machine.

Since the city's needs in grading equipment are limited to periods following rainfall and other infrequent intervals, the council considered the purchase of a small machine which was estimated to cost in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

With more than five years without any kind of tax or valuation increase, the council faced the probable need to raise taxes in event the plan to purchase the grader is developed.

More Water is Problem
"Matador has many problems" Mayor Douglas Meador declared "and at the top of the list is the production of more water for the town's growing requirements. The supply must be augmented before another summer. We have an obligation to preserve the property owners' investment in paving by proper maintenance, but if a choice must be made, the water must come first. Water is the life blood of a community and without it the community perishes."

Consideration in the city's purchase of a maintainer was deferred until a future meeting when estimates of cost will be available. Also of top interest is a financing plan, which will not impair the city's credit position.

Annual meeting of the stockholders of the Matador National Farm Loan Association will be held Saturday (September 6) in the American Legion building at 3:30. It was announced this week by Tom Hamilton, secretary-treasurer. All stockholders and their wives are invited.

The Federal Land Bank has been operating in Motley county for 34 years," Mr. Hamilton declared, "and it has served hundreds of farmers and ranchers. It has been the means of many of our citizens becoming homeowners. Loans are made at 4% over a long period of years and with reasonable annual or semi-annual payments which repay both principal and interest."

Fast Moving Rodeo Plays To Capacity Crowds Two Nights

FROM a humble beginning with some calf-roping contests a few years ago, Old Settlers rodeo has become the outstanding attraction. Enthusiastic fans acclaim the shows produced Thursday and Friday evenings by Ward Rattan as equalling many professional rope and saddle entertainments.

Crowds were limited by the capacity of the rodeo grounds and seating facilities. At a meeting of the directors held at the home of newly-elected president Caldwell Smith, Saturday evening, plans were being considered to enlarge the rodeo next year.

The directors are considering having three nights of rodeo and doubling the seating of the rodeo grandstand. A better system of gate collection to prevent "seepage" without paying admission will be arranged and Mr. Rattan's staff will be enlarged.

Mr. Rattan said that costs of the increased rodeo were staggering. The use of livestock, freight, feed etc. amounted to over \$1,100. The cost of rodeo stock, however, is based on the show and not the number of days. The charge would be the same for three or four performances as it is for two.

Receiving praise of the directors with Mr. Rattan (president of the rodeo division) were the members of his efficient staff of assistants.

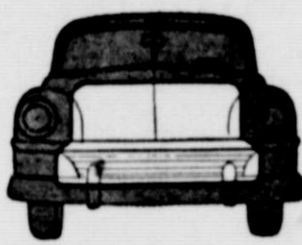

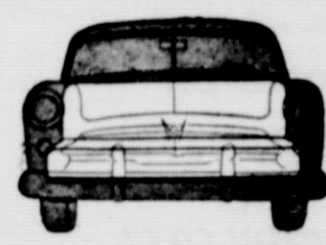
