## **Cotton Menanced by**

#### PLANS STARTED TO **SECURE 150 PINTS BLOOD FOR KOREA**

A drive sponsored jointly by hree organizations, Fleming Post American Legion, Motley County Chapter Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Matador Lions club, may seek to procure 150 pints of blood for wounded veterans on the battlefield of Korea.

Announcement was made fuesday by Lions President Ralph Stapleton, that the civic organization would cooperate with the two veterans' organizations.

Boss Lion Stapleton said de tails were still incomplete and that a date for the American Red Cross portable bloodmobile to be here would be announced later. He said the portable unit could be here only six hours. Further information will be published in a later issue of the Tribune after the plans are complete



#### **Farmers Spreading Poison Effectively** HERE WE GO again. On one side drought is threaten-

ing to destroy the county's excellent prospects for a bumper crop and on the other hand boll worms and leaf worms (usually associated with rainy years) are chewing up the gold-plated crop.

County Agent Rufus Em mons yesterday declared boll worms are spreading avoc in fields in the Roaring Springs arca. "Over 12,000

pounds of poison have been used with very satisfactory results ' he declared. "One of the most common mistakes," Mr. Emmons declared, "is that farmers do not follow recommendations in the use of spray equipment. The sprays should be 20 to 24 inches from the cotton.

Mr. Emmons said four fields examined Tuesday afternoon showed kill of boll worms 75% to 80% effective after poisoning. Hollis Godfrey and Poke Cooper of Roaring Springs area were among the first to use poison this season, he declared. They received very good results.

Mr. Emmons said one pound of DDT per acre is sufficient to kill boll worms but if leaf worms are present it is necessary to apply one pound of toxaphene per acre. The county agent said farmers should begin the use of poison when four or five eggs or worms are found in 100 stalks of examined cotton. The use of poison is very effective in the control of boll worms Mr. Emmons said, if applied in the proper mixture and with the proper pressure. Two applications (5 to 7 days apart) are usually required.
