## Matador graduate endows scholarship at Texas A&M

College Station -- Gary W. Markham, a 1967 graduate of Matador High School, now of Manvel, Texas, has donated \$25,000 to endow a scholarship in the Dwight Look College of Engineering at Texas A&M University.

The Gary W. Markham '71 Scholarship will be available to students who graduate from Motley County High School, and are full-time engineering students in good standing at Texas A&M.

Markham is a principal owner, director and chief operating officer of the Rimkus Consulting Group, which provides consulting engineering services, including construction accident investigation, damage assessment and litigation support, for cor-

porate clients, contractors, insurance companies and law firms.

Markham is a fourth-generation Texan. In his senior year of high school, he visited Texas A&M with his school principal and decided to apply to study engineering.

"My father would have made a much better engineer than I, given the opportunity for an education," Markham said. "As it was, I was the first person on either side of my family to graduate from college. I was fortunate enough to receive some financial assistance so I could go to college, and I want to make sure other students from Motley County have that same opportunity."

Markham graduated from Texas A&M in 1972 with a bachelor's degree

in mechanical engineering. He worked for Celanese Coatings Company from 1972 to 1974 before going to work in the industrial construction business, building chemical plants, refineries, pipelines and marine terminals. Markham worked for the Erbauer Construction Corporation in Pasadena, Texas, from 1974-1984.

In 1984, he joined Main Constructors of Atlanta, Ga., as manager of technical services. From 1985-1986, Markham was director of construction engineering for Parsons Construction Services in Houston. He assumed his current position with Rimkus in 1986.

Markham has completed OSHA's Hazardous Waste Operations and Emergency Response (HAZWOPER) course and supervisor's course, as well as 40

hours of basic mediation training at A.A. White Dispute Resolution Institute.

A registered professional engineer, Markham is a member of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, the National Society of Professional Engineers, the Texas Society of Professional Engineers, the American Society of Safety Engineers and the American Association of Cost Engineers. He is also a member of the Construction Specifications Institute and the Dispute Avoidance and Resolution Task Force of the Construction Industry.

Markham is also president and owner of Matador Services in Baytown. Founded in 1987, the company performs industrial and petrochemical contract maintenance and construction services.

## Area crops in stress from Summer heat

Motley County cotton and rangelands are feeling heat stress from summer sun and hot damaging winds. Most fields did not receive adequate moisture in the month of June, but cotton is still in fair condition.

Motley County National Weather Service volunteers report the total rainfall for June:

## \$213.3 million in sales tax revenues allocated

### Roaring Springs shows big increase over last year

Austin -- Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander sent Texas cities and counties \$213.3 million in monthly sales tax rebates on Monday, June payments to the 1,108 Texas cities and 119 counties that impose a sales tax are up 7 percent compared to the \$199.3 million rebated in June, 2000. Year-to-date sales tax rebates are up 5.4 percent, compared to 2000.

Comptroller Rylander sent sales tax rebates totaling \$196.6 million to Texas cities, 7 percent higher than last June's payments of \$183.6 million. Rebates of \$16.6 million to Texas counties were up 6.4 percent compared to allocations of \$15.6 million in June, 2000.

In addition to city and county

sales tax rebates, the state's six metropolitan transit authorities and two city transit departments received \$73.5 million. Another \$7.3 million went to 59 special purpose districts.

June sales tax rebates represent sales taxes collected in April and reported to the Comptroller in May.

Matador, with a current rate of 1.000%, received \$1,433.47, compared to \$1,684.14 last year, a -14.88% change. 2001 payments to date total \$14,597.35, compared to \$16,378.40 at this time last year, a -10.87% change.

Roaring Springs, with a current rate of 2.000%, received \$1,668.18, compared to \$972.52 last year, a 71.53% change. 2001 payments total \$15,778.08, compared to \$5,696.85 at this time last year, a 176.96% change.

## Allocation approved for South Plains Workforce Development Area

Austin -- The Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) announced last week its approval of a \$13,832,588 allocation to fund workforce services for the South Plains Workforce Development Area (SPWDA) for fiscal year 2002. The area consists of Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry and Yoakum counties. SPWDA is one of 28 local workforce development areas throughout the state that, along with TWC comprise the Texas Workforce Network. The network provides a wide variety of services for Texas' employers, job seekers and workers. The services are primarily provided through federal funding and are generally free to all Texans. Though operating funds are allocated by TWC, determination of how the funds can best be utilized is the responsibility of the South Plains Workforce Development Board.

The money allocated to the area will be used to fund a variety of programs including:

- Workforce Investment Act (WIA) - WIA provides employment and training services for disadvantaged adults and disadvantaged youth. Services are designed to increase the employment, retention, and earnings of participants, and increase their occupational skill attainment. WIA also offers unique programs for persons who have lost their jobs in mass layoffs or plant

closings, or who have been laid off and are unlikely to return to their jobs.

- Child Care Services - The local board designs and manages the delivery of services that offer affordable, accessible, quality child care for low-income families and welfare recipients. Child care services promote long-term self-sufficiency by enabling parents to work or attend education or training activities.

- Choices - This service is used to help welfare recipients transition from welfare to work. Funded through the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) block grant, Choices provides job search and job readiness classes, basic skills training, vocational training and support services including transportation to promote self-sufficiency.

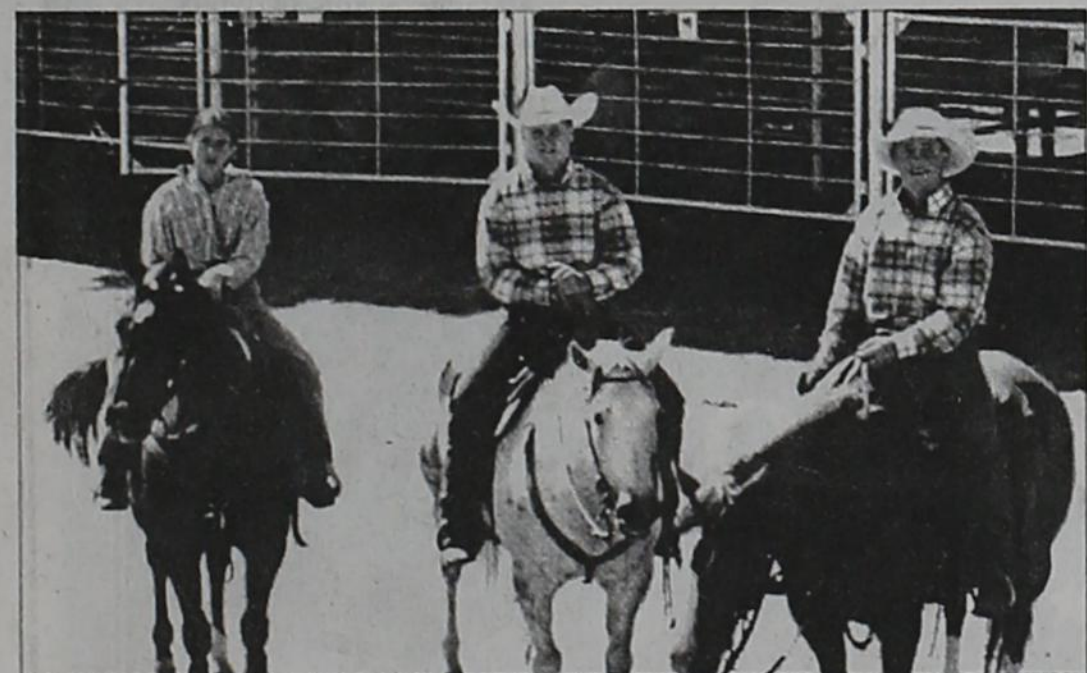
- Food-Stamp Employment and Training (FSE&T) - FSE&T assist food stamp recipients to become self-supporting through participation in employment, job readiness, education and training activities, and related support services including transportation.

- Employment Services (ES) - ES helps employers find qualified workers for their openings by screening applicant lists, scheduling interviews and arranging space for the interviews if necessary. ES also provides job search assistance to workers and in many areas includes job search seminars.

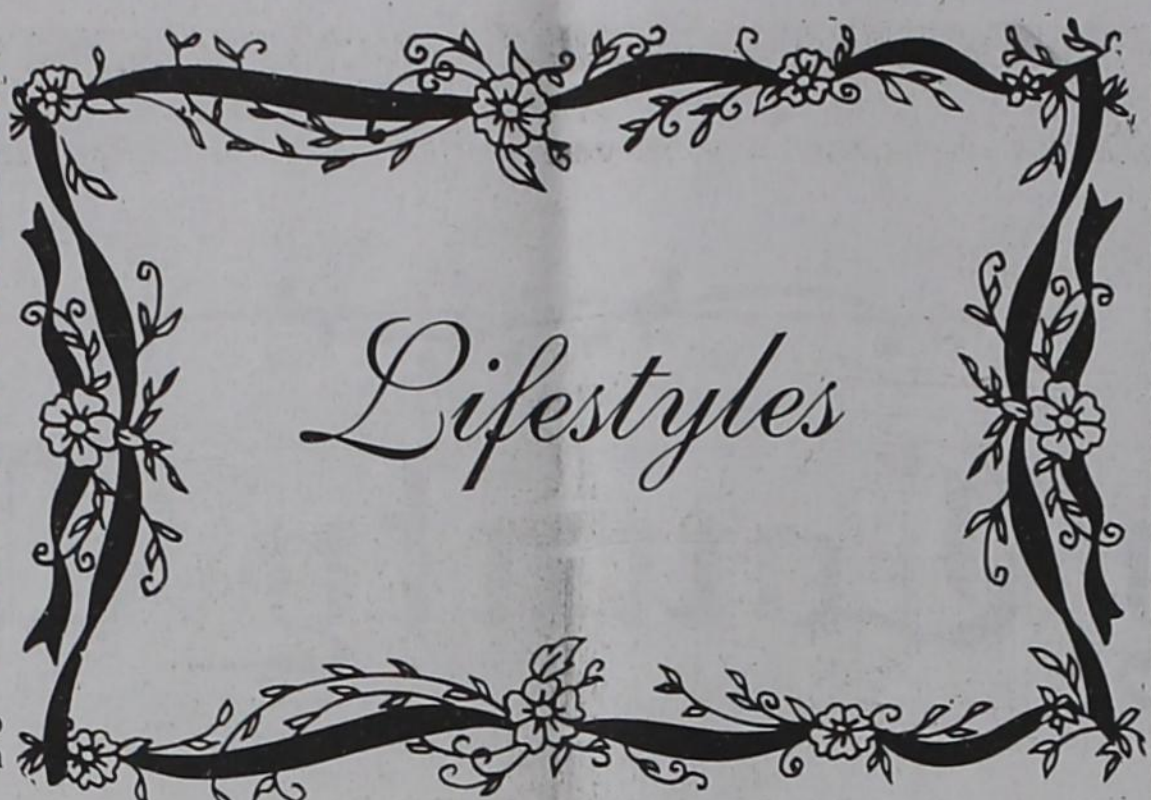
## Grandson featured in "Spotlight on Kids"

"Love is when your puppy licks your face even after you left him alone all day."

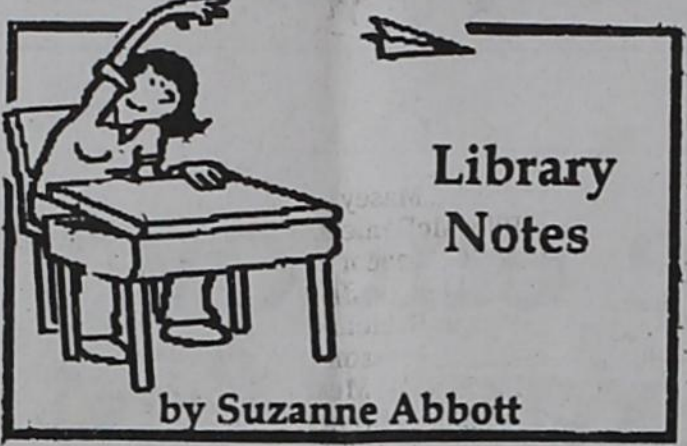
"I know my older sister loves me because she gives me all her old clothes and has to go out and buy new ones."

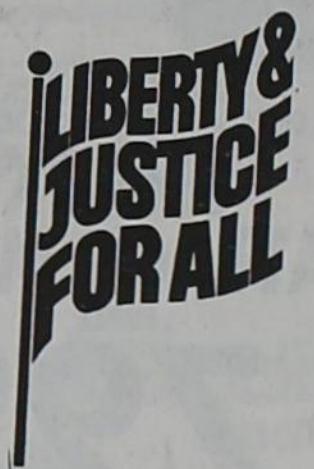

In honor of Red Beans, and the Glorious 4th, here is a recipe for you for Chow Chow, which should always be served with pinto beans. It is from Motley SQ (do you suppose that is for Sesquicentennial?) Cookbook by Wilma Thomas.

### CHOW CHOW

9 Apples, Cored - Not Peeled  
1 Stalk Celery (the whole stalk)  
1 Head Cabbage; about 5 lbs.  
7 Medium Onions  
1 and 1/2 Gallons Green Tomatoes  
6 Sweet (Bell) Peppers  
(Use 1 or 2 Red, for color, if you like)  
1 Hot Pepper (big green, I'd say, or little red; whatever)  
2 Tsp. Ground Cinnamon; 3 tsp. Celery Seed; 3 Tsp. White Mustard Seed; 1 1/2 Tsp. Turmeric; 1/2 Cup Salt; 2 1/2 lbs. Sugar; 2 Qt. White Vinegar.

Chop or grind cabbage, peppers, onions and tomatoes. Add the 1/2 cup salt. Cover with cold water. Let stand overnight. In the morning, drain off water.

Grind celery and apples and add to first mixture with vinegar, sugar and spices. (My mother would tie the spices up in a cheese-cloth ball to remove after cooking, to take the dregs out of the finished product). Cook slowly, stirring occasionally. Seal in STERILIZED jars. (It's designed to keep until consumed without pressure cooking of boiling water bath. Depends on how long it is kept. Alter to suit your taste!

**MOTLEY COUNTY PRODUCER MEETING**  
The Motley County Farm Service Agency will hold an informational meeting, Thursday, July 12, at the Senior Citizens Building in Matador beginning at 8:30 a.m. This meeting will provide information concerning the new Non-insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) program effective for the 2001 crop year and subsequent years. Also discussed will be the Quality Loss Program, which is in addition to the quality losses you received for the 2000 Crop Loss Disaster.

Substantial changes have been made in the NAP program, and with the continuing dry weather and hot winds, this program could be beneficial to producers. This program covers native and improved grass forage losses, small grain forage losses, haygrazer, fruits and vegetables and any other crop that is grown in Motley County which are non-insurable.

**FINAL CROP CERTIFICATION**  
Producers are reminded that Monday, July 16, is the final day to certify your spring seeded crops, native and improved grasses and CRP. You're timely and accurate certification of crops is important for several reasons:

- Fruits and vegetables are required to be certified on farms enrolled in the AMTA program.
  - Eligibility for Loan Deficiency Payments and Commodity Loans.
  - Maintain eligibility for any future livestock assistance programs, this applies to acreage of native and improved pastures.
  - Maintain eligibility for any future disaster assistance programs.
  - Maintain eligibility for the Non-insurable Assistance Program (NAP).
  - Producers participating in CRP

##### VIRUS FOUND TO CARRY ANTIBIOTIC AGAINST E. COLI

Experiment station researchers have found a small virus that acts like an antibiotic on E. coli. The small virus is known as "Q Beta." The finding provides a new approach to combat E. coli, pneumonia, Lyme's disease, and similar diseases in humans. It also fights bacterial diseases in pets, livestock, and crops. New types of antibiotics are increasingly important. Many disease-causing bacteria have become resistant to antibiotics, reducing the number of medicines available for treatment. Researchers fear that continued resistance could result in epidemics of diseases.

##### TEXAS A&M VET MEDICAL DIAGNOSTIC LAB TO CONSTRUCT NEW FACILITY AT EAST TEXAS LOCATION

The Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory will construct a new research facility in Center, Texas, in 2002. Executive Director Konrad Eugster says the facility will feature the latest technological advances used in poultry research and diagnostic analysis. The new facility will continue diagnostic and disease surveillance procedures for several poultry companies throughout the East Texas region. Eugster says the recent concern with foot-and-mouth disease has proven to many individuals the importance of controlling animal diseases quickly. The new facility will expand the number of diagnostic procedures, as well as improve those used today in microbiology, immunology, and other research activities.

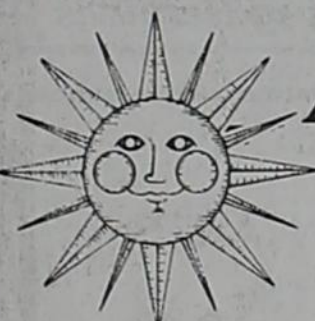

The results from the Plains Cotton Growers/Texas Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX) AgriPartners Grid Trapping Project are available on the PCG website and on DTN.

The maps reflect trap catches of weevils emerging from overwintering habitat across the Texas High Plains and will help growers identify areas where boll weevils could present early season problems as the crop reaches the third-grown square stage in mid- to late- June. 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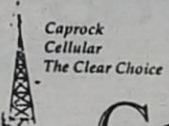
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
