## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39

## CITATION BY PUBLICATION THE STATE OF TEXAS

TO: M. T. Bell, C. H. Bell, and their unknown heirs, assigns and legal representatives, and unknown owners Defendants.

Greeting:

You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable District Court of Motley County at the Courthouse thereof, in Matador, Texas, at or before 10 o'clock A. M. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 8th day of September A. D. 1952, then and there to answer Plaintiff's Petition filed in said Court, on the 21st day of July A. D. 1952, in this cause, numbered 1413 on the docket of said court and styled B. C. Cross Plaintiff, vs. M. T. Bell, C. H. Bell, and their unknown heirs, assigns and legal representatives Defendants.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit:

## BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by

law."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that

a majority of the votes cast in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the Constitution as amended by the Legislature and laws of the State. The expense of publication and election for the amendment shall be paid from proper appropriation made by law.
