Community Honors Outstanding Citizen

WIDOW OF A MAN who arrived in this small western town August 4, 1899, was to remain long and have great influence on the community. Almost three score years later that same community honored him as one of its outstanding and influential citizens on the event of his birthday.

Basement of the Methodist Church in Matador was filled to capacity Wednesday night in a surprise birthday party for G. E. Hamilton. Among the visitors who attended were Dist. L. D. Ratliff of Spur, Robert Reynolds of Dickens and others. Many letters of testimony were read in tribute to Mr. Hamilton's outstanding influence in the Methodist Church and this area of West Texas.

Following the surprise banquet and a special program of music, many gifts were presented to the humble, grateful man. With Mrs. Hamilton accompanying at the piano, a duet was sung by Mrs. J. R. Whitworth and Mrs. W. F. Jacobs, and the "Estes Sisters", Mesdames Jacobs, W. N. Pipkin, Robert Darsey and R. E. Campbell, Jr., sang a medley of old favorite songs in conclusion. J. R. Whitworth led in group singing of some of Mr. Hamilton's favorite hymns.

G. E. Hamilton arrived in Matador on a hot afternoon in August, 1899. He and his brother, Dr. Roscoe Hamilton, and a friend, Guy Ramsey had traveled from McGregor, Tex., in a wagon. The trip had required three weeks.

Somewhere near the present town of Guthrie the three young men drove up to a plank gate. There was a sign on the gate painted with axle grease. The sign read "1000 miles to water but hell ain't 1/2 a mile from here." G. E. Hamilton had \$1.50 when he arrived in Matador.

The Hamilton brothers had come to Motley County because an uncle, A. B. Echols and grandfather, R. P. Echols had moved here a few years previous, established ranches and were impressed with the country's possibilities.

Studied Law
G. E. Hamilton was born in a small Georgia village called Subigna (no longer on the map) Sept. 4, 1871. He came to Texas in November, 1894 and began the study of Law at Mcgregor in the law office of O. H. Cross. He passed his bar examination in Waco in 1897, then went to Abilene where he practiced law for two years before returning to McGregor and then coming to Matador.

He started the practice of law as soon as he came here. He said he received his first case after he had been here two weeks and received a fee of \$10.

In 1903 he was married to Miss Edna Cooper and in 1907 they moved to Childress. In 1909 he was elected to the Texas Legislature from Childress and served four years (2 terms). At that time 10 counties were in the district, Childress, Hall, Dickens, Hardeman, Wilbarger, Wichita, Cottle, King, Foard and Motley.

Legislators received \$5 per day. Attending the breakfast were

Enrollment Total 329

Enrollment in Matador's public school system remains stable. High school with an enrollment of 192 is one less than a year ago, according to C. N. Johnson, high school principal.

J. E. Edwards, grade school principal says the 227 grade school enrollment is a slight increase over the corresponding date a year ago. Mr. Edwards said five students were enrolled in the Northfield school.

Thirty one first graders began classes Sept. 1. Largest class in the grade school is the fourth grade with 39. Freshman class is the largest in high school with 28.

L. M. COX RESIGNS PLACE WITH CITY

L. M. Cox, former city secretary and later manager, has resigned from six years employment with the Matador municipal government to accept a position in the Motley County Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation office. His resignation becomes effective October 1 at which time he will assume his new duties.

The announcement was made this week by Tommy Moore, manager of the local ASC office. He said Cox would be a "counter man" in the office to serve farmers.

More than five years ago Mr. Cox requested the city council to change the status of city secretary from an elective office to an appointive one. The request was granted and he continued to serve as secretary.

Later he became manager of city affairs and problems (albeit Matador does not have a city management form of government) being responsible to the council. His position was in reality that of "trouble shooter" with the responsibility of a manager, while final authority rested with the council.

At present the city has not made any announcement regarding the vacancy created by Mr. Cox's resignation.

FIRST 1958 BALE IS GINNED HERE

First bale of 1958 cotton to be ginned in Matador was produced by Ray Webb two miles south of town. It was ginned Thursday morning by West Texas Gin here and 1800 pounds of seed cotton produced a 485-pound bale. The bale produced 820 pounds of seed.

Ernest Elliott, manager of the gin said he estimates the sample to grade strict middling 15 16. The cotton is Lankart "57" and was planted May 10.

First bale prize of \$83 was awarded Mr. Webb by Matador business firms and individuals. First bale of 1958 cotton had previously been ginned at Flo- not and Roaring Springs.

Mr. Webb has asked the Tribune to express his appreciation for the first bale (Matador community) prize which he received through contributions from business firms and individuals.

Mr. Elliott said his gin plant is in excellent shape for the approaching season. Much new equipment has been added to the plant during the summer which has enlarged its capacity. The gin is now equipped with five super Mitchell feeders. Cotton ginned in the plant is processed through double Moss lint cleaners, Mr. Elliott said.

Former County Resident is Principal of New Junior High School at Pampa

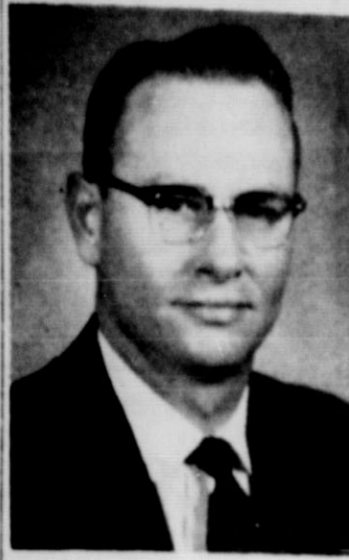
Former Roaring Springs resident Jack W. Nichols, 36, who has been named principal of Pampa's newest school, and the staff as teacher is a Matador resident.

Grace McDowell, long-time teacher at Goodnight, has joined the faculty of seventh grade. She will be one of thirty-seven person faculty to handle the teaching of some 700 students at the new school. Mrs. McDowell was reared at Matador and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Cammack.

Article from the Pampa News (Aug. 27) in a special section concerning the new plant, paid tribute to Mr. Nichols' qualifications as follows: Nichols brings a background of teaching and business experience to his new job. The new principal and his wife, Patricia, make their home in Pampa at 1206 Duncan and are members of the Episcopal Church there. Nichols is also active in Pampa Kiwanis affairs.

Magazine Features Article on Texas

Many Texans fear their state is "developing too fast, outrunning itself, losing touch more and more every year with its own traditional values."

So writes the famed Irish novelist Sean O'Faolain in the October issue of Holiday, which devotes its cover and lead article to the Lone Star State.

O'Faolain says long-memoried Texans claim that the old frontier way of life bred a "stubborn individualism" in men, who dared to be different, who "did not have to be buttons out of a button mold."

The main enemy of the old ways is urbanization and industrialization, the author continues. "But Texas isn't just an old clock cranking away on a log cabin wall," he writes. "It is a living organism. It has to grow and develop and adapt itself."

A classic, full-color photo of a working cowboy on the huge 6666 ranch at Guthrie serves as the cover, while the article is illustrated with a portfolio of color and black-and-white pictures of living past that "glow with beauty and nostalgia."

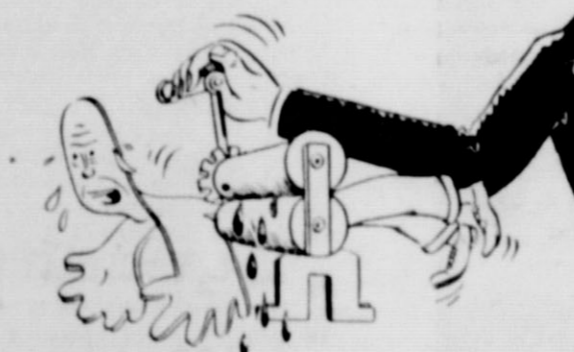

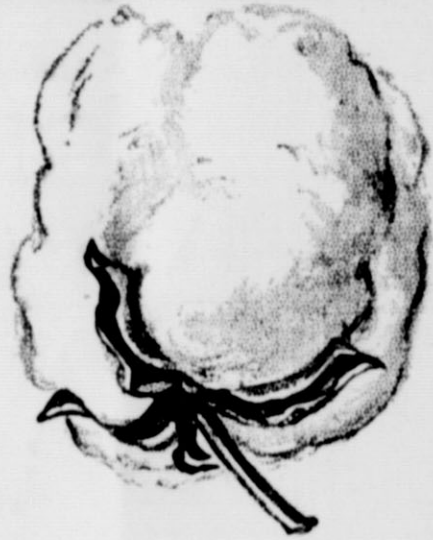

day for the first 90 days, \$2 per day for the next 30 days and nothing after that. Mr. Hamilton moved his family to Austin during terms of the legislature, spending a total of nine months there out of the total of 48 he was state representative.

He returned to Matador after his second term in Austin and has lived here continuously since that time. In 1927 Gov. Dan Moody appointed Mr. Hamilton judge of the 50th Judicial District but he declined the appointment. Until his retirement a few years ago, he was attorney for the Quanah, Acme & Pacific Railway, and the Matador Land and Cattle Company, in addition to his general practice.

Outstanding Layman
The story of G. E. Hamilton is more the story of an outstanding church layman than that of a lawyer and statesman. He has been a member of the Methodist Church for 75 years and a member of the Matador church for 58 years.

He served as a steward for over 40 years. He was Sunday School superintendent, and taught Sunday School most of his active years. He was a member of the McMurry board of trustees for 15 years and for 30 years had been an annual conference delegate.

Mrs. Hamilton died in 1935. "Judge" Hamilton as he is affectionately known, married Miss Margaret Knight of Childress in 1940. He has two sons, Howard, of Alderwood Manor, Wash., and John of Matador, and one daughter, Mrs. Melvin Meason, Matador. He also has six grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Many of the letters read at the community birthday party honoring Judge Hamilton bore testimony of his long life as an outstanding lawyer, a Christian and a church leader. One letter said: "The shadow of G. E. Hamilton has fallen across his community for God and good."

Among those attending the party were four sisters and a

brother of Judge Hamilton: Mrs. W. L. McWilliams and Mrs. Fred Bourland of Matador; Mrs. L. E. Cooper of Roaring Springs and Mrs. A. Freeman of Grand prairie; and J. Tom Hamilton of Matador. Another sister, Mrs. Virginia Stewart lives in Shreveport, La.
