Bert Green of Roaring Springs showed the top boar Saturday in the annual Sears 4-H Club Swine Show at Texas Tech (Lubbock) livestock judging pavilion. The 16-year-old youth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mervin Green, shared the top honor place with Danny Cade, 11, Lamb County 4-H member of Olton, who showed the best Sears gilt.

The winners competed with 4-H Club members in 12 counties. Bert Green has been a 4-H Club member for eight years and has previously won many championship awards.

Dr. Gerald Thomas, dean of the school of Agriculture at Tech welcomed the group to the college and told them that they are "participating in a very worthwhile program."

Stanley Anderson of the animal husbandry department at Tech, who judged the show, said the top gilts and boars were of "particularly good" quality.

E. E. Moss and V. A. Johnson, operating from Lubbock, will drill a 6,000-foot rank wildcat three miles east of the Croton community in northeastern Dickens County.

To be drilled as the No. one well on the L. S. Goodwin lease, the venture spots 660 feet from north and west lines of Section 1, block No. 1, J. W. Jackson survey. With a depth objective of 6,000 feet it will evaluate Pennsylvania.

There are several dry holes in the area, but no production. Nearest pay is some 12 miles to the south from the Tannerfield sand in the Croton Creek field.

Reports Monday afternoon said the new well had reached a depth of 1,000 feet without incident.

Birnie Well Acidizing

Closer to home the Pan American Petroleum Company No. 1 Birnie flat has set a bridging plug and perforated the casing at 8,518-8,525 feet.

The well was being acidized yesterday and results of the tests will be known for two or three days. The 10,010-foot well was reentered and initial tests in the Bend sand through perforations at 9,030 feet returned load oil and water after the section had been acidized and fractured.

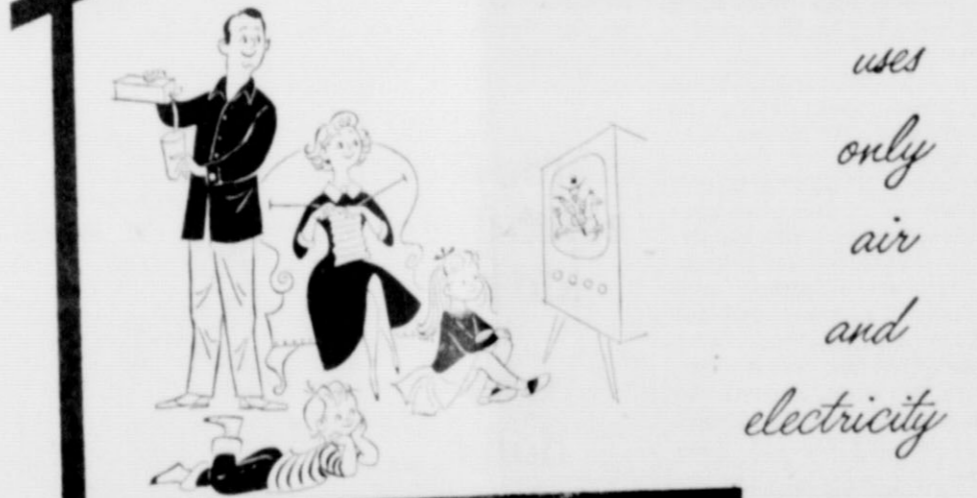

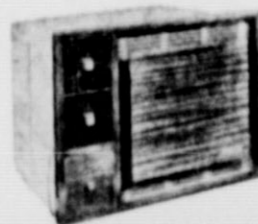
