AUSTIN-With the advent of in Matador Saturday. fall and the attendant seasonal changes of weather, common colds were Matador visitors Tuesday. become much more prevalent and

Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a warning against the careless treatment of any respiratory illness since they can and frequently do result in the dreaded complication, pneumonia. He emphasized the fact that pneumonia usually strikes with little or no warning, following a simple cold, an attack of influenza or some other respiratory infection.
