Death Ends Career Of Harley Sadler

State Senator Harley Sadler, 65, of Abilene, died Thursday in a Stamford hospital after a heart attack.

Sadler, an old-time tent show owner and actor, will be remembered by local residents, having brought his company here during the late 20's and 30's and performed under auspices of the Matador Fire Department. During his career in show business, his most famous character was "Toby," a country bumpkin complete with a wig and heavy makeup. He left the show business for good in 1947.

He was stricken last Tuesday night while judging a talent show in Avoca, near Stamford, where he grew up.

One of the Texas Senate's most colorful characters, Sadler served four terms in the House of Representatives before being elected to a short term in the Senate from the 24th District in 1952. He was renominated without opposition.

Rep. and Mrs. Elbert Reeves of Matador attended funeral services, which were held in First Baptist Church, Abilene, at 10 a. m. Friday. His body was taken to Cameron, where he was married and where his only child, Mrs. Gloria Sadler Allen, is buried. She died in 1943.

He is survived by his wife, one brother and one sister.

Flomot Star Route May Be Chopped Off At Whiteflat

Republican economy is sweeping into Motley county. The United States postal department which is claimed to be going in the red at the rate of approximately \$2,000,000 daily is doing "something" about it. In Motley county alone it is going to save almost \$2.75 daily.

The economy drive will chop the Turkey-Flomot star route off at Whiteflat and save the government paying Fletcher M. Cowart veteran star route carrier of Turkey a daily stipend of less than \$2.75 for driving the extra eight miles and return.

FIREMEN TO SELL PACK'S OF SAFETY IN NEW CAMPAIGN

In a campaign to extinguish fires before they get under headway, Fire Chief Freddie Welling and members of the Matador Volunteer Fire Department are attempting to place a fire extinguisher in every home.

The department will receive a profit from the sale of the extinguishers which will be used to augment the general fund. They have selected a modern product which is charged with carbon dioxide (CO2), the best known element for extinguishing gas, oil, grease and surface fires. It is perfectly safe, non-poisonous, leaves no stains, will not damage food, nor freeze in cold weather.

Letters have been mailed to every home in the community advising residents of the campaign. Firemen will call on homes showing the samples.

"Fire won't wait," Chief Welling said, "and the first moments after a fire is discovered are the most important. Many a costly (and sometimes fatal) fire could have been prevented with a good extinguisher. We of the department recommend this extinguisher. We believe it is the best protection possible for the home. It should be conveniently placed in homes, cars, trucks, tractors, combines, in barns and near irrigation motors.

MILK TRUCK HITS DRUG STORE WALL

It was like a truck hitting a brick wall. In fact it was a truck hitting a brick wall and there was plenty of noise and some excitement.

A Cloverlake Creamery (Plainview) milk truck Monday afternoon jumped the curb on the west side of Stanley Pharmacy and crashed head on into the side of the building. Brick to a height of several feet were pushed out of line beginning at the foundation. On the inside, plaster was cracked and fell away almost to the ceiling. A section of shelving in the drug store storage department was dumped into the floor with its contents.

Eugene Gibbs of Plainview, driver of the truck, was in the drug store at the time of the accident. He had parked in the center of Main street without setting his breaks. Traffic vibrations (possibly) set the truck to moving on the incline paving. It picked up sufficient momentum to jump the curb and strike the wall.

Had the truck struck the building a few feet further north it would have crashed through the plate glass windows and possibly into the prescription department where store manager Bob Stanley was at work. The truck was uninjured and the loss fully covered by insurance.

Pat Sheridan, manager of the Jackson Estate, owners of the building said it would be difficult to estimate the damage until brick masons figured the cost of replacing a section of wall. Mr. Stanley did not estimate his damage, but said it was probably minor.

Flomot Star Route May Be Chopped Off At Whiteflat

It will cut off Flomot and Whiteflat, two of the county's oldest communities from daily mail service with the county seat. The new arrangement is designed to go in effect November 1, according to Mr. Cowart.

Total length of the daily round trip (at present) is slightly less than 80 miles. For this traveling the postal department pays Mr. Cowart \$4,472.25 annually. With the new arrangement he will travel 16 fewer miles daily and the government will save \$998.99 annually or less than \$2.75 per day.

Contention is that the route from Whiteflat to Matador is duplicated four days weekly by the RFD service out of Matador, and that the daily service is not necessary.

If the route is terminated at Whiteflat it will be the first time Flomot and Whiteflat have been denied daily mail service from the county seat since horse and buggy days. It will mean emergency medicine delivery and inter-community services which Mr. Cowart has rendered through the years, will be terminated.

Death Claims Stanley Rose

Final rites were held Wednesday in Hollywood, California, for Stanley Rose, 55, son of Mrs. Joe Gaines of Matador, who happened to be visiting in Hollywood at the time of his death last Sunday.

He was stricken on Saturday and conveyed to a hospital, where he died of a throat hemorrhage.

Mrs. Gaines left here Monday of last week, accompanying a grandson and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Rose, who were returning to their home after a trip to Texas. She went to visit her children, all of whom live in the vicinity of Los Angeles. She is presently at the home of her son, Olen Rose, 6335 Elmer Avenue, North Hollywood.

Rose was born at Matador, and became one of Hollywood's best known personalities through his business, the Satyr Book Shop on Hollywood Boulevard, which became a landmark for movie stars, novelists and producers.

He is survived by his wife, one son, Bruce, of Hollywood; his mother, Mrs. Joe Gaines, Matador; 2 brothers, Olen Rose, North Hollywood and Cecil Rose of Los Angeles; and a half-brother, Jackie Catlin of Los Angeles.

"I was in Austin on business Monday and met John White," Judge Gilbreath said, "and I told him that Congressman Rogers would speak here Friday night on farm problems. I invited him to come and he accepted immediately."

"He is going to talk on his hay program and other features of drought relief feeds. The talks will be of especial interest to farmers and ranchers," Judge Gilbreath said.

In making an announcement at the Lions Club Tuesday, of White's acceptance of an invitation to come here Gilbreath said in connection that he believed Walter Rogers would be the first Congressman to visit Matador since Gene Worley.

Gilbreath said a meeting will be held in Childress previous to the Friday night meeting here at which both Rogers and White will discuss basically the same subjects.

Farmers in almost every sector of Motley county are begging for cotton pickers. The drought-stricken "phantom crop" that even the most optimistic observers believed was "doomed" is as one grows turns to cotton.

The two Flomot gins are out on top in the processing. According to the Tribune's survey yesterday morning Flomot had ginned 1,992 bales. Matador's three gins 1,225 bales and Roaring Springs two gins 871 bales. The county's total was 4,088 bales.

Estimates are now that the county may produce 12,000 bales from the crop that didn't exist.

LaMaster Pledges President Support

"I'm campaigning for two things: Support for President Eisenhower's program, and a 'do-something' Congressman for the 18th Congressional district," said Congressional Candidate LeRoy "Pete" LaMaster, speaking before a group of precinct workers in Amarillo this week.

LaMaster, a farmer and stockman from Perryton, said the two issues went hand-in-hand.

"I pledge myself to support the Eisenhower program, just as far as I can, and still keep the best interests of the people in my district uppermost," he said.

Amendment To Save State \$1 Million Office Space Rent

Seven former attorney generals and four former governors of Texas have announced their support of Amendment Number Four which would provide two state office buildings at no extra cost in taxes and a quarter of a million dollars saving annually in rental fees.

The Amendment will be up for a vote on November 2 in the general election and provides for the transfer of unneeded money in the Confederate Pension fund to a State Building Commission for construction of a state court building and a state office building.

It has already been endorsed by Governor Allan Shivers, the State Legislature, and both Democratic and Republican 1954 conventions. Adding their word of approval this week are the following former attorney generals and governors: Dan Moody, James V. Allred, Robert Lee Bobbitt, William McGraw, Gerald Mann, Grover Sellers, Price

Daniel, Miriam Ferguson and William P. Hobby.

This Amendment was recommended by the governor to the legislature and was co-sponsored by Senator George Moffett of Chillicothe and Rep. Bill Daniel of Liberty.

The 66-year old Capitol Building long ago burst its seams as far as office space is concerned. State agencies are housed in a 192-block area in the city of Austin at a cost of \$250,000 annually in rentals. The Supreme Court and State Courts in the Capitol Building are so crowded that the Supreme Court justices are located on separate floors and do not have an office large enough for a private conference. Lawyers are similarly crowded, and the State Library and Archives long ago resorted to putting valuable records in a moldy basement as the only available place to store them. The State Courts and the Library would occupy the State Courts Building and agencies now renting space outside the Capitol would go into the State Office Building.
