## Cowboy is Killed Beneath Falling Horse

### Wishy' Dirickson Victim of Tragedy

EMPTY SADDLE, a pair of spurs and autumn winds blowing in the mequites, the scene moves in the twilight. Wishy' Dirickson is dead. Noble (Wishy) Dirickson was killed instantly after afternoon when his horse ran over a two-year-old bull and fell on the rider. The tragedy occurred at 3 p. m. while Matador manager Seth Sager gathered bulls in Wolf pasture about 15 miles west of Matador. Several witnesses saw the accident as it unfolded. Dirickson was traveling downhill as his horse could go, according to "Rosy" Deaton who rode with Dirickson on the range for 30 years. "It was one of the best I ever had," Deaton said, "and he crashed to death in an instant. Neither the horse nor I was hurt."

This is a tribute to Noble "Wishy" Dirickson, whose life in the saddle has ended. He was truly a cowboy, in heart, in spirit and in his work. He loved the range, the wind in his face, the scent of burning mesquite, the clatter of hoofs. His life in the saddle bridged the change in Texas' great ranching industry from the open roundup and branding fires of mesquite, to butane heaters and nylon ropes. The impressive crowd that paid final tribute to him bore testimony of his friends. "Wishy" was himself, friendly, humble, sincere. A top hand on any range. If cowboys are needed in eternity, one of the best has ridden straight in from his work here on earth.

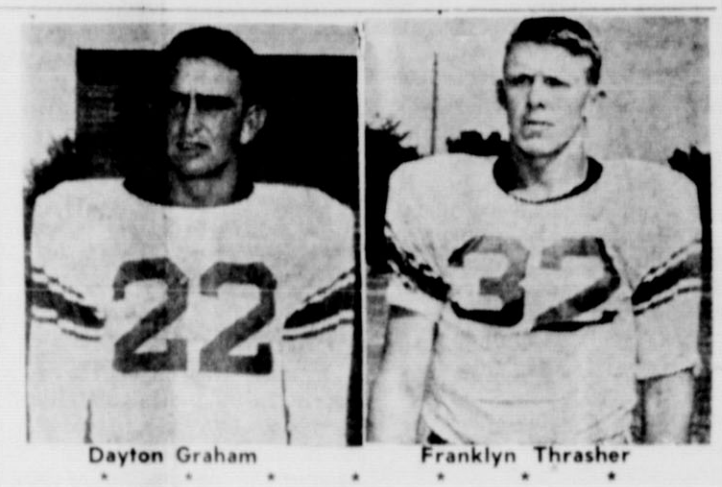

PADUCAH, Sept. 29 (Special) First Turkey Shoot of the year will be conducted in Paducah, Sunday, Oct. 5 under the sponsorship of the Paducah Junior Chamber of Commerce. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Thrasher. Graham, son of Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Graham, was All-District and he was on the All South Plains Team.

## Gas Pressure Develops, Birnie Well Interest Soars

OIL INTEREST in Motley County received renewed impetus last weekend when reports began to circulate that large amounts of gas had developed in the Birnie Ranch well 14 miles northwest of Matador. The well, drilled to 10,000 feet in 1950 by Amerada and abandoned, was re-entered recently by Pan American Petroleum Corporation. Last week after setting bridging plug and perforating the casing at 8,518-8,525 feet, the well was acidized. Heavy gas pressure has developed in the well. At one time the pressure was measured at 2,250 pounds. At present the company is waiting for a separator to determine the amount of gas being made by the well. In addition to the gas, the well is also producing liquid. Road to the well has been closed.

### Rattler Killed Near Bob Stanley Home

Rattlesnakes are crawling in Matador. C. M. Barton driving on Eubank Street Monday afternoon, saw a rattler in front of the Bob Stanley home. He stopped and killed the reptile, which had seven rattlers. A report says Doug Hale killed a large rattlesnake in the same area (one block north) when his dog continued baying the snake at night. He killed the snake with the aid of a flashlight. Rattlesnakes have been reported in other West Texas towns, in some instances invading the business areas. Paducah and Childress have reported the presence of the poisonous snakes.

### Cotton Trailers Must Bear Lights

Farmers are cautioned to install lights on their cotton trailers before they are placed in use. Peace officers in West Texas counties are urging farmers to equip their trailers at once. The law requires two red reflectors on the rear of each trailer and at least one burning red tail light. Best time to install the reflectors and tail light is before the trailer is placed in use.

Fred Cecil Irwin, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Irwin of Matador, has received his order to report for Armed Forces physical examination on the 14th of October, in Plainview. The call included seven registrants from Floyd County and three from Hale County. Registrants from Hale, Swisher and Floyd counties were called to report for induction on the same date.

### SALEM BUYS BRICK HERE

A TRANSACTION was completed here Monday in which Tom Salem, owner of dry goods stores in Matador, Turkey and Silvertown, purchased the George Gabriel brick Building immediately north of the Salem store on Main Street. Amount of the consideration was not disclosed. Mr. Salem plans to double the size of his Matador store with the acquisition of the new property. It is probable, however, that the remodeling may be postponed until after the fall and holiday rush, according to C. M. Barton, manager of the Matador store.

The Gabriel building has been closed since January 1957. Mr. Salem's constantly enlarged stock of wearing apparel has made necessary the expansion. Purchase of the Gabriel property also included the store fixtures.

Besides the athletic policy, Supt. Hayman says there are 16 students who have taken out the \$8.00 premium policy which offers 24-hour protection for the students of each grade through the year. This is a total coverage for students who do not participate in athletics.

Partial coverage is being given to 74 students who have taken out the \$2.00 premium policy for the school year. This protection secures the students while riding on the school buses, while they are in school, or while they are engaged in school activities of any kind.

Out of an enrollment of 190 students in the Patton Springs School, 118 are participating in the group insurance coverage.
