Former superintendent of Matador's school system for 17 years, B. F. Tunnell, accompanied by Mrs. Tunnell, now of Orsi, California, were overnight guests here Tuesday.

So many friends and former students wanted to visit Mr. and Mrs. Tunnell that it was decided to hold a reception at the American Legion building where coffee and donuts were served between 7 and 9 p. m. The former residents were overnight guests of Mrs. R. E. Donovan.

Coming here in 1929, both Mr. and Mrs. Tunnell taught in the Matador school system. As superintendent Mr. Tunnell also taught high school classes while Mrs. Tunnell was employed in the elementary department. They left Matador in 1946 to accept places in the school system in Orsi, California.

After 46 years of teaching, Mr. Tunnell retired at the close of the 1957 term in Orsi. He began his teaching career in

MILLION CUBIC FEET OF GAS daily has been registered in the Birnie Ranch Well 14 miles northwest of Matador, according to the Ft. Worth Star-Telegram yesterday. The newspaper says Pan American Petroleum Corporation is preparing to squeeze off perforations at 8,518 to 8,525 feet and re-perforate the casing for further tests of the Pennsylvania.

The reentered 10,010-foot wildcat, located four miles west of Whiteflat, had previously been washed with 500 gallons of mud acid and fractured with 4,000 gallons. The section responded with a flow of distillate and of water, with absolute open gas flow rated at 1,000,000 cubic feet daily.

Elimination of water developed on these tests will be attempted by squeezing cement behind casing through present perforations.

The Tribune was informed unofficially yesterday that work on the well will be resumed Friday.

Preparing to Swab

The new Brandon well in the proven Roaring Springs field was being acidized yesterday and preparations were being made to swab shortly before the Tribune went to press. Unofficial report was that the well looks favorable.

The discovery of possible production in the Birnie well extends oil finds 20 miles across Motley County and has increased interests in leasing, according to property-owners. It is believed that other tests may be expected in the northwest area in the near future.

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RATTLER SCARE EXTENDED HERE

This is going to be a hard winter, or a mild winter or an average winter if there is anything to the old Indian sign of crawling rattlesnakes in late autumn.

The scare that has kept residents on edge for two or three weeks, still has them on edge. Another large rattler was killed Monday in Bill Moss's garage in south Matador.

Mrs. Nelson McMahan had gone to the Moss home when she saw the rattlesnake at ease in front of the garage. Help was summoned hastily and H. O. Standfield being the closest, soon killed the snake.

It was the fourth or fifth large rattlesnake to be killed in the south residential section of Matador in the past three weeks.

MATADORS SWITCH TO WINNING SIDE

AFTER a series of misadventures on the football field, the Matador Matadors turned Friday night to the winning side and walloped the Lorenzo Hornets 38-26 here on Burleson Field. It was the second time this season for the Matadors to win over opponents in six games.

Gerald Pipkin and Douglas Wilson were tops in the scoring department taking two each. Earnest Quinn of Lorenzo also made two touchdowns.

Quinn opened the scoring business with a 24-yard scaper around right end in the first quarter. The Matadors returned the compliment when Sherril Rigby climaxed a 58-yard run with a 4-yard plunge. The score was 6-6 at the end of the first quarter.

Each team scored once in the second quarter. Pipkin went nine yards around right for the Matadors score and ran the extra points over. Ronnie Cox of Lorenzo bucked one yard for the Hornets' score. Quarterback George Pollock passed to end Delbert Bradshaw for the extra points. Scores at the half were 14-14.

The Matadors took the second half kickoff and drove 70 yards to score. Wilson kept on a quarterback sneak and scored from two feet out. Moments later the winners moved 45 yards to score again. Fullback Guy Campbell slammed six yards to pay dirt.

Lorenzo scored again on a seven yard run by Pollock. The conversion try was not successful. In the fourth quarter the Matadors crossed the goal line twice. Wilson scored from two yards out and Pipkin moved five yards for a score. Quinn completed the scoring in the game with a five yard run for Lorenzo.

The Matadors will open the district play this week when they go to Estelle to meet the Bear Cubs. The game is scheduled for Friday night.

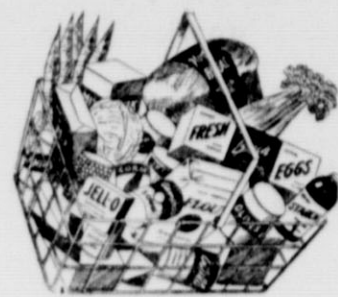

The late J. D. Morriss, one of Matador's pioneer businessmen, was born in Missouri and Mrs. Morriss was a native of Tennessee.

Jeff Morriss as he was known, was married in 1888 to Miss Nan Gibson in the first marriage to be performed in King County, before the county was organized. They came to Motley County the following year. He first worked for the Matadors and later homesteaded north of Matador near what is known as Antelope Hill, where they lived and farmed for seven years. In 1907 they moved to Matador and for a long period of time Mr. Morriss ran a hardware store, blacksmith shop, livery stable, hotel and grocery store.

In later life Mr. and Mrs. Morriss moved back to their farm and remained there until his death in September, 1937, when Mrs. Morriss returned to Matador. She died here in February, 1943.

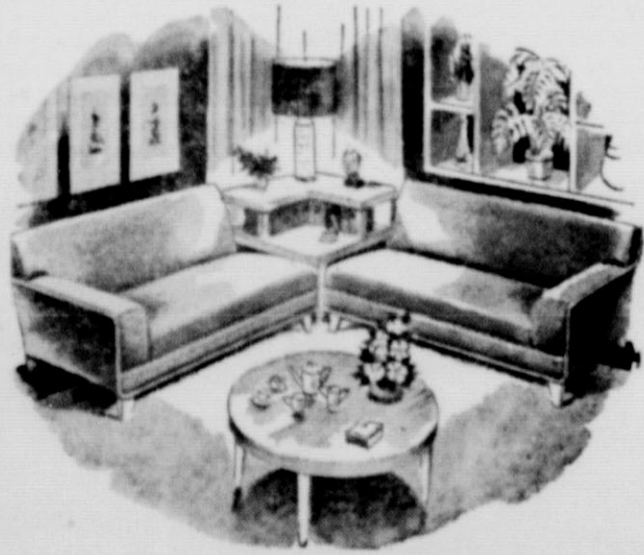

# Matador Garden Club Plans for Fall Flower Show, October 25

## Schedule And Rules Announcement Made

The schedule and rules have been prepared for the fall flower show which Matador Garden Club will stage Saturday, Oct. 25, barring unforeseen developments.

"If it doesn't frost before the 25th, the show will proceed as planned," announced Mrs. W. W. Clements, president of the club. Frost would kill flowers and shrubs and make it impossible for the members to enter arrangements, other than those of the dried varieties.

The show will be held in the American Legion hall from 2 until 6 p. m. and will be open to the public. Three women from Lubbock, qualified as national judges, will judge the show. It will be the first time that national judges have been secured for a local exhibit.

Everyone who plans to exhibit an entry in the show is requested to obtain a copy of the schedule and rules from either Mrs. Clements or Mrs. Freeman Thacker. Only those entries which meet requirements as set out in the schedule, will be eligible for judging, it was explained.

"Suddenly It's Fall" Theme of the show will be "Suddenly It's Fall", and entries will be divided into three sections, Artistic, which will include a Junior division, Horticulture, and Educational.

The schedule as arranged, is as follows:

Section I, Artistic Division, class 1. "The Last Rose of Summer" (arrangement of roses with own foliage); class 2. "Gridiron Glory" (composition of chrysanthemums suitable for "after the game" buffet supper. Accessories and additional foliage permitted); class 3. "Cotton Festival", A. "Maid of Cotton" (vertical arrangement of all white flowers in white container); B. "King Cotton", symmetrical arrangement of green or dried cotton stalks and, or blossoms, squares, bolls and open cotton); class 4. "Autumn Enchantment", (a symmetrical flower arrangement in fall tones. Any leaves, foliage, and, or berries permitted); class 5. "Harvest is Plentiful", cornucopia or other suitable container with fruits, flowers, grain, leaves and, or vegetable); class 6. "Cream of the Crop", (arrangement in pitcher of cream-colored flowers); class 7. "A-Hunting We Will Go", (composition of seeds, seed pods, sorghum, dried foliage, and grasses in suitable container or on a rustic or wooden base. Accessories permitted); class 8. "Frontier Days", (arrangement in a container that might have been used a hundred years ago); class 9. "Trick With a Stick", (line arrangement using dried materials with driftwood); class 10. "Christmas is Just Around the Corner", (a Christmas arrangement); class 11. "If Winter Comes", (analogous crescent arrangement using evergreens and other green material);

Junior Division, class 1. "Going to the Fair", A. "Farmer's Market", (arrangement in a basket); B. "Soda Pop", (arrangement in a bottle); class 2. "Frost is on the Pumpkin", (arrangement in or using a pumpkin);

Section II, Horticulture Division, annuals (one bloom or stem to be displayed); Class 1, asters; class 2, calendulas, A, orange; B, yellow; Class 3, celosia, A, crested; B, plumed or feathered; class 4, cosmos; class 5, marigolds, A, carnation flowered; B, chrysanthemum flowered; C, red and gold hybrid; class 6, petunia, A, single; B, double; class 7, zinnia, A, giant (4 inches or over); B, medium (2 to 4 inches); C, small (2 inches or under); class 8, dahlia, A, decorative; B, cactus; C, single; D, pompon; E, miniature; F, specimen, (1 bloom finest dahlia in show, any color or type); class 9, gladiolus (1 spike); A, red; B, pink; C, yellow; D, white; E, blue or lavender; F, miniature; class 10, any other annual.

Perennials (one bloom stalk); Class 11, asters, A, tall; B, dwarf; class 12, delphinium, A, hybrid; B, species; class 13, phlox; class 14, any other perennial.

Rules For Entries

Entries must be in between 8 and 11 o'clock on the morning of the show, and each entry will be judged as classified. All members of Matador Garden Club are required to enter an arrangement in at least one class, according to the announced rules for entries.

Exhibitors may compete in as many classes as desired, but only one entry in each class.

Entries must be left at registration table and will be placed by staging committee. All exhibitors must see that each entry has plenty of water. The flower show committee will not be responsible for any loss. Specimen entries shall be correctly labeled when possible.

Exhibitors are urged to read the schedule carefully, also "Scale of Points" which judges will use in scoring, and see that exhibit conforms to schedule.

Entries must remain in place until close of the show; only judges and flower show chairman with clerks will be permitted to remain in show during the judging.

Scale of Point judging will be according to National Council Handbook and National Plant Societies.

No cash awards will be given.

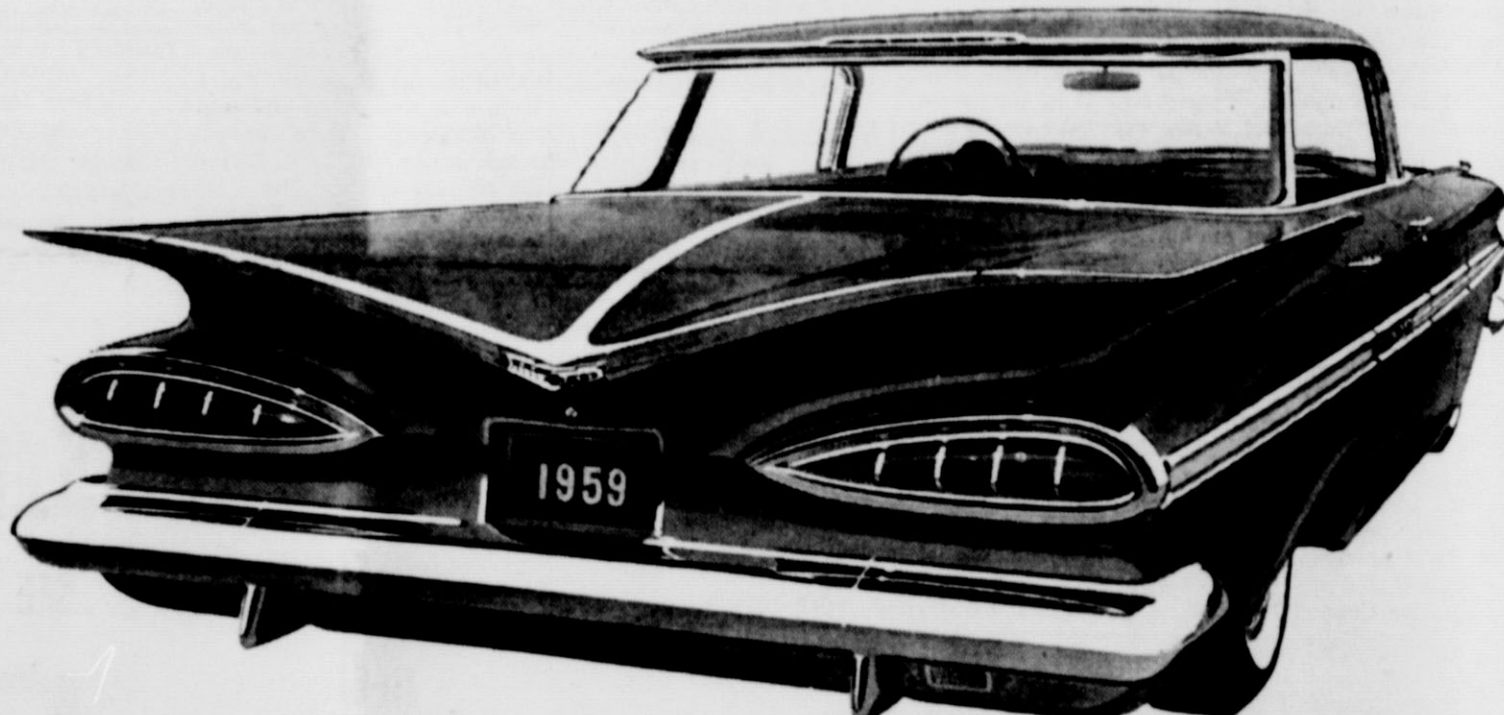

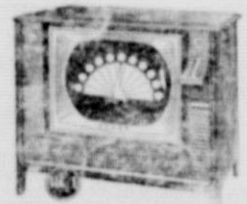
