## \$38000 To Be Paid For Youth Program

APPROXIMATELY \$38,000 will be paid out in Motley County communities within the next ten weeks in the Neighborhood Youth Program, planned by the government to aid boys and girls 16 through 21. College students are not eligible to participate as employees.

At present 70 have made application, which is the county's limit. If more applications are received, they will need to wait for possible "drop-outs" from those who have made application.

Work will include girls working in public offices of courthouse and city hall, libraries and may even include cleaning and painting public buildings. Boys will do manual labor which may include work in city or county parks, etc.

Program originally called for wage to be \$1.25 per hour but this rate was designed for specific areas. The wage here will be \$1 per hr with Social Security being paid by the government. Workmen's compensation will also be paid by the government.

Limit is 32 paid hours per week, according to County Judge Elbert Reeves, but enrollees must attend seminars four hours per week, which makes the pay 89¢ per hour for 36 hours spent in the program.

Each enrollee must have a thorough physical examination paid by the government and must have a Social Security card.

Adequate supervision and all details will be worked out at a meeting in the District Courtroom, June 17 at 8 p.m. The meeting is for all adults who will have part in the program, which is scheduled to get under way on June 21. Program in the county is now awaiting instructions from the Secretary of Labor in Washington. Judge Reeves said the government is paying 90% of program and sponsors paying 10% in money or kind. Each enrollee will be notified when to report when word is received that the county program is approved.

## Astronauts Return To Earth And Fame

TWO MEN returned Monday after more than four days in "simulated eternity." They were Gemini astronauts James A. McDivitt and Edward H. White II, who splashed down in the Atlantic after 98 hours in space. They were soon safe on deck of the aircraft carrier Wasp following four days marathon that included a 20-minute walk in space.

Fame awaited the two men who had been "out of this world" for four days, and President Johnson invited them and their families to a week end at his LBJ Ranch in Texas. The world awaited the safe return of the two men who had made outer-space history.

Bearded and displaying the good humor that relieved their difficult hours in space, the two astronauts splashed down in the Atlantic at 11:13 a.m. CST (Monday).

Spacewalker White became seasick in the bobbing spacecraft (awaiting recovery) and vomited a little. The helicopter crew that picked them up said the astronauts had washed themselves off with sea water while awaiting pickup.

## Arm Amputated After Accident

Marvin Dake has returned to his home here from Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, where his right arm was amputated in surgery, Thursday, May 27, following an accident while at work.

Dake, 57, was injured when his arm became ensnared in a conveyor belt at Quitaque Sand and Gravel Co., located on State Hwy. 70 between Turkey and Matador.

He was working alone at the conveyor belt when the accident occurred, and it was about twenty minutes before a co-worker, Cecil Stone of Turkey, came to his aid. Dake was able to wave to Stone, a truck driver, for help. He had torn a portion of clothing from his body to pack around the pinned arm, caught between the elbow and shoulder, which probably saved him from bleeding to death.

He was brought to Stanley Hospital by Stone, Walter Kelly of Quitaque, owner of the plant, and Jinks Taylor, crane operator, and then transferred to Lubbock by ambulance.

## New Coach Is Named Here By School Board

Wilburn Myers, 27, of Rochelle, has been employed by the board of trustees of the Matador Independent School, as head coach here, to fill the place vacated by Chas. Johnson, who has accepted the post of superintendent.

Mr. Myers, a graduate of Howard Payne, is married and the father of two children, a boy 3 and a girl age 4 months. He has been head coach at Rochelle for the last three of five years he has been associated with the school.

His record as football coach for three years is as follows: 5-4-1, 5-5, 7-2-1. In basketball: 3-20, 15-6 and 16-3. In girls basketball: 13-10, 23-5 and 20-4. The basketball girls were district champions for two years.

In addition to coaching, he will probably teach commercial subjects. He is going to summer school at Denton and will probably move to Matador sometime in July.

## Doors Closed At Wayburn's Cafe

Wayburn's Cafe open here for 17 continuous years has closed its doors. Bill Wayburn, owner, said the cafe operation had become unprofitable. He is also engaged in oil leasing business.

The cafe, on US Highway 70, is offered for sale with all equipment, including building and adjacent vacant building lots.

Mr. Wayburn has also sold his home and 22 acres of land about one mile southwest of Matador to Jim Cross, manager of the Matador Ranch. Amount of the transaction was not disclosed.

Suddenly deciding to close the cafe last week, Mr. Wayburn called his employees together, and told them of his plans, giving each one week's additional pay.

Wayburn's was Matador's only down-town restaurant. However the city's two drug stores, Bob Stanley Pharmacy and Vaughn Drug serve sandwiches, and the community is still served by three modern cafes at the intersection of Highways State 70 and US 70. They are El Matador, Smith's Steak House and Leo's Truck Stop & Cafe.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members.

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

With the county location at the base of the caprock, recreation will continue to grow and provide benefits for everyone. Out-of-town recreation seekers will provide additional county income through stations, motels, restaurants, sporting goods suppliers and individual land owners. This in turn should bring more interest and planning in recreation by the public and individual land owners.

The economy of the county could be greatly increased if large reservoirs were established in the county. This could bring boats for skiing, fishing and boating. An opportunity for three such structures is present.

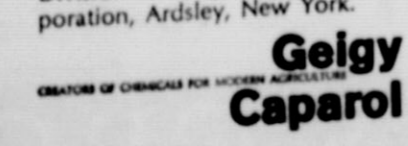
