Lubbock is the locale for a new book off the press, "Lone Star Family" by Erma Elder Hallmark.

White Tells Drouth Cost

State Agricultural Commissioner John C. White, set the cost of the 1952 Texas drouth Friday at \$425,000,000.

"Today, as never before," White told the annual convention of county judges and commissioners at San Antonio, "water has become Texas' greatest economic need."

Texas cotton, White said, has paid a \$220,000,000 tribute to burning sun and drouth. He estimated livestock and related products losses at \$106,000,000, a minimum of \$33,000,000 loss in grain sorghums and said damage to Texas pasture land was more than \$66,000,000.

As White spoke, the United States Weather Bureau said the northern half of Texas may get more rain before the week end, is gone and farmers in the vegetable growing areas of the Texas winter garden, the Laredo-Falfurrias area and the western end of Lower Rio Grande Valley faced a new weather threat—first.

Fair weather returned to all of Texas Friday, ending a 10-day rainy spell over much of the state that broke the drouth in East Texas and was described by a state agriculture department spokesman as a "million-dollar rain."

White Tells Drouth Cost
