PRICE SEVEN CENTS TORNADIC Winds striking out of the northwest late Tuesday brought death to a Latin American child and injury to at least 12 other persons in neighboring Cottle county. Property damage was estimated last night at a quarter of a million dollars, without tak ing into account the loss in wheat and row crips.






