Almost 2,000 yelling fans stood on their feet through much of the game as Matador and Roaring Springs shared the victory almost as one community. For many of the Matador fans it was their first time to witness a six-man football game and the enthusiasm seemed contagious.

Patton Springs' excellent high school band and the Matador pep squad joined forces with the Roaring Springs pep squad in keeping the Yellowjackets assured of sideline support.

Bob Stafford rolled up four of the Yellowjackets' touchdowns, with three runs of seven, 11 and 15 yards and one 70-yard pass play. Second in the scoring department was Bill Woodin who clocked up two on runs of 12 yards and 55 yards. He also booted one extra point.

Peo Lee Long scored the first TD on a 50-yard run. A few plays later he was forced to leave the game with an ankle injury. Jerry Green assumed the chore of calling signals. Bob Campbell, senior center, scored on a 40-yard pass play and Jerry Green on a 50-yard sprint. Charlie Long kicked two extra points.

Flomot Star Route Contract Renewed  
Further assurance that the Turkey, Flomot, Whiteflat and Matador star route will continue without change was received by the Tribune last week from the Office of the Postmaster General.

The letter is signed by Ben Guill, Executive Assistant to the Postmaster General and addressed to Tribune editor Douglas Meador.

"Dear Doug: Further reference is made to your letter of October 20, 1954, requesting that no change be made in the service on star route No. 50153, Turkey to Matador, Texas.

"A report has been received from our field officials recommending renewal of the contract for service on this route, and advising that no changes are considered necessary. However, the statements made in your letter have been noted and will be given careful consideration in the event any future changes are recommended. Your interest in the postal service is appreciated. Sincerely yours, Ben."

Polio Drive Goal \$1,300  
Motley county has a goal of \$1,300 in the 1955 "March of Dimes" polio fund drive. The announcement was made last week by Mrs. Rose Turner of Flomot, county chairman.

"It is not a quota," Mrs. Turner declared, "but a goal which we hope to reach. The drive will start January 3 with the national 'March of Dimes' campaign, but we will conduct the campaign here as we have in the past merely as a drive to secure funds for the fight against polio."

Mrs. Turner said it is probable that 1955 will be the decisive year in the fight against polio when complete reports of the Salk polio vaccine have been assembled.

She said in the study of 1,830,000 children in the vaccine test it will be necessary to assemble 144,000,000 separate pieces of information, through a punch card for each child in the 217 test areas. It is hoped the report may be available some time in the early spring.

Mrs. Turner said the national goal is \$64,000,000. She said more children are being treated for polio than ever before. Some of the cases have cost as much as \$20,000 she declared.

## 2 Silverton Teams Win Over Paducah In Opening Games

IT'S LATER than you think. Matador Matadors boys basketball team enter the 22nd Annual Lions Club Tournament here this afternoon without any practice—the important athletic achievement was their winning the regional football championship crown yesterday.

But basketball is clamoring for its regular schedule in sports events. The tournament which started here yesterday brought defeat to Paducah boys and girls teams at the hand of Silverton.

Silverton boys won over Paducah boys 79-33 and Silverton girls won over Paducah girls 47-39. Childress "B" team went around Turkey 43-40.

Six games (three boys and three girls) are scheduled here today, beginning at 2 P.M. Six games are scheduled for Friday (starting at 3 P.M.) and four championship games (starting at 5 P.M.) will be held Saturday to conclude the tournament. Trophies will be presented Saturday night.

Superintendent Bert Ezzell said last night that attendance has been fair for the starting tournament games. Admission is 50c for adults and 25c for students. Guest schools include Silverton, Paducah, Turkey, Childress, Quitaque, Flomot and Crowell.

Supt. Ezzell said increased competition in the building of more fine, modern gymnasiums in this area is shown in school participation. For many years Matador gymnasium attracted competing teams from distant towns and the Lions Tournament had more teams than it could accommodate.

## Youth Is Victim of Accident

Examination revealed the seriousness of his injury and he was rushed on to Lubbock where he underwent surgery Saturday afternoon. His condition has been reported this week as extremely serious.

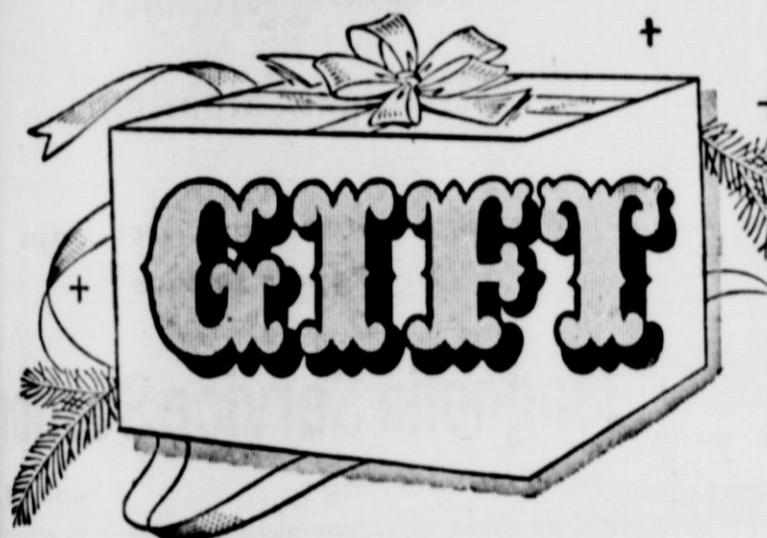

### Wheat Penalties Apply On Excesses For Feed Purposes

When marketing quotas are in effect for wheat, that grown on acres in excess to farm acreage allotments is subject to quota penalties even if fed on the farm says County Agent Bill Pallmeyer.

Many farmers have raised the question why wheat grown for feed and not sold on the market must be included under quota and allotment provisions. The law is clear on this point and is not a matter for administrative ruling according to a statement

Campbell is president of the senior class and Sigma Tau Delta honorary English society, leader of Mission Study and vice-president of the Press Club.

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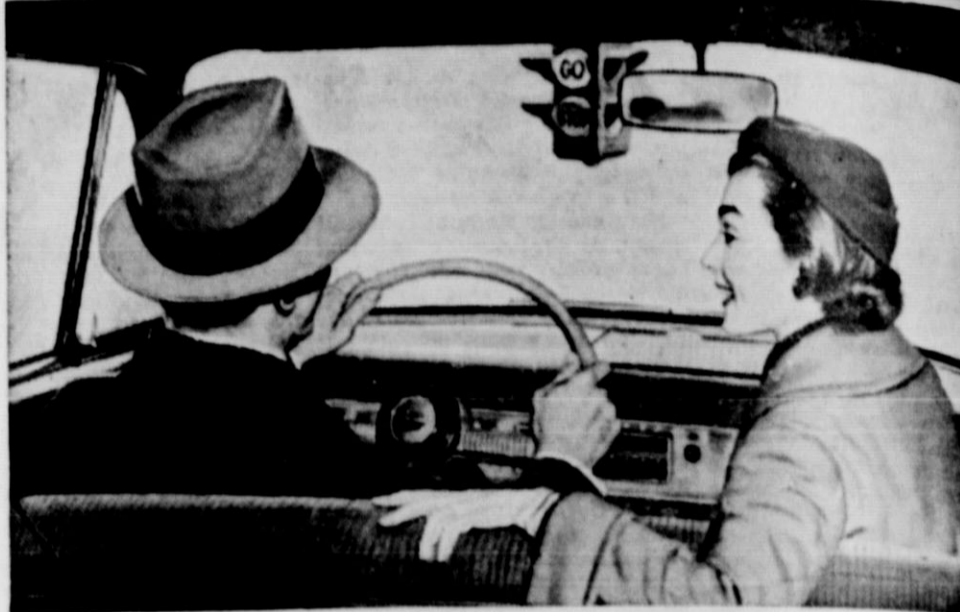
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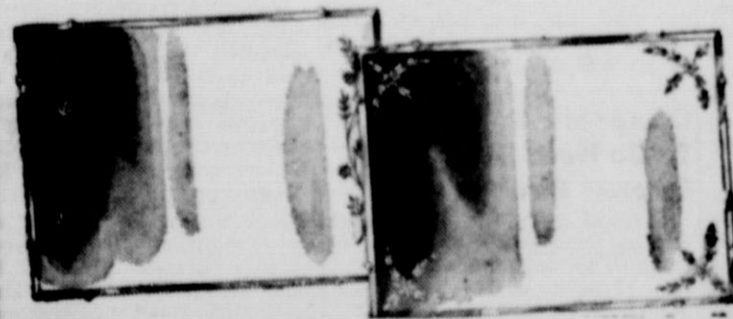

### Postal Department Urges Cooperation In Christmas Mail

In purpose, if not appearance, Postmaster E. F. Springer recalls the officers on those dramatic World War II recruiting posters that reminded passers-by, "Uncle Sam Needs You!"

The battle, in this case, is against time. Christmas cards and gift packages are arriving at Post Office headquarters far too slowly. As a result, immediate cooperation from the public must be enlisted.

"The big danger is that commercial shipments and incoming Christmas mail may slow up the outgoing operation. Poorly wrapped packages have also complicated our work a great deal," the Postmaster said today.

Cancellation machines now register more than usual pieces of mail per day. At the peak of the Christmas season, they will

average far more daily clicks. To avoid unnecessary delays, and speed-up delivery by Christmas Eve, Postmaster Springer advises every one to:

"Mail your Christmas presents for distant states immediately, and all others before December 10. Christmas cards for out-of-town delivery should be posted before December 15, and those with local addresses at least a week before Christmas.

"But first be sure that each gift is carefully wrapped and tied. Print the complete address, and return address, if your handwriting is at all shaky. We have already been forced to return many Christmas gifts as 'undeliverable' for these two reasons."

At present, parcel post is considerably behind schedule. Only Christmas cards are being mailed with some consistency. Grati-fying as this is, the Postmaster anticipates still another rush when unexpected greetings breeze in from forgotten friends. He laughed, "Better pick up a piece of air mail and special delivery stamps today. It always happens."

## Cotton Referendum Date Is Announced

Cotton growers have a red letter day Tuesday, December 14. That day growers will decide whether marketing quotas will continue in effect on the 1955 crop. Claude K. McCan, chairman of the state ASC committee reminds farmers.

"The decision will affect every cotton grower and it's important that each cast a ballot," says McCan. All farmers who grew upland cotton this year will be eligible to vote in the referendum, which will be held in each upland cotton growing county in Texas. At least two-thirds of the growers voting in the nationwide poll must approve the quotas if they are to continue, he explains.

The vote follows the Secretary of Agriculture's proclamation of a national marketing quota and acreage allotments for the '55 crop. Such a proclamation must be made under the law when the prospective "total supply" of cotton exceeds the "normal supply."

Under the marketing quota program, growers who do not exceed their acreage allotment may market free of penalty the entire crop from the farm. Growers exceeding their allotments will be subject to penalties of 50 percent of parity on the farm's excess production.

If farmers approve the referendum, the price support on cotton to eligible growers will be between 82.5 and 90 percent of parity.
